# Gladstone Police Department (GPD) News

\*Spring 2017 Drug Take Back, Shred-it & Recycling Day: It's time to "think spring" and clean out your medicine cabinet, dispose of old documents and clear out those outdated electronics. The annual Drug Take Back Day and related activities will take place on Saturday, April 29, 2017 from 10am to 2pm at the Gladstone Police Dept., 535 Portland Ave. If you have unwanted or unneeded medications, you can drop them off at the PD and they'll be disposed of responsibly and properly. You can also bring documents for shredding and electronics to be recycled by the Kraxberger Gearheads Robotic Club. There will also be a dumpster available to take household items that won't fit into your regular trash containers. Medications that can be accepted include prescriptions for both pets and people, over-the-counter medicines and vitamins. Items NOT acceptable include needles (sharps), syringes, thermometers, bloody or infectious waste, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, inhalers or epi-pens. While staples and paperclips are OK in your documents to be shredded, please remove rubber bands and make sure there's no garbage mixed in with the papers. Volunteers will be available to help you unload.

\*Window Safety: The National Safety Council uses the first week in April to remind and educate the public on the importance of practicing window safety year-round. Falls from a window can result in serious injury or death and are an especially dangerous threat for children. Every year about eight kids under age five die from falling out a window and more than 3,300 are injured seriously enough to go to the hospital. Here are safety precautions each of us can take to prevent kids from falling out a window: Open windows only to a width of four inches and install a window stop to keep them from being opened further. Install window guards with an emergency release device on operable windows. Keep furniture, or anything else children can use to climb on, away from windows. Remember that screens are to keep bugs out, not to keep kids in. Supervise children's play and teach them to play a safe distance away from windows. Teach children how to safely use a window to escape during an emergency, such as a fire. Keep windows closed and locked when not in use. According to the US Consumer Product Safety Commission, about one child dies each month from window cord strangulation. Check your window coverings for exposed or dangling cords and make sure the little ones can't ever reach them.

Remember, newer smoke alarms have a 10-year lithium battery in them and if the battery has reached the end of its life, you should replace the entire smoke alarm. #### Nuisances/Code Enforcement

Gladstone administers a "nuisance code" which essentially prohibits conditions that may affect public health or safety. # Gladstone Public Works Dept (PWD) News—18595 Portland Ave

A Day in the Life of Your Public Works Dept: This is the third in a five part series introducing residents to the role of your Public Works Department. PARKS: Did you know that the City of Gladstone has over 133 acres of park land?



(For a comparison, the City of Milwaukie only has 75 acres of park land.) While some of the park land and open spaces within the City of Gladstone are undeveloped, your Public Works crew still actively maintains that undeveloped property for regulatory issues such as stormwater runoff, receiving waters bacterial, mercury and temperature control, hazardous trees, erosion control, flood mitigation, and riparian maintenance. At the same time, the Public Works crew routinely maintains all of our developed city parks. This includes removing on average an astounding EIGHT TONS OF TRASH PER WEEK during the summer, and FOUR TONS OF TRASH PER WEEK during the winter! Your Public Works crew performs mowing, spraying, watering, fertilizing, preparing ball fields for games and tournaments and cleaning up afterwards, cleaning up after dogs, (please remember to pick up after your pets), resupplying the doggy-do bags, cleaning the bathrooms, blowing and removing leaves on the paved areas, applying bark mulch and gravel, performing and maintaining the striping of the parking lots and asphalting our paved areas. Additionally, Public Works is responsible for maintaining and managing the spray park in the summer, repairing vandalism and removing graffiti, and repairing and maintaining park structures and picnic tables. The Public Works Department also oversees invasive species removal, appropriate re-vegetation efforts, and the preservation of riparian areas and habitat to meet all our water regulatory requirements. Additionally, due to our recent storm, your Public Works crew had nearly 10 log truck loads of damaged trees felled and removed from Meldrum Bar Park alone, as well as cleaning up hundreds of cubic yards of storm debris. All work is completed with a Parks division budget that provides funding for one full time employee, a half-time supervisor, and limited seasonal employees.

#### Water Leaks

It is possible to detect leaks in your home on your own. Most water leaks can be seen or heard, though some can be difficult to detect. Here are steps to check if you may have a leak: 1) Turn off all water sources being used in the house or any water features in your yard. Locate the water meter on your property (usually located be-

any water features in your yard. Locate the water meter on your property (usually located between street and sidewalk). 2) Remove the meter box lid and read/write down all the numbers located on the meter. 3) Wait 30 minutes to an hour, then re-read your meter. If you have all the water off in the house/yard and the meter numbers have changed, a leak is present somewhere on the property side of the meter. If you have a bad leak it can be seen pretty fast. If it is smaller leak, like a small leak in the toilet, it may take more time to see it in the meter. Finding the leak: isolate the line that runs from the house to the street. Follow these steps: Turn off the water at the house (not at the meter), if numbers continue to increase, there is a leak in the service line from the house to the meter. If the numbers do not continue to increase, there is a leak in the house. Check your house for leaking toilets (toilet flapper not tightly fitted), faucets dripping, look under sinks/fixtures, crawl spaces, outside faucets or hose connections. Some people fix their own leak, while others hire a professional, such as leak detection companies or plumbers. For emergency water turn off, M-F, 8:00 am to 3:30 pm call 503-557-2771, a \$25 fee will be added to account, after 3:30 pm call 503-655-8211, a \$175 fee will be added to account.

#### Report a Street Light Out

Know of a street light that's out, flickering or on all day? Tag the pole with flagging tape, gather the information requested and contact PGE Lighting Services: nearest street, cross street, city, zip code, map number, pole number (map and pole numbers are found on the pole tag—a three inch round or oval metal tag located at eye level on the pole). #### Call 8-1-1 Before You Dig

The Utility Notification Center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and accepts calls from contractors, homeowners, or anyone planning to dig. Locate requests are accepted over



the phone, through a fax-a-locate program, or through the ITIC program. If you need to process a locate request, or need additional information about locates please call 1-800-332-2344 or 8-1-1. This is a free service. State law requires you to call the notification center before you do any digging as there could be buried facilities anywhere you plan to dig; under the road, sidewalk or even in your yard. Calling before you dig ensures that any publicly owned underground lines will be marked so that you can dig around them safely. Having the utility lines marked not only prevents accidental damage to the lines, but prevents property damage and personal injuries that could result in breaking a line. Under normal



circumstances it takes between 2-5 days from the time you call (not counting weekends or holidays) to have the underground lines marked.

# Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents I about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract



unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors is now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court.
