# Gladstone Police Department (GPD) News

\*<u>Proposed Changes to Gladstone Municipal City Code</u>: A variety of changes to Gladstone's Municipal Ordinance Code are being considered. The topics currently under review include: •Use of membrane structures; •Storage of vehicles on private property; •Adopting a registration process for vacant buildings; • Public drinking; •Graffiti revisions; •Some traffic regulations. You can find the full text of the proposed changes on the city website. Printed copies will be available to review at the library and the senior center. The Council is planning to conduct a final review of these proposed changes at their July 11th meeting.

\*<u>Residential Fences:</u> With the arrival of spring, many of us start to think about those outdoor home improvement projects. If a fence is something you're considering, here's some **general information** to keep in mind for residential locations. Along with the usual building materials of wood, vinyl, brick or chain link, fences can include such things as hedges, shrubs and flowers. Generally speaking, they are to be no higher than three feet from the front of the house to the front lot line and no higher than six feet elsewhere. When planning what to put in your yard, please also use common sense and consider sightlines for vehicle traffic. This is especially important on corners. The philosophy is that you need to have a clear sight line both horizontally and vertically at intersections for safety. The specific requirements on what's allowed can be found in the Gladstone Municipal Code, sections 17.10, 17.12 and 17.54.020.

\*Chief's Corner: A Successful Drug Take Back Day 2017: Saturday April 29th was a wonderfully busy day around the city with multiple events underway, including the Drug Take Back, e-Recycling and shredding drop off. According to the reports from the various participants, the results included 209 pounds of medications turned in (and kept out of our water systems), a trailer load of paper received for shredding and several huge loads of items for e-recycling. Thanks go to the Gladstone Police, Kraxberger Gearheads Robotics Club, Rotary and Baskin-Robbins for all their work and support. And of course we thank all our residents who participated in this important annual event that gets bigger and better every year.

\*<u>Awards</u>: The GPD held their department meeting, training and award event at the Gladstone Community Club. Officer Dustin Olson was selected by his peers for "Officer of the Year". The Chief Award was presented to Sgt. Wayne Lawrence, Officer Matt Okerman & MOS Sean Boyle for their tireless work related to the implementation of the RegJIN system. Congratulations!

# Gladstone Fire Department (GFD) News



**\*CPR Training at Kraxberger:** All Oregon students will be trained in CPR, thanks to the recently passed state law in 2015 that requires the lifesaving skill to be taught before graduation. Gladstone Fire has been working with students at Gladstone High School to accomplish this requirement, but on April 27<sup>th</sup> the fire department started working with 8<sup>th</sup> grade students at Kraxberger Middle School to learn hands only CPR. This is not only a requirement for graduation, but all students will be learning a valuable life saving skill.

\*High Rocks & AMR Lifeguard Program: High Rocks Park is approximately 1.5 acres in size with the Clackamas River bordering Gladstone and Oregon City, and is a popular place for people to escape the heat or just to enjoy a family outing. High Rocks has seen many fatalities over the years that could have been prevented with a life jacket or a little bit of education on the dangers of the cold and fast water. The Clackamas

River in the High Rocks area hides many dangers including strong currents, extremely cold water, large underwater rocks, and large pieces of scrap steel. Some of these items are barely under the surface where many people jump from the rocks and river temperatures range from the mid-40 degrees in the winter to mid-60 degrees in the summer. After numerous drownings over the years, American Medical Response (AMR), our local ambulance company, brought their River Safety and Rescue Program to our local waterway in 2002. Even with AMR Lifeguards on duty from Memorial Day to Labor Day, there are those situations that require additional resources or a "full marine rescue". The Clackamas Water Rescue Consortium, including the GFD, responds to incidents that require specialized rescue including divers, swift water swimmers, and boat operations. This year, the GFD will be doing outreach programs to educate swimmers about the dangers of the Clackamas River to include High Rocks. Please be safe as you enjoy High Rocks Park this year and remember to have a healthy respect for the dangers of swimming in this area.

# Reminder: Parks Master Plan Open House

A public open house meeting is set for May 17, 2017 at Gladstone City Council Chambers (525 Portland Avenue) to continue the public conversation on the parks and recreation plan. The meeting starts at 6:30 p.m., so join the conversation about parks, trails and recreation in Gladstone! This is the second of two public meetings being held as part of the public planning process. The meeting will give community members an opportunity to learn more about the planning process, see a summary from the recent community survey, and offer additional ideas and opinions about priorities for the City's parks and recreation system. This input will play an important role in developing the plan update. The parks plan will include a recommendation of specific projects based on goals and priorities, which will be determined largely by public input. Final review and adoption of the plan is tentatively scheduled for summer 2017. # Downtown Revitalization



The Downtown Revitalization Project team presented a preferred alternative land use and transportation concept to all

three project advisory committees on April 20, 2017. The preferred concept is essentially Alternative 2, which was presented and discussed at Open House #2 on February 27, with the addition of the following: •A larger downtown core area with a curbless street; • A shared bicycle/automobile, low-speed travel-way between Exeter and Arlington; and •A waterfront park concept. The street design within the downtown core area reflects desirable elements of Alternative 3, also discussed at the February Open House, with additional refinements that emphasize the "Main Street" character of this area. The consultant team will now prepare a program to implement the preferred concept, including development code changes, funding strategies, and public investments. # Gladstone Public Works Dept (PWD) News-18595 Portland Ave

A Day in the Life of Your Public Works Dept: This is the last in a five part series introducing residents to the role of your Public Works Department. **STREET DIVISION**: Residents have undoubtedly noticed the deteriorating condition of our city



streets. A little history will help everyone understand how we got to this state. In the old part of town, our streets started out just like all pioneer cities: Dirt roads. As time went on, improvements were made consistent with the era, which consisted of spreading river run gravel over the dirt, and then in later years crushed rock was used. These were primitive roads, but an improvement over dusty or muddy dirt roads. Eventually these primitive roads were graded smooth and in many cases they were sprayed with tar and overlaid with crushed rock. This tar and crushed rock mixture is known today as a chip seal. While this was a big improvement over dirt and mud roads, these streets are no longer adequate with today's cars, heavy trucks, and increased traffic. Over the years, the city simply added additional layers of chip seal. In some cases a layer of asphalt was applied, but often the asphalt thickness did not meet industry standards and quickly failed under the load of traffic. The original old road base was not removed and replaced with the correct underlayment to create a proper street foundation. Additionally, the city's streets were never properly graded to include a crown to allow for water runoff. Since the City of Gladstone did not have construction standards, many of our streets, even as recently as a few years ago in the newer subdivisions and neighborhoods were also improperly built. The lack of construction standards was compounded by the fact that the city was unable to manage construction projects due to lack of staff to oversee, inspect, and manage these projects. Our streets were neglected over the last several decades, and we are now faced with finding the most cost effective method to bring our roadways up to industry standards. With the addition of a Director of Public Works, we are now working to compile construction standards and to provide sufficient staff to allow for oversight, inspection, and approval of construction projects occurring within the city. The City recently implemented a pavement inspection survey through Capital Assets and Pavement Services. The results of this inspection indicated that Gladstone streets score below the average condition of other cities in the surrounding area. Capital Assets and Pavement Services provided the City with a Pavement Management Plan, an engineered guideline that we will use to maximize our funds and prioritize the streets that will most benefit. The Pavement Management Plan also provided us with an estimate of the funding required to bring our streets up to an acceptable condition. Unfortunately, some of our low volume streets that are in very poor condition may not get repaired for years because of funding priorities. Until the city has sufficient funding to bring the streets up to industry standards, Public Works is limited to patching the streets with a temporary pothole patch called a cold patch. We send a cold patch crew out weekly, or more often when weather or other conditions require it. Many private utilities use our road and street rights of way to place their utility lines. The City has established a Right of Way Use Fee to be paid by these utilities. The funds collected under the Right of Way Use Fee is dedicated to the City's Street Operation and Maintenance Fund. As State and Federal regulations for public safety increase, road surface rehabilitation may require more Americans with Disabilities (ADA) accommodations which regulate things such as pedestrian intersection incline, width, surface, etc. These are necessary for our residents, but they are very costly, up to \$40,000 per intersection. Public Works is focused on using our funds wisely to protect our citizen's investment into their city. We've had the streets surveyed and inspected, the report and guidelines have been produced. We hope to be able to move forward with bringing these projects to fruition.

#### Backflow Prevention/Cross Connection

The purpose of backflow prevention devices is to eliminate potential contamination of your drinking water by "cross connection" with pollution related substances such as fertilizer or industrial chemicals. For example, a cross connection occurred in Virginia when a water customer's garden hose was connected to an outside faucet and was left in a barrel of highly toxic insecticide, and the insecticide was back-siphoned into the public's water supply. This contamination could have been provided if a backflow device had been installed in the customer's water supply line. Oregon Administrative Rules and City code require annual testing of all backflow prevention devices. Devices are required for residential irrigation systems and nonresidential land uses include medical clinics, commercial laundries, dry cleaners, etc. Early spring is an excellent time to schedule an annual backflow assembly test for your landscape irrigation (sprinklers). The cost of a backflow assembly test can vary widely among testers. We recommend you obtain more than one quote before hiring a tester. Also, check with your neighbors or home owner's association; you might be able to negotiate a lower cost per test if there are several assemblies in close proximity. 12 years initially and every 5 years thereafter. If charcoal briquettes are more your style, be sure to store the bag in a dry place at all times. If your charcoal based fuel gets wet or damp, they can self-ignite under certain conditions, and that can spell disaster. If lighter fluid is used, be sure to follow the directions on the can and never apply fluid when there is an open flame.

Gladstone Municipal Code Chapter 6.08.020(1) states: "A permit to keep such bees, livestock or fowl within the City shall not be granted unless the owner or possessor provides facilities which will reasonably assure the City that the premises will be maintained in a sanitary condition, free from offensive odors, excessive noise or any other conditions which constitute a public nuisance as de-fined in Chapters 8.04 and 9.12." 
