



Fire Department Recruitment

The Gladstone Fire Department is currently recruiting for on-call fire-fighters. Job qualifications required: *high school diploma or equivalent, *must be a minimum of 18 years of age, *must pass a criminal background check and drug test, *must possess a current, valid Oregon driver's li-

cense and maintain a driving record insurable by the City's insurer as a minimum qualification to maintain the position of firefighter, *must pass the entrance physical ability test, written exam (70% or better) and interview to be accepted for the department fire academy, *must obtain State of Oregon EMT license within one year after probation and maintain it during duration of employment, *must reside or work within boundaries of Gladstone Fire Dept. during employment, *recruits are required to complete the fire academy and become certified as a NFPA Fire Fighter I. (time commitmentapproximately six months, every Friday evening and Saturday), *in addition to a high school diploma, post-high school education or an equivalent combination of education and experience is preferred and will be considered. Applications are available at the Gladstone Fire Station, 555 Portland Ave, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. The application deadline for this process closes January 31, 2014. Gladstone Police Department (GPD) News

*Soon to Graduate: GPD's newest police officers, Mark Herkamp & Casey Newton, are nearing completion of the challenging basic police academy. They are doing very well at the academy and look forward to returning to Gladstone to complete their field training.

*GPD Command Staff Retreat: This annual half day work shop will focus on a review of GPD accomplishments and challenges in 2013 and will then set the stage for a work plan for 2014. One line level department member will participate in the work as well. *Family Justice Center Opens: The Family Justice Center (FJC) has opened and is housed in the Shaver Building on Warner Milne Road in Oregon City. The FJC provides a variety of law enforcement, advocate and support services to survivors of domestic violence. There are only about 80 FJC's in the United States. This innovative model fosters improved communication and collaboration between domestic violence service providers and therefore provides better service to survivors of domestic violence, all under one roof.

Public Records, Permits, Planning & Zoning

*A Public Records request form and fee are required for anyone requesting public records information. The form is located on the city's website.

Business License Renewals

Business license renewals are due January 1st of each year. For businesses located within Gladstone, including home based businesses, the fee is \$35 per year for the first three employees and \$5 for each addi-



tional employee. Businesses located in the commercial or industrial zoning district who want to display a portable Aframe sign are asked to fill out a simple application. Business license and A-frame sign applications may be downloaded off the City's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us, City Hall, licenses/forms/reports or by calling 503-557-2769

Energy Assistance Program

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a federally funded program designed to assist Clackamas County low-income households with home heating costs. The program continues until funds are expended. To be eligible, a household's income must be at or below 60% of the Oregon's median income. A household must have documented energy costs. Both homeowner and renter households are eligible. Income guidelines for 2014 are as follows: Single person household: \$21,706.88/yr or \$1808.91/mo. Two person household: \$28,385.92/yr or \$2,365.49/mo. Three person household: \$35,064.96/yr or \$2,922.08/mo. Four person household: \$42,744.00/yr or \$3,478.67/mo. Resource for Winter Travel



Winter travel information can save motorists the Winter travel information can save more hassle of driving for miles only to find out a route is closed or congested. The Oregon Dept. of Transportation (ODOT) offers travel information on their website at www.tripcheck.com. The

site offers camera images from urban areas, mountain passes and other key locations throughout the state. Maps detail road conditions and include information about weather, road conditions, maintenance work and traffic incidents. Travelers in Oregon may also dial 5-1-1 or call toll free at 1-800-977-ODOT (6368) to access Trip-Check road and weather information by phone.

Sidewalks & Clear Vision

The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible to maintain sidewalks abutting their property. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." Property owners are also responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision at street intersections. Thank you.

Gladstone Fire Dept. (GFD) News

*Greetings & Happy Holidays from the firefighters at the GFD. Your firefighters have responded to over 1500 calls for help from Gladstone citizens so far in 2013. All our firefighters live or work within the City and feel it is an honor to serve our neighbors.

*This month the GFD has been busy collecting and receiving food and toys from the community to distribute back to families in the area needing assistance this year. Your generous support makes a difference to families and children that may not otherwise receive new toys. There are donation barrels in several businesses around town and at the fire hall. *Still stuck on buying the perfect gift for someone? How about the gift of LIFE? Buy them a new working smoke detector—remember, smoke alarms do not last forever. The effective life of a smoke alarm is 10 years. How about a new flashlight for those winter power outages? If you have a woodstove or gas burning fireplace, consider a carbon monoxide detector. Home fire extinguishers also make great gifts! Or what about a can of deicer for your car-driving with frozen windows can cause accidents.

*Be prepared for winter in your car —pack a blanket, flashlight and emergency food. Carry traction devices and consider jumper cables. Remember, people sometimes get stuck in winter conditions in areas without cell phone reception.

*Stay warm and be safe, call 9-1-1 for emergencies. For non -emergency concerns, call 503-557-2774 or 503-557-2775.

people 60 years and above. Space is limited so call the center to sign up!





Recycling Services

Gladstone residents receive recycling pick up services with their weekly garbage service. Recycling must be separate from your garbage. Please use the large gray recycling roll cart, recycling bins or paper bags, such as a brown grocery bag. Do not use plastic bags. All recycling can be combined into the large gray recycling roll cart except for glass and motor oil. Glass and motor oil must be kept separate from all other recyclables. All paper, plastics (including plastic tubsyogurt, margarine, cottage cheese and salsa tubs) and metals can be combined in your roll cart.
