*Spring 2017 Drug Take Back, Shred-it & Recycling Day: It's time to "think spring" and clean out your medicine cabinet, dispose of old documents and clear out those outdated electronics. The annual Drug Take Back Day and related activities will take place on Saturday, April 29, 2017 from 10am to 2pm at the Glad-

stone Police Dept., 535 Portland Ave. If you have unwanted or unneeded medications, you can drop them off at the PD and they'll be disposed of responsibly and properly. You can also bring documents for shredding and electronics to be recycled by the Kraxberger Gearheads Robotic Club. There will also be a dumpster available to take household items that won't fit into your regular trash containers. Medications that can be accepted include prescriptions for both pets and people, over-the-counter medicines and vitamins. Items NOT acceptable include needles (sharps), syringes, thermometers, bloody or infectious waste, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, inhalers or epi-pens. While staples and paperclips are OK in your documents to be shredded, please remove rubber bands and make sure there's no garbage mixed in with the papers. Volunteers will be available to help you unload.



CERT (Community Emergency Response Team):

The City has partnered with Clackamas Fire District #1 to make CERT training available to Gladstone citizens. CERT educates individuals about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light

search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. Using training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT volunteers can assist others in their community following a disaster when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT volunteers are also encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking an active role in emergency preparedness projects. 

Shape the Future of Gladstone Parks

Help shape the future of Gladstone's Parks and Recreation Offerings. The City of Gladstone is in the process of preparing its first citywide Parks Master Plan. The involvement of Gladstone residents plays an important role in guiding the plan and providing direction for how outdoor recreation spaces are connected and developed to add to the community's livability. A community meeting is being planned for May 17th at 6:30 pm at Gladstone City Council Chambers (525 Portland Avenue) to continue the public conversation on the parks and recreation plan. Look for more information on the City's website to learn more about this project. <u>http://www.ci. glad-</u> stone.or.us/gladstone-parks-master-plan/. This is the second of two public meetings being held as part of the public planning process. The meeting will give community members an opportunity to learn more about the planning process, review findings from the recent community survey, and offer further ideas and opinions about priorities for the City's parks and recreation system. This input will play an important role in developing the plan update. To reach out to more residents, the City is launching an interesting social media tool called mySidewalk as part of the project. With mySidewalk, the project team will post questions to the community, and participants can submit answers and comments or bring up their own ideas. Also, the questions we ask will change frequently keeping the site fresh and dynamic. The City of Gladstone is excited to provide this online platform for residents to offer their ideas and questions to the project team and receive announcements and updates. The citywide parks master plan will include a review of current conditions and recommend specific projects based on goals and priorities. These will be determined largely by public input. Final review and adoption of the plan is tentatively scheduled for summer 2017.

Downtown Revitalization



Since late October 2016, the City of Gladstone has been working on a longrange plan to guide the future of the Portland


Avenue corridor, from Abernethy Lane to Clackamas Boulevard. Working with a consultant team, the City has held two community Open House Meetings, two on-line surveys, and met with each advisory committee and stakeholders three times to identify and refine revitalization and redevelopment opportunities and desired improvements along the Portland Avenue corridor. The project team will present a draft recommended alternative for the Gladstone Revitalization Plan to a meeting of the combined Citizen Advisory Committee, the Technical Advisory Committee, and the Stakeholders on Thursday April 20th at 5:30. The meeting will be held in the Gladstone Senior Center. Since each of the committees participating in the project have different areas of knowledge and expertise, this joint meeting will allow each committee to hear all comments on the draft alternative and collaborate on modifications and suggestions for the draft plan. This meeting is open to the public, but will focus on advisory committee members' comments and direction. The Draft Downtown Revitalization Plan will be produced following the April 20th meeting. A final community Public Forum where public comment will be invited on the Draft Downtown Revitalization Plan will be scheduled later in the spring, date to be determined. A Day in the Life of Your Public Works Dept:

This is the fourth in a five part series introducing residents to the role of your Public Works Department. SANITARY SEWER: Have you ever wondered why municipal sewers are called "sanitary



sewers," when our sewers are anything but sanitary? Back in the early days of our city, people used backyard outhouses. But as population grew and density increased, public health became a matter of concern. Human waste deposited into the ground could seep into wells, or percolate to the surface of the ground and become a contaminating agent. Eventually, public sewer systems were developed to remove raw sewage away from populated areas in a safe and contained manner. Hence the use of the term "sanitary" sewer. Your PWD is responsible for the maintenance of the City's sanitary sewer system. Our aging and leaking sewer lines present ongoing challenges for our crew. In some areas, the City is still using clay sewer lines which date back to the 1920's when the City first installed its public sanitary sewer system. Other parts of the City have concrete sanitary sewer lines, and over the decades, tree roots and rocks have damaged them, opening up cracks and expanding the joints, which allow rainwater to infiltrate the sewer lines. During heavy downpours, or a long rainy season such as we experienced this winter, rainwater leaks into the sewer lines multiplying the volume of raw sewage. This large volume of polluted water overwhelms the City's sewer system, causing raw sewage to overflow into the Clackamas River. This is further exacerbated by the fact that some of the older parts of town have combined sanitary sewer/stormwater pipes, which causes more mixing of stormwater with raw sewage. You may have noticed the City experienced multiple sanitary sewer overflows this year, with signs posted and alerts going out to the general public to avoid contact with the rivers. The City's Sanitary Sewer Master Plan, which is currently underway, will determine future priorities for improvement, with an emphasis on relieving these sewage overflows. Public Works recently sent closed circuit television cameras down to inspect the sewer lines for damage and blockages. This inspection revealed that poor construction and age of the sewer lines has caused parts of the lines to settle and "belly out." These sunken areas then become a catch-all for any sewage debris, such as household and commercial grease, wipes, and personal hygiene products to accumulate, stagnate, and block the sewer lines. Within the last year, your PWD has instituted a routine sewer inspection and line cleaning schedule to help our aging system better serve us until the City has the funding to replace or repair our lines. Currently, we lack the staff and equipment to maintain these lines to industry standards. Public Works is, however, developing a budget that will allow us to better address preventative maintenance issues. The City sanitary sewer system collects and conveys effluent to Clackamas County Tri City Sewer District and Oak Lodge Water Services for treatment. Sewer effluent is treated at the Water Environmental Service (WES) wastewater treatment facility. Your PWD is also responsible to perform underground locates of both the City's main sewer lines, and to assist property owners with locating private property sewer laterals that are located within the City's right of way. After decades of lacking infrastructure mapping, the City recently moved to a GIS mapping system that will allow us to map all of our underground infrastructure. Unfortunately, the City did not map the lateral lines over the past decades, and since these lines are constructed of a nonconductive material, they are difficult to locate underground. Public Works is, however, working diligently to bring our new mapping system up to date as information about what lies underground is revealed. Over time, to better serve our residents, we hope to have an infrastructure map which accurately locates all of the City's underground utilities.

Outdoor Backyard Burns

The Fire Dept. has received several calls with questions about backyard burning since the last newsletter posting. If you still have questions, please contact Michael Funk, Fire Marshal at 503-557 -2775. What can I burn? The only material you are allowed to burn is clean seasoned firewood, as part of a recreational or cooking fire. Burning clean dry firewood will produce the least amount of smoke and reduce nuisance calls generated by your neighbors. If you believe that a resident is burning illegal materials, you should call our fire dispatch center (non-emergency #503-655-8211) & report the violation. Calls regarding illegal burning activities are investigated by Gladstone Police or Fire officers. Most times residents are not found to be burning illegal materials. Over 50% of the smoke calls are simply BBQ's & smokers. When there is smoke in your neighborhood, a reasonable first step is to politely contact your neighbor and advise them of your smoke concerns.
