Voters will be asked for authorization to construct and incur debt to finance new civic buildings (City Hall and Police Station) each project to cost over \$1,000,000. Gladstone Police Dept. (GPD) News

*Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over—As summer winds down, Gladstone Police will be ramping up its enforcement efforts as part of a national crackdown on drunk driving. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is conducting a 17-day high-visibility campaign to curb impaired driving and save lives. All it takes to prevent drunk driving is a little planning ahead. Designate a sober driver, call a cab or stay home. In 2013, there were 10,076 people killed in drunk-driving crashes. We don't want you to become a statistic from this reckless, preventable crime. Be smart, be safe and stay alive. Whatever you do, don't drink & drive!

*<u>National Night Out</u>—On Tuesday, August 4th, several neighborhoods in Gladstone came together for the 32nd annual National Night Out Against Crime event where citizens meet with their neighbors, local police, fire and city officials to talk about crime prevention. Thank you to everyone who participated. Citizens are the first line of de-fense against crime and your support is appreciated!

Gladstone Fire Dept. (GFD) News

*Fire Hydrants need to remain accessible at all times. As you get outdoors this summer, please be sure the fire hydrant on your property is clean and clear of all grass, weeds and other landscaping. After several weeks of hot weather, those un-kept lawns have turned into fire hazards. Please be sure to mow your high grass to eliminate these hazards. Letters have been sent to several residents and some have been cited by local law enforcement. Cut grass reduces the chances of a summer grass fire.

*<u>Gladstone Firefighters Respond</u>: *Gladstone Firefighters have responded to over 1000 calls for assistance so far in 2015. The 31 members of the GFD have had a busy year and expect to respond to over 1600 calls in 2015. About 75% of calls are for medical needs, where Gladstone responds quickly as first responders along with AMR ambulance. Our EMT's work closely with transport ambulance personnel to provide quick, high quality medical service to residents of Gladstone.

*Gladstone Firefighters responded to the Stouts Creek Fire between Medford and Roseburg—in the end of July for 3 long days. Crews worked in extreme heat conditions while deployed and helped save several homes from the fire threat. Great job-Kirk,

Zak, Izaak and Gabe! *August 12th—Gladstone was placed on alert for the Warm Springs fire but did not deploy. On August 13th, Engine 103 and a crew of 4 were deployed to a new fire near Baker City. Gladstone is one of 6 rigs responding from Clackamas County to the conflagration declared by the Governor. Clackamas County task force crews are being placed (safely) between homes and fire where possible to save homes. Our Firefighters are making a truly courageous effort to save the homes in the path of these growing fires in Oregon. Our wishes for their safe return and thanks for their time and effort!

*Back at Home: Here in Gladstone we are still completely staffed and ready to continue uninterrupted service. What can you do to help? During the current dry spell residents are asked to refrain from having outdoor fires. While it may not be illegal for you to have a small recreational fire, GFD is asking you to take the safest action and refrain from outdoor fires for now. Remember, you can be held legally and financially responsible for any fire that may be caused by even a legal fire you may choose to have. If you must burn, keep it small, only burn clean seasoned firewood and be sure to have a garden hose next to the fire. If your fire creates sparks, put it out. Never leave a fire unattended-not even for a minute!

Drop off Unwanted Prescriptions at Police Department

Flushing drugs down the toilet or putting them into the garbage have damaging effects on our environment and can contaminate our surface and groundwater supplies. Both drinking and wastewater treatment plants are not designed to treat for these kinds of chemicals. Drop off your old, expired or unwanted prescriptions at the Gladstone Police Dept. Lobby MED RETURN receptacle M-F, 8am to 5pm. The green and blue "Med-Return" receptacle has easy to follow directions, does not require any paperwork and there is no fee!

VOLUME 41, NO. 8 Pipeline & River Intake Update

The old River Intake Pump Station (RIPS) demolition is almost complete. Demolition is on track for completion by early September. After demolition, the area will be landscaped and repaved. The final pipeline crossing-crews have installed casing and pipe in the Teriyaki Grill parking lot, the Nissan dealership lot and across River Road. The Nissan lot has been paved and the Teriyaki lot will be paved soon. Once the newly installed pipe is tested, final paving will occur on Jensen Road pathway, River Road, McLoughlin Blvd and dead-end block of Exeter Street. McLoughlin Blvd night work has began. Crews are installing the remainder of the pipe across McLoughlin Blvd. Work on McLoughlin Blvd. will be conducted at night between 8pm and 5am, Sunday-Thursday. During work hours, travelers should expect nighttime lane closures on McLoughlin Blvd between W. Arlington and W. Gloucester streets. In some instances, lane closures may also occur from 9am to 3pm. Expect temporary delays during this time. Steel plates and temporary pavement patches will be present, so driving at slower speeds is encouraged. Once the pipe is tested, final paving will occur. Energy Assistance

Clackamas County Energy Assistance has funds available to help income-eligible households with their PGE and/or NW Natural utility bills. You don't have to have a past-due notice, you may be eligible even if you pay your bill every month and assistance is available year round. To be eligible, a household's gross monthly income (before taxes and deductions) must be at the following: Single-person household: \$1,792.14/mo; Two-person household: \$2,343.56/mo; Three-person household: \$2,894.99/mo.; Four-person household: \$3,446.42/mo. Conservation of Water

The State of Oregon continues to experience a drought as we move past the mid-summer mark. This year the snowpack in Mt. Hood National Forest, which normally helps replenish water supplies as it melts in the summer, was a record low. Here are some tips to help reduce water



consumptions this summer: 1) Irrigate smart! Water your lawn only between the hours of 8pm and 10am. 2) Refrain from washing cars except at commercial establishments that recycle or reuse water in their cleaning process. 3) Nonessential use of water including recreation, remodeling, construction and cleaning uses (i.e. power washing) is discouraged. These water conservation measures in homes or businesses can help mitigate the effects of reduced water flow by keeping excess water where it belongs-in the river.

Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted



pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs, locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. Locating property lines must be completed by a surveyor. You may contact Clackamas County Surveyor's Office at 503-742-4475, or email surveyor@co.clackamas.or.us to see if a survey has been conducted on your property. For additional information on additional issues on neighbor law you may check out "Neighbor Law: Fences, Trees, Boundaries and Noise" by Cora Johnson at the Gladstone Library.
