Mayor Milch's Library Groundbreaking Speech (June 21, 2023)

It is a truth universally acknowledged that the groundbreaking for a new public library is a perfect occasion to tell a story about a child's love for books.

Once upon a time, in the midst of a Great Recession brought

on by the bursting of a housing bubble, a little family in Omaha, Nebraska, loaded up their minivan and headed west in search of the promise of a new life in Oregon. They followed essentially the same route as the 19th century pioneers before them did, but this family's journey took only three days instead of three months, and fortunately none of them died of dysentery.

When they arrived in Oregon to move in with their grandparents, the children in the familytwins, a boy and a girl-were just shy of three years old, and small enough to sit facing each other in a Radio Flyer red wagon. I know, because I was the grandfather who pulled them in that wagon up SE 13th Avenue on our visits to the Sellwood-Moreland branch of the Multnomah County Library.

Visits to local libraries for storytime, reading to the dogs, craft activities, and summer reading programs became an important part of the twins' lives. So much so that a year later, when their family bought a home of their own in Clackamas County, they found one in Gladstone just two blocks from the public library so they could continue their love of books and reading. Their father was appointed to the Gladstone Library Advisory Board, and

soon afterwards their grandparents settled in Gladstone to be closer to Civic Center. their family.

Around this time they began to hear talk of plans for a new library that would serve Gladstone and its neighboring communities. My granddaughter asked her mother,

"Will you take me to the new library, Mommy?"

And her mother said, "I promise that I will take you to library storytime at the new library as soon as it opens."

Maddie was very excited. "Really, Mommy? You promise?"

"I promise," replied her mother.

Maddie's mother is determined to keep the promise she made to her daughter. A year from now, when the new library opens on this site, and Librarian Heather welcomes the first group of children and parents for story time, my granddaughter and her mother will be there. Maddie will have just about finished her freshman year studying civil engineering at Portland State University, so I'm hoping she will sit near the back and not block the view of the smaller children.

Maddie will be there because of a promise her mother made to her when she was a little girl And the library building will be there because of a promise that officials in Clackamas County and the City of Gladstone made to one another more than five years ago-a promise that has never been broken, and one that we celebrate today.

Operating Levy for Police Services









Although campfires are not allowed in Gladstone, camping season is here and many people will be headed to local area campgrounds. Clackamas Fire District wants to keep you and your family safe while enjoying campfires this summer by following these safety tips from the National Fire Protection Association:

Before setting up a campfire, be sure it's permitted - as summer conditions become hotter and drier, a ban on campfires might be in place.

• Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves. Place rocks in a circle around your fire area.

• Never use gasoline or other flammables, or combustible liquids.

• Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel and dirt or sand nearby to put out the fire. Make sure to put it completely out before leaving the site.

• Keep a campfire small, which is easier to control and never leave campfires unattended.

- Don't let children or pets stand too close or play near the fire.
- Don't let children add wood or debris to the fire.

• If your clothes catch on fire, stop, drop, and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover

your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.


• Treat a burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for three to five minutes.

Pressure Washing and Surface Cleaning

Although convenient for cleaning surfaces and equipment, pressure washing can send dirty runoff containing oil, soap, chemicals, metals, and sediment into the storm drain system. Most storm drains have zero to minimal treatment and drain directly toward the surface water and groundwater we all need to protect.

Here's how our waters are being negatively impacted:

• Sediment clouds the water, hinders aquatic plant growth, and clogs fish gills.

• Even biodegradable soaps rob water of life-giving oxygen.

• Household hazardous wastes, like pesticides, paints, solvents, and auto fluids that collect on driveways and other outside surfaces can poison aquatic life. Animals and people can become sick or die after consuming polluted water or fish.

• Ingestion of pre-1978 paint flakes containing lead can be a concern as it can result in intellectual disabilities in children.

• Avoid using hot water and chemicals as that type of wastewater has a greater negative environmental effect.

What can you do?

• Use dry cleanup methods first (sweep, blow, vacuum). Dispose of debris in the trash.

• Soak up oil and fluids using absorbents (cat litter, sawdust, sand) and dry-cleanup methods before washing. This, too, goes in the trash.

• Direct dirty runoff into a lawn or landscaped area away from the storm drain system. (If wash water cannot be directed to landscaped areas, collect for disposal to the sanitary sewer via a clean out, toilet, or sink.)

• Follow EPA lead paint guidelines if pre-1978 era paint is involved. Specialized Equipment Can Help.

Berms, storm drain covers or mats, sump or vacuum pumps, wet vacuums, filtering or absorbent equipment such as socks, booms, bags of absorbent bark chips, etc. can help prevent dirty water from entering the storm drain or allow for collection before it does.

Avoid Violations!

Polluted discharges from any property that enter a storm drain system are considered an illicit discharge violation and are subject to enforcement. If you are using hot water or chemicals, this water is not allowed to enter storm drains without an Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) permit.

> the story. Panic set in. Immediately, Gladstone residents began burning and disposing of the Indian relics they had collected from their new house excavations, flowerbeds. and gardens. Anything to appease the ghosts.

Immediately, the children's "Indian Bead Club" was disbanded. The smallpox sickness never became an epidemic, nor did it claim a life. Some residents continued to keep a wary eye out for revenge-seeking native ghosts and a possible smallpox recurrence. And poor Officer Van Brakle reluctantly wrote a report that said: "possible inoculation from ancient beads worn by Indian smallpox victims". While he may not have solved the mystery, we have solved ours. The Historical Society now knows why so very few Clackamas Indian artifacts remain. 
