We will also need to fill positions on GEMS to coordinate areas such as HAM radio, supply, spontaneous volunteers, sheltering and exercise planning. standing contributions to the City of Gladstone while acting as the Interim Assistant City Administrator for the past six months.

#### Transportation System Plan Meeting

The City is currently coordinating with the Oregon Department of Transportation to update the Gladstone Transportation System Plan (TSP), which is a long-range plan that guides the development of the City's transportation system over a 20-year period. As part of the planning and public engagement process, we will be seeking public input at two Community Meetings. The first meeting will be held on Thursday, January 12th, from 6-8pm at the Gladstone Senior Center, 1050 Portland Ave. The Community Meeting will include a short presentation by City staff and the consultants to provide citizens with an introduction to the project and an overview of the planning process. Citizens will then be free to ask questions and share their thoughts and concerns on transportationrelated issues with City staff and the consultants. A series of poster boards will be used to illustrate the existing conditions and future needs associated with each of the major travel modes within Gladstone (ped, bike, transit, and motor vehicle). If citizens are unable to attend the meeting in person, a Virtual Community Meeting will be available on the project website (<u>www.gladstonetsp.com</u>) starting Thursday, January 12th and continuing through Thursday, January 26th. The Virtual Community Meeting will offer the same opportunities for citizens to provide input as the inperson meeting via the website. Please plan on attending either the Community Meeting or Virtual Community Meeting on January 12th to help guide the city's future transportation system!

#### Downtown Revitalization Project

Gladstone citizens, business owners and property owners have spent the past few months working with City staff and a consultant team to identify revi-



talization and redevelopment opportunities and constraints along the Portland Avenue corridor from Abernathy Lane to Clackamas Boulevard. Over 60 people attended the first Open House in late October, where the consultant team presented their initial findings about downtown Gladstone and facilitated discussions with attendees about the strengths and opportunities of the corridor. An online survey, also conducted in October, provided insight into people's experiences with the corridor, as well as their perspectives on downtown Gladstone. In addition, a group of Portland Avenue "stakeholders" - business owners, property owners and residents - met in November and discussed development opportunity sites and corridor-wide street design details. Open house materials, survey results, and a recap of the Stakeholder meeting are posted on the City's webpage http://www.ci.gladstone.or.us/city-ofgladstone-downtown-revitalization/. The project team will host a second open house in early 2017 to discuss the initial recommendations of the plan. Check the City's webpage in the coming weeks for an announcement regarding the specific time & place of the meeting.

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors the City does not regulate, such as placing trash & recycling cans out of public view, to trim overhanging tree limbs, move fences or locate property lines. # Gladstone Disposal Company Rate Adjustment Notice

Gladstone Disposal Company provides garbage, yard debris and recycling services for the City of Gladstone. The City Council has approved the following rate adjustment for the residential service in the City effective January 1, 2017.

There will be additional fees for any special service provided. Please keep the roll carts and bins provided for garbage, yard debris and recycling in good condition, and remove them from the street or curb after collection. Do not overfill the roll carts; the lids must be closed and material must fall loosely when emptied. Roll cart weight limits: 20-35 gallon roll carts: 60 lbs; 65-gallon roll cart: 100 lbs; 95-gallon roll carts: 120 lbs. Please call Gladstone Disposal at 503-656-9426 to make changes, schedule a pick up of large items or a large container.

#### Clean Water Tips

Protecting our groundwater is important, especially since 70% of the state relies, at least partially, on it for drinking water. This is why we must keep our groundwater clean by: \*preventing oil & fluid leaks with proper vehicle maintenance; \*picking up pet waste; \*never dumping any type of waste into gutters, catch basins or into the street. Cleaning catch basins also helps maintain good flow through the stormwater system preventing flooding. Residents are asked to help keep catch basins clear of debris. If a catch basin is full or is not draining after a rain event and residents have removed any road debris from the catch basin, please contact Public Works at 503-656-7957.



#### Pedestrian Safety

With our days of dark mornings and evenings, residents are reminded while jogging, walking or

biking to wear reflective and/or light colored clothing during the hours of darkness. Bicycles should have ample reflectors and a light on when it is dark.

#### Drop off Prescriptions

Flushing drugs down the toilet or putting them in the garbage can have damaging effects on our environment and can contaminate our

surface and groundwater supplies. Both drinking and wastewater treatment plants are not designed to treat for these kinds of chemicals. Drop off your old, expired or unwanted prescriptions at the Gladstone Police Department lobby—MED RETURN receptacle, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. The green and blue "Med-Return" receptacle has easy to follow directions, does not require any paperwork and there is no fee.

#### What Can be Recycled During the Holidays



Many people wonder which items that are frequently around during the holidays that can be recycled. Here's a guide to some of the most common: \*Wrapping paper/packaging: Plain wrapping paper can be recycled, wrapping paper with glitter or anything shiny on it can not; \*Wrapping tissue:

Plain tissue can be recycled, but anything with glitter or metallic can not; \*Ribbon: trash or consider reusing or donate to places such as SCRAP; \*Bubble wrap: not in home recycle bin, but can be added to plastic bag recycling at participating grocery stores; \*Styrofoam: trash; \*Rigid plastic on packaging: trash or take to an independent recycler; \*Christmas lights: trash or take to an independent recycler. # Street Parking Regulations

We are approaching the time of year when owners of boats, trailers, and RVs are preparing them for winter storage. Gladstone Code Enforcement would like to remind its citizens that there are city ordinances regulating on-street



parking, and these ordinances are very specific as to the type of vehicles that can be parked on city streets. Chapter 10.04.230 of the Gladstone Municipal Code (available online on the city's www.ci.gladstone.or.us) describes parking issues. Please be mindful of neighbors and use alternative parking, such as RV pads or local RV storage facilities, etc. By following these guidelines we can all enhance city services, improve public safety and help make our neighborhoods more "neighbor friendly" for Gladstone residents.

#### Sidewalks and Clear Vision

A couple of residents recently expressed concern about sidewalks and clear vision. The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property and are liable to any person suffering injury due to a defective sidewalk. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." This is similar to property owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection.

#### What to Recycle at Home and Work


YES, Please: Mixed Paper, Cardboard & Cartons: junk mail, office paper, newspapers, magazines, phone books, cereal and cracker style boxes, milk, juice and soup cartons (rinse & drain). Plastic Bottles, Tubs & Buckets: clean bottles and tubs, 6 oz. and larger, plastic buckets 5 gallons or smaller, rigid nursery pots 4" across & larger. Metal Cans, Foil & Scrap Metal: clean cans, foil, pie plates & trays; empty spray cans, scrap metal up to 30 lbs and no longer than 30". NO, thank you: Frozen food boxes, coffee cups, pizza boxes, pet food bags, paper towels, paper plates, napkins & tissue: these contain wet strength, an additive, which means these items won't break down in the paper making process. Plastic Bags & Film: these items jam the machinery during the recycling sorting process, causing worker injury and additional labor costs. To-Go Boxes, Cups, Plates, Clamshells & Styrofoam: these plastics have limited or no demand by manufacturers. On the Side: Glass Bottles & Jars: clean glass bottles and jars go in SEPARATE recycling container. Motor Oil: recycle motor oil in marked, unbreakable container, not larger than two gallons, with a screw-top lid.

# Hanging Tree Branches

Public Works is asking residents to trim low hanging tree branches that may damage vehicles or injure pedestrians by cutting branches seven feet (7') above sidewalks and fourteen feet (14') above streets. Please cut up your branches and place them in your yard debris cart. If Public Works determines there is a risk of damage or injury, they may cut your tree branches without notice. During winter months, please remove portable basketball hoops from city streets to reduce interference with street sweeping.

#### Nuisances

Similar to most cities, Gladstone administers a 'nuisance code" which essentially prohibits conditions that may affect public health or safety. For example, unsanitary and unsafe conditions such as accumulations of debris or rubbish or storage of

#### Wipes in Sewer System

Wipes can 'wipe out' costly sewer systems - Wet wipes, baby wipes, cleansing wipes, disinfecting wipes, surface



wipes, hand wipes, antibacterial wipes, bathroom wipes or disposable moist towelettes. Whatever you call them, no matter what the packaging says, DO NOT FLUSH! The packaging might say they're flushable, but wipes, no matter the cleaning purpose, are causing expensive problems for sewer operators all over the world and should be disposed of in a waste receptacle and sent to a landfill to decompose. Residents are reminded that Chapter 13.12.070(3) of the Gladstone Municipal Code states: "The customer shall be responsible for the maintenance of the private sewer line from the public sewer connection to the premises served. The City shall not be liable for any damage accruing from the failure of a private sewer or of fixture of appurtenances attached thereto."
