The City Begins the Gladstone Town Center Project

The City of Gladstone is establishing a geographic boundary for zoning and development code changes to support economic development and vibrancy within Gladstone's Town Center. The Gladstone Town Center Plan will comply with Oregon's Climate Friendly and Equitable Communities (CFEC) rulemaking. CFEC rulemaking aims to reduce climate pollution, provide more transportation and housing choices, and promote equitable land use planning



outcomes. Establishing a Town Center in Gladstone will ensure that there is a designated geographic area in the city that provides opportunities for residents to access services with reduced dependence on single-occupancy vehicles.

The Gladstone Town Center project will result in Comprehensive Plan, Development Code and Zoning Map updates, as well as code amendments to implement parking reforms as part of the CFEC program. The project will build upon the 2017 Downtown Revitalization Plan, new zoning and development code updates for the Downtown Core Overlay, and the recent Main Street affiliate designation for Portland Avenue.

Public Works Projects - 2024

Gladstone City Council made a commitment to improving our City's infrastructure and to develop a sustainable plan for maintenance and upgrades to our aging infrastructure. The Gladstone Public Works Dept. has several projects that will begin in the coming weeks. With these upcoming projects the Public Works Dept. wants to provide open lines of communication in an effort to minimize inconveniences and disruptions. Below are a few ways that the Public Works Dept. will be communicating with the public regarding projects over the coming months.

Gladstone Public Works will be contacting individual property and business owners that are or will be effected by any of the ongoing projects.

Evergreen Ln. Stormline Project - The project involves the replacement of 393 feet of failed 18" storm line, which is the last segment of the stormwater conveyance system contributing to the Evergreen Lane stormwater outfall, which is currently severely obstructed by a large tree. The project will also involve the installation of maintenance access manholes and a relocation of the outfall to a conveniently accessible location where it may flow freely.

The project will provide functionality and longevity to a critical segment of the stormwater conveyance system, increase system flow capacity, improve water quality and reduce adverse effects from storm events. The project will add maintenance access manholes and a formal outfall that may be accessed for inspection/maintenance. Funding for this project is budgeted from the City's

Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) Project – Stages of this project have been ongoing over the past several years. This project focuses on preventing sewage overflows into the Clackamas River. Utilizing smoke testing and CCTV the City has been able to identify areas of cross connections, both public and private. Armed with the findings the City worked with Leeway Engineering to design the I/I project, with the recent bidding process the City awarded a contract to Braun Construction & Design, LLC, who will begin work to complete this project very soon.

The I/I project will correct occurrences both public and private of Inflow and Infiltration to the City's sanitary sewer system which ultimately will reduce and possibly remove overflows into the Clackamas River from the City of Gladstone's Sanitary System. Funding for this project is budgeted from the City's Sanitary Sewer and Stormwater Funds, the City also partnered with Water Environmental Services (WES) as part of the I/I Reduction Plan which reimburses up to 33% of the cost associated with correcting Inflow & Infiltration.

Cured in Place Pipe Lining (CIPP) Sanitary Sewer Repair Project - This project will repair multiple sanitary sewer lines within Gladstone addressing concerns of aging infrastructure. This project will also provide the city with an opportunity to eliminate additional occurrences of infiltration and inflow to our sanitary system. Funding for this project is budgeted from the City's Sanitary Sewer Fund.

Large Scale Paving Project - In September, 2023 Gladstone City Council adopted a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) of 71 and made the commitment to invest in improving Gladstone's roadways. Part of improving the roadways is identifying streets that



need more significant work such as grind and inlays. The roadways listed below have been selected for paving during the summer of 2024, more detailed information will be provided once the bidding process for this project has concluded. Funding for these paving projects are budgeted from the Streets Fund.

- -W. Berkeley St. from Barton Ave. to Dead End
- -Charolais Way from Charolais Ct. to Cason Ln
- -E. Jersey St. from Harvard Ave. to Cul-De-Sac
- -E Fairfield St. from Yale Ave. to Cornell Ave
- Madrona Ct. from Ridgewood Dr. to Cul-De-Sac
- Stonehill St. from Cornell Ave. to Oatfield Rd
- Oatfield Rd. from Webster Rd. to Ridgegate Dr.
- Webster Rd. from Cason Dr. to City Limits

Annual Slurry Seal Maintenance Program - Slurry Seal is the process of putting down asphalt emulation mixed with a small aggregate and sand to help extend the life of our roadways. This is an important part of the City's obligation to perform preventative maintenance to prolong the quality of our streets. Currently the City of Gladstone works with the City of $Hills boro\ on\ this\ large\ scale,\ multi-city\ bidding\ process,\ we\ are\ awaiting\ more\ detailed\ information$ regarding the dates of the slurry seal project, we will post information on our website, and on social media pages. Below are the roadways that have been selected to be slurry sealed this year. Funding for this project is budgeted from the Streets Maintenance and Operations Fund.


Slow Down and Check Your Speedometer A message from the Gladstone Traffic Safety Committee

Speeding contributes to car crashes by reducing reaction time, increasing the risk of losing control, and amplifying the impact force. One of the key ways speeding contributes to car crashes is by diminishing the driver's reaction time. When a driver exceeds the speed limit, they have less time to perceive and respond to potential hazards on the road. This includes unexpected changes in traffic patterns, pedestrians crossing, or vehicles merging into their path. The reduced reaction time significantly raises the chances of a collision occurring. As the speedometer climbs, the vehicle's stability and maneuverability are compromised. Additionally, higher speeds make it more challenging for drivers to maintain control of their vehicles. Negotiating turns, navigating curves, or executing emergency maneuvers become increasingly difficult, increasing the risk of skidding, spinning out, or losing control altogether. This loss of control can result in collisions with other vehicles, stationary objects, or even rollovers. The impact force during an crash is also greatly amplified when speeding is involved. The energy dissipated upon impact increases exponentially with speed, leading to more severe damage to vehicles and a higher risk of injuries to occupants. The increased velocity can overwhelm the protective features of a vehicle, such as seatbelts and airbags, reducing their effectiveness in mitigating the consequences of a crash. Furthermore, the relationship between speeding and car crashes extends beyond the immediate impact. The higher the speed, the longer it takes for a vehicle to come to a complete stop. This means that when a speeding driver encounters a sudden obstacle or needs to break abruptly, they have less time and distance to stop, increasing the risk

of rear-end collisions or collisions with stationary objects.

5 Water Smart Tips

The average water use for a family of four in the United States is 400 gallons of water per day. Here are 5 tips to help you and your family use water wisely at home.

- 1. Check your toilet for leaks at least once a year. Do this by dropping toilet dye tablets or 10 drops of food coloring into your toilet tank. Wait 10 minutes, and then check your toilet bowl. If there is color in the bowl, you have a leak.
- 2. Let your dishwasher do the work. An average dishwasher uses about 10 gallons per load. Running the average faucet for just four minutes uses the same amount of water.
- 3. Take shorter showers. Cutting just one minute from your daily shower can save 75 gallons of water each month. Imagine how much water you could save if everyone in your family does the same!
- 4. Water early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) or later in the evening (after 6 p.m.) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
- 5. Add a shut-off nozzle to your garden hose and save about 5-7 gallons each minute that your hose is on.

The City of Gladstone provides residential applicants of approval or denial in

- Based upon Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits/Very Low Income Limits (50% of Median Family Income) for the Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro, OR-WA MSA as published at HUD.gov and updated annually. Limits in effect as of July 1 will apply for the fiscal year
- Income limit areas are based on the current fiscal year Fair Market Rent (FMR) areas.
- Income levels are incrementally based on households of one to eight persons.

Lawn Care Tips to Help Protect Our Water

While pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers can help control pesky weeds and insects, they can also cause other problems. All pesticides have some level of toxicity that can be harmful to honey bees, earthworms, aquatic bugs, fish and people. The following are environmentally friendly lawn care practices that help protect our water:

Safest: Annually aerate, de-thatch and over-seed bare spots in the spring. This will keep the lawn dense and healthy, which keeps out weeds. Use a long-handled weed removal tool for easy weed removal. Fertilize only in fall with a slow release fertilizer, if at all.

Next Best: If you choose a weed or insect control product, look for the OMRI label which helps identify less hazardous chemicals. Always read and follow the label, as even natural/organic products can be harmful. Only apply products when multiple dry days are in the forecast. Spot spray only the individual weeds you really can't live with!

Important Measures You Can Take: Do not apply pesticides, herbicides or fertilizers under windy conditions, or when rain, snow or hail is predicted within the next 48 hours.

How pesticides can be harmful: Pesticides can cause problems for our health and the environment even when applied according to label directions.

Pesticides can make their way into waterways through run-off and leaching.

Very small amounts of pesticides can be lethal to beneficial insects and birds.

Pesticides in waterways pollute drinking water and can harm fish and other marine life.

Water Meters

The City of Gladstone Public Works Department wishes to remind residents that water meters need to be kept clear and accessible from obstruction at all times.

It is important to remember that your water meter, though on your property, remains the property of the <u>City of Gladstone</u>.

Public Works staff may need to access your water meter for repairs, maintenance, turning water off and on as well as replacement, if necessary.

As property owners there are several things you can do to ensure city employees are able to access your water

- Keep surrounding plants trimmed; the meter area should be kept clear of shrubbery, ornamental trees, and low growing bushes.
- Do not bury your meter.
- Be sure not to place anything on top of or covering the meter (lawn ornaments, rocks, weeds etc.)
- Ensure that landscaping such as paving, fencing and decking are not covering the meter.
- · Avoid parking vehicles and trailers over the meter, if possible.

Part 2: The brig Owhyhee, named for the word used by the early Native Americans to identify Hawaii, was outfitted by its owners to be a trading ship in the Pacific Northwest. Captained by John Dominis, the Owhyhee sailed for the Columbia River, in 1829, to compete against the powerful Hudson Bay Company in the lucrative fur trading and salmon packing business.

The ship's crew was enjoying a profitable trade with the local

Indigenous Tribes along the banks of the Columbia when they heard tales of the abundant fish that could be caught at Willamette Falls. Captain Dominis then charted a course for the Willamette River and sailed as far south as the Clackamas Rapids before he was stopped. What looked to be a fast-moving but navigable stretch of river turned out to be water only 12 feet deep. Captain Dominis parked the Owhyhee at present-day Gladstone, ordered his crew into their small side boats, and everyone paddled up the river for an overnight camping trip by the giant

The next day, Captain Dominis and crew returned to the rapids to reboard their ship, but their ship was missing. Gone! Nowhere in sight.

The Owhyhee was known for losing anchors all over the South Seas. In that era of sailing, rightsized anchors were hard to come by. All too often, missing anchors were replaced with anchors of insufficient size because they were available. Deducing that the Owhyhee must have broken loose from another anchor and taken off downriver, Captain Dominis and crew paddled all the harder down the Willamette to find their ship. It is unclear as to where the crew found their ship, but the general thought is that the Owhyhee survived its get-a-way and was in sea-worthy shape when the men reboarded it.

While the Owhyhee sailed into history, the Willamette River at Gladstone underwent changes. During the next 103 years, different dredging operations occurred to make the river more accommodating to the ever-increasing steamboat traffic. In 1933, during one of these dredging operations, a dipper man discovered the Owhyhee's anchor, pulled it out of the silt, and took it

For thirty years, the Owhyhee's anchor remained hidden away until Stuart Mockford learned that the dipper man's widow still owned the Owhyhee's anchor. On a visit to the widow, he found the anchor nicely preserved in a chicken shed beneath a pile of firewood and a lot of chicken droppings. Mockford acquired the anchor and displayed it at the entrance of his architecture office in Oregon City from 1966 to 1998, when it was relocated to the Portland Yacht Club. Today, the Owhyhee's anchor remains a significant relic of Gladstone's rich past and an intriguing reminder of the Clackamas people who cut it loose for posterity. 

How to Fit a Bike Helmet

Clackamas Fire District wants children and families to ride their bikes as much as possible and to make sure you'll be safe while doing so. According to Safe Kids Worldwide, properly-fitted bike helmets can reduce the risk of head injuries by at least 45 percent - yet less than half of children 14 and under usually wear a helmet. Here are a few tips on how to fit a bike helmet.

• The helmet should sit level on the head and low on your forehead - one or two finger-widths above your eyebrow. It shouldn't be tilted forward or backward.

- Center the buckle of the strap under the chin. On most helmets, the straps can be pulled from the back of the helmet to lengthen or shorten the chin straps.
- Buckle your chin strap. Tighten until it is snug, so no more than one or two fingers fit under the strap.
- Open your mouth wide...a big yawn. The helmet should pull down on the head. If not, readjust for a good fit.
- Remember to use hand signals and to follow the rules of the road. Be predictable by making sure you ride in a straight line and don't swerve between cars.
- Wear bright colors and use lights, especially when riding at night and in the morning. Reflectors on your clothes and bike will help you be seen.

- •Avoid the placement of furniture near windows to prevent children from climbing
- •Do not rely on insect screens to prevent a window fall
- •Keep children's play away from open windows and doors
- •Install building code-compliant devices designed to limit how far a window will open or window guards with release mechanisms to help prevent a fall
- •Teach your child how to safely use a window to escape during an emergency

These issues include: to place trash and recycling cans out of public view, not to feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc.

Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court.
