flecting on the past and for new resolutions. Why not make a commitment to fire safety in 2013? Your Gladstone firefighters are committed to respond and to serve you in the event of an emergency, but are a reactive service. They respond when you call for help. Please assist with their prevention efforts to keep your home safe by performing the following simple steps: 1) Always dispose of fireplace ashes in a metal bucket and place it outside away from any combustibles. Never use a paper bag for your ashes and do not place the ashes in your garage. 2) Candles can be beautiful and add wonderful aromas to your home. Please be sure to never leave candles unattended. If there are animals inside the home, you may want to look into the new flameless candles. They produce a nice flickering lightwith no open flame. 3) Smoke alarms: (why mention smoke alarms again?) because some people did not take the time to inspect or replace alarms since last month's reminder—requesting all residents to check their home smoke alarms. ONLY working smoke alarms save lives. Remember, smoke alarms do not last forever. The ef-Even if the alarm still operates when you coordinating all of this year's efforts.

*HAPPY NEW YEAR, a season for re- test it, please replace it after 10 years. Between the 10 year device replacements, you should perform battery testing and replacement. If you have a 10 year battery in your alarm, and you test it monthly, the battery should last 7-10 years. If you do not manage to test your smoke alarm on a regular basis, the battery should be changed out yearly. 4) Remember: outdoor burning of leaves, branches, lawn clippings, berry bushes, construction debris, garbage and other like substances is not allowed in the City of Gladstone. Only dry, seasoned fire wood is allowed and then the fire must be small and attended at all times. When burning outdoors, have a water hose or bucket nearby. Business License Renewals

To avoid a \$10 penalty, please submit annual business license renewal forms before March 1st. For businesses located within Gladstone, including home based businesses, the fee is \$35 per year for the first three employees and \$5 for each additional employee. Applications may be downloaded from the city's

website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us under application forms or by calling 503-557-2769.

Liquor License Renewals

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) advises the City each year of businesses that are eligible for a liquor license renewal. Oregon Revised Statues (ORS) 471.166 establishes the process for local governments to make recommendations of approval or denial to the OLCC. The City is requesting residents express any concerns about currently OLCC licensed businesses. Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. Report Street Light Outages

Portland General Electric (PGE), asks customers, when reporting a street light for repair or outage, to include the address, nearest cross street, pole number and map number whenever possible. If possible, identify the pole with flagging tape to assist PGE in easily locating the light. Please report any outages by contacting PGE directly at 503-464-7777, on their website, <u>www.portlandgeneral.com</u> under safety & outages or email lightout@pgn.com. Contact PGE directly as the City does not repair or own the streetlight poles.

Drop Off Unwanted Prescriptions

Drop off your old or unwanted prescriptions at the Gladstone Police Dept.—MED RETURN. It's the beginning of the year and a good time to go through your medicine cabinet and discard all of your outdated or no longer needed medica-

tions. Old or expired medications can be dangerous to your health and the health of your family. If you only keep the medications that you need around there is a less likely chance of a mix-up. Now you can bring your old or unwanted prescriptions, vitamins, over the counter medications and even pet medications to the Gladstone Police Dept lobby to be safely disposed of. The green and blue "Med-Return" receptacle in the lobby has easy to follow directions and does not require any paper work. Just make sure you are dropping only the items listed on the receptacle during regular business hours, 8am to 5pm, Monday-Friday, except for holidays. The collected medications will be properly destroyed on a regular basis. There is no fee.


