

# Gladstone Police Department (GPD) News

\*CHIEF'S CORNER: That groundhog Punxsutawney Phil predicts a bit more winter, so don't look for the sun to be out much anytime soon. On a brighter note, Gladstone Police Department is looking ahead to a strong and active 2017. Right now, GPD is seeking qualified applicants to serve as police officers in this awesome community. We are encouraging men and women with integrity, a strong work ethic and a desire to serve the public to apply. If you want a rewarding career with good pay and benefits and to be part of a progressive department in a great city, we welcome your application. GPD provides a great work environment, ongoing training in the many facets of law enforcement and a supportive community. \*OREGON CROSSWALK LAWS: Per information provided by ODOT, in Oregon from 2009-2013, 798 pedestrians on average were injured and 52 were killed in motor vehicle crashes each year. The majority of pedestrian-involved motor vehicle crashes are a result of the failure of drivers to vield to the pedestrian. A quarter of pedestrians who are struck by vehicles are hit while in a crosswalk. Pedestrians and motorists both share responsibility for pedestrian safety, but remember that pedestrians are always the loser. A pedestrian hit at 40 mph has an 85% chance of dying. Under Oregon law, there is a crosswalk at every public street intersection, whether marked with paint or unmarked. When turning at a traffic signal, a motorist must stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared the lane into which the vehicle is turning and at least 6 feet of the next lane. At any other crosswalk, whether painted or unmarked, the motorist is required to stop and remain stopped for the pedestrians

until they have cleared the lane in which the vehicle is traveling and the next lane. Be especially careful during the morning hours when kids are heading to school or in the afternoon when they're going home or heading off to afternoon activities. Be patient with older adults who may need a little extra time crossing the street. Don't pull too far forward and into the crosswalk at an intersection. This can force pedestrians to veer into a traffic lane in order to go around your car. And yes, driving while distracted is a big issue here. You cannot text and watch the road and look for pedestrians at the same time.

#### Business License Renewal Reminder

Business license renewals were due January 31st. All businesses pay a fee of \$100, plus \$5 per employee and if the business is operating out of a home residence, an additional \$50 fee is required. For owners of rental properties, the \$100 fee applies plus an additional \$25 per rental property. Business license applications may be downloaded from the city's website www.ci.gladstone.or.us. Business license fees not paid on or before March 1st will be assessed a delinquent charge of **\$10 per month**.

# Downtown Revitalization

Since late October 2016, when over 60 people attended the first Open House and over 180 respondents gave feedback via an online survey, the Gladstone Revitalization Plan consultant team, advisory



committees and stakeholders have continued to refine revitalization and redevelopment opportunities and desired improvements along the Portland Avenue corridor from Abernethy Lane to Clackamas Blvd. Consistent with the community's expressed desire for change along the corridor, the project team presented alternatives for future growth at the second and final open house on February 23rd. Community input on the specific aspects that comprise these alternatives-including streetscape design, building height, and parking-is critical at this point in the project. An opportunity to provide feedback on alternatives for future growth will also be provided via a "virtual open house." # Gladstone Public Works Dept (PWD) News—18595 Portland Ave

This is the second in a five part series introducing residents to the role of your Public Works Department. The PWD is responsible to maintain the city's drinking water lines, pump stations and



reservoirs, as well as to provide the necessary water samples and documentation to the State Health Department to ensure that the City meets the regulatory requirements in providing safe and quality public drinking water. Public Works also submits all the routine and special samples and documentation under these reporting requirements to the appropriate clean water regulatory agencies. In addition to water quality, Public Works must maintain water quantity in order to provide for Fire, Life and Safety (FLS) issues. Without this oversight, the City's water system could be unable to provide sufficient water quantity and water pressure in the event of an emergency, such as a fire. The challenge to Public Works and the risk to our clean and safe drinking water is that our crew must spend an inordinate amount of time repairing the leaking lines in our aging drinking water delivery system, as well as to maintain the outdated technology and questionable reliability of the telemetry system at the water reservoirs at Kirkwood and Webster Road. The lack of a reliable telemetry system results in inefficient and insufficient data monitoring of the water system. This requires the crew to log many unnecessary and costly hours in the field to gather and record system data. The Public Works Department works hand in hand with the City's Utility Billing department to provide water shut offs and turn ons, report meter reads on an ad hoc basis, determine underground waterline locates for the 811 Call Before You Dig service, and maintain proper and sufficient inventory for waterline and meter servicing and repair. In addition, our water utility workers are required to maintain biennial CEU's (Continuing Educational Units) to stay current with regulations, protocols, and procedures, and must pass stringent exams to demonstrate their competence to provide you with safe drinking water. Additionally, the Public Works water division provides public education on backflow and back siphonage, as well as being responsible for the annual testing program of backflow devices, such as those required on homeowners' underground irrigation systems. The requirement to test and certify private backflow assembly devices helps to ensure that polluted surface water does not find its way into the public drinking water system. As required by regulatory laws and standards, Gladstone Public Works uses lead free and copper free fittings so that these metals do not leach into the City's water system. As part of the City's new GIS utility mapping system, Public Works has been busy confirming and updating the location of our myriad underground infrastructures.

# Parks Master Plan Open House and Community Survey

Residents are invited to attend a Parks Master Plan Open House on Thursday, March 9th from 6:00-8:00 pm in the City Hall Council Chambers. Possible discussion items include: What do you value about Gladstone Parks? How do you envision Gladstone parks in 2027? What changes would you like to see? A wide array of activities exist today in Gladstone, from youth sports and summer recreation, walking, running



to events—what role should the City play in furthering health, wellness & active lifestyles? What should the City be doing more of? Less of? What could be done better. Bring your ideas and visions for the future of Gladstone's park and recreation opportunities! Don't forget to complete and return your Community Survey on Park & Recreation Preferences. The City is conducting a short survey to assess the recreational needs of community members to prepare for its first citywide Parks Master Plan. The new Plan will establish a path forward for providing high quality, community-driven parks & recreation amenities throughout the City. The Plan will establish goals and recommend specific projects for the City's parks and recreational facilities for the next 5-10 years. #### Potholes

With the end of the recent snow and ice storm, our Public Works Department has noticed City streets took a beat-



ing. If you spot a dangerous pothole, please contact our Public Works Department at 503-656-7957. Please include street location address, your name & phone number (your phone number allows staff to contact you to obtain additional information if needed). Public Works will repair the pothole if needed as soon as possible depending on several factors including severity, weather and work load capacity. Given the City's limited budget and staff, Gladstone relies heavily on resident involvement to help keep streets safe.



#### Low Income Energy Assistance

The Oregon Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides lowincome Oregonians assistance with their home energy expense. The LIHEAP program includes bill payment assistance, energy education, case management and home weatherization services. Households wishing to receive assistance from the LIHEAP program must be at or below 60 percent of state median income. Income guidelines for Oregon Program Year 2017: 1 family member-annual income: \$22,626; 2 family members—annual income: \$29,587; 3 family members—\$36,549; 4 family members-\$43,511 (gross income means all household income before deductions). Households may rent or own their property; however, rental/utility agreements & landlord cooperation may affect the kind/ level of benefits provided. # House Address Numbers



Gladstone Firefighters respond to our neighbors' calls for help, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year. When you call 9-1-1 for help from the Fire Department, you can expect to have us arrive quickly with trained

personnel to assist you. To help locate your home quickly, have your house numbers posted so responders can find you. Can you clearly see the numbers posted on your house when driving by at 25 MPH? How about at night? If you can't clearly see your house numbers, neither can emergency responders. Please be sure your house numbers are posted near your front door and should be at least 4 inches or larger on a contrasting background. Don't forget emergencies happen after dark as well as in the daytime. Shine a light on those clearly posted numbers. Remember, a light at night may also help limit unwanted persons around your homes in the night hours. 


