- Continued to endorse the inclusion of the Portland Avenue Improvements and the Trolley Trail Bridge projects in the Metro Regional Transportation Plan Projects for 2024-27.

- Made appointments to various City Boards, Committees and Commissions throughout the year
- Approved a new Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Gladstone and OLWS relating to water, wastewater, and stormwater; committed \$750,000 to infrastructure improvements in the next several years.
- Approved public improvement contract in the amount of \$121,206.03 to complete the 2023 Pavement Management Program Slurry Project.
- Supported the Gladstone Senior Center Advisory Board's recommendation to change the name of the Gladstone Senior Center to the Gladstone Community Center-The Spirit of Generations and the name of the Board to the Gladstone Community Center Advisory Board.
- Continued to support the Gladstone Oak Lodge Rotary's Community Festival by approving a Gladstone Community Festival Agreement and allocating \$5,000 from tourism funds to support enhanced musical performances.
- With the recommendation from the Gladstone Budget Committee, the City Council approved the 2023-25 City of Gladstone Budget in the amount of \$71,374,314.
- The 2023-25 Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency was also approved with an allocation of funds towards economic development that will include analyzing a potential future amendment to the existing urban renewal plan to add projects, expand the boundary, increase maximum indebtedness, and complete other plan updates. *Continued on page 2...*

A Year in Review with Gladstone City Council Continued from page 1...

- Referred the Gladstone Police Levy and Fire and Emergency Services Levy to the voters and in November 2023, they were approved (82% and 87.33% respectfully) and services will remain funded for five years beginning in July 2024 through June 2029.
- Approved an intergovernmental agreement establishing a process of lending (and borrowing) of public employees within Clackamas County during an emergency.
- Adopted policy and text amendments to Gladstone Municipal Code Chapter 17.14 for the multi-household residential zoning to be allowed outright and reviewed under the existing clear & objective standards applicable to duplexes and multi-family. This is in response to the Governors middle housing initiatives.
- Adopted policy to exclude roosters in the city limits...
- Recognized the Seventh Day Adventist Gladstone Park Conference Center for their Community Day of Giving.
- •Recognized the American Medical Rescue Response (AMR) Northwest for providing the River Safety Program at High Rocks Park for 23 years.
- Supported the creation of an economic development/tourism coordinator limited duration position to focus on the Council's goal of creating a robust economic ecosystem, to support, maintain, and grow all businesses, and to focus on revitalization to make Gladstone's downtown an inviting place.
- Adopted an annexation policy for interested parties that would like to annex into the City and receive city services.
- Approved Resolution 1226 adopting a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) of 71 for the City of Gladstone Pavement Management Plan. The Council recognizes that our streets are in need of maintenance and they committed to increasing the annual investment to \$900,000 for the next five years. The effort will consist of both ongoing preventative maintenance such as crack sealing and the annual slurry seal program, as well as more significant rehabilitation repairs such as grind and inlay projects and overlays.
- ullet Reviewed the Gladstone City Council Rules at numerous work sessions and adopted amendments in September.
- Amended the City of Gladstone's municipal code to update and clarify terms and conditions of utility use of the public right-of-way's in the City of Gladstone.
- Held a work session on proposed changes to the Gladstone Municipal Code related to Home Occupations in the Gladstone Zoning and Development Code.
- Participated and submitted testimony regarding concerns with I-205 tolling.
- Approved an agreement between the Oregon Department of Transportation, Clackamas County, and the City of Gladstone to advance the engineering/design phase of the Trolley Trail Bridge replacement project.
- Hosted the Clackamas Cities Dinner, at the Campbell Course (formally known as the Children's Course). Approximately 50 elected officials from the Clackamas County region participated, and presentations were provided by Mayor Michael Milch, Senator Mark Meek, and State Representative Annessa Hartman. This gathering allowed us to strengthen our regional partnerships and collaborate on common issues facing our communities.

Gladstone Ad-Hoc Tree Board

The Gladstone City Council is seeking volunteers to be on the Gladstone Ad-Hoc Tree Board to provide recommendations and support in the development of a tree ordinance. The ordinance will delegate authority of all publicly owned trees, and provide guidance for tree standards in planting, removing, and maintaining city trees. These policy recommendations will include preservation, protection and management of the community forest.

Discolored Tap Water? This May Be Why



Have you ever noticed the water coming out of your faucet looks discolored? One reason for this could be due to stirred up sediment within your waterline. It's important to know that while this may be aesthetically displeasing, it is safe to drink. All waterlines collect sediment, rust and minerals.

Sediment within your pipes could have been stirred up as a result of a recent pressure change. If you have any concerns, residents are always welcome to call the Public Works Department at (503) 656-7957 to find out if there has been work around your neighborhood that could have contributed to this. If this is the case, then fortunately the problem will likely clear up on its own within a few hours.


Here are a few tips on resolving the issue quickly:

- <u>Don't run any hot water</u> as you will risk drawing sediment into your hot water tank
- Clean your faucet aerators. To do so, remove and rinse under cold water to clear large pieces of sediment and/or soak in vinegar to dissolve mineral deposits.
- While the aerators are removed, run the faucets at high pressure to flush out loose debris before putting the aerators back on. When you see that the water flowing out is clean, you can be assured that all the sediments have been removed. Beware, water coming out of faucets without aerators will gush out.
- It could take up to 15 minutes to notice an improvement in the clarity of your water. If after 15 minutes you do not notice a change, wait 30 minutes and try again.
- It would also be helpful to flush toilets and turn on the outside spigot.

Handy Dandy Note - Running your bathtub located at the furthest point from the water meter will flow water through the entire line, flushing it along the way.

Reporting Potholes

Tis the Season for Frozen Water Pipes



Cold weather means your water pipes are at risk of freezing. When water freezes in a pipe, it expands causing enough pressure to be exerted that it can potentially rupture. Repairing a pipe burst is conceivably one of the most costly home maladies a homeowner can face.

Ways to Prevent your Pipes from Freezing:

Allow a small trickle of cold water to run from your faucet. This will keep water moving in your pipes, preventing freezing.

Open under-sink cabinet doors to keep warm air circulating around pipes.

Use a small fan to help circulate air under your cabinets

External openings such as basement doors, windows and crawl spaces should be sealed with weather stripping, caulk and sealant.

Insulate external and exposed pipes with pipe insulation.

Take the time before the first freeze of the season to drain out the sprinkler system. Disconnect, drain and store all hoses and exterior water spigot.

How to Thaw Frozen Pipes:

If there is no water flowing from your faucets at all, you most likely have frozen or burst pipes. Many times, the exterior of the pipe will be frozen as well. If you know that you have a frozen pipe, take these measures to begin the thawing process.


Turn off the "Main" water valve to the house, open a faucet to allow melted water to flow through. Open the lowest hot and cold faucets in your home, i.e., basement laundry tray. Be aware that if the water to your house is shut off, it may also turn off any fire protection system you may have.

Wrap towels soaked in warm water around the pipes or purchase electric pipe warmers.

<u>DO NOT</u> use any open flame or electric heater directly to the piping as this could cause electrocution.

Call a licensed plumber.

If a pipe has broken at your property and you need assistance with temporarily shutting off your water at the meter, the Public Works Department encourages you to contact them at (503) 656-7957.




Keep pipes from freezing.

Frozen pipes can break or leak. Keep cabinet doors open to help keep pipes warm. If your pipes do freeze, thaw them with a hair dryer or heat lamp.

Gladstone Public Works: Winter Weather & Our Roadways

Snow events in Gladstone vary in severity from a dusting to inches. The variety of conditions that can occur during the snow-and-ice season in the City makes advance preparation more difficult. In addition, snow events in Gladstone will vary in severity depending upon the location where you live. Combinations of these factors and the rate and accumulation of snowfall, moisture content, presence of sleet, freezing rain or hail, temperature during and after the storm, wind velocity, time of day or night, day or days of the week, storm duration, and intervals between storms interact to make each storm unique.

Gladstone Public Works primary purpose is to provide effective use of equipment and personnel, minimize impact to the environment, help contain costs, and organize safe travel routes for emergency responders and the motoring public during winter storm events. It is the responsibility of each property owner to clear his or her driveway and all sidewalk areas adjacent to their property.



De-Icing

The City of Gladstone started utilizing magnesium chloride (MgC12) in 2019. Sourced from ODOT, it is an effective way to provide a safer road surface during winter driving conditions. Use of deicing agents help reduce the use of sand, which reduces impact on air quality, water quality and aquatic habitat. Crews will work to lay de-icer down when conditions are optimal. Weather and roadway conditions for the use of de-icing material is important to its effectiveness; it cannot be put down on a wet surface and or below temperatures of 20° .

Operations management will prioritize major arterials and other collector streets to be cleared first as to maintain efficient vehicular traffic through the city

Plowing is scheduled to begin with an accumulation of approximately 2 or more inches of snow.

Limited sanding is done during a snowfall because falling snow covers the sand and it is scraped away on subsequent plowing passes, requiring additional sanding.

Subdivision roads may not be plowed; routes will be cleared based on the sanding/plowing map.

How Can You Help?

- Be patient, be assured that during a snowstorm every reasonable effort will be made to keep roadways open. During a major snowstorm, all our operators and snow removal equipment will be on the road.
- Familiarize yourself with alternative routes in and out of your neighborhood; utilizing streets that do not have a substantial grade if possible.
- Do not attempt to stop a snowplow or obstruct its path. Plows must maintain speed for maximum efficiency.
- When approaching snow removal equipment from the rear, travel a minimum of 200 feet behind allowing for sanding and abrupt movements. DO NOT Pass unless necessary.
- Do not park along snow routes. In residential areas, leave room for plows to get through safely-if possible, park off the street.
- Do not put garbage or recycling containers in the street.

Need Trip Cost Assistance?

The Gladstone Seniors Foundation offers limited cost assistance to seniors in Gladstone. It's easy and confidential. Please call or come by the Gladstone Community Center to apply.



How Are Adventure Trip Costs Calculated?

- The Gladstone Community Center is funded by approximately 85% general fund revenues and 15% Center related revenues such as room rentals, county assistance and meal donations.
- The general fund revenue consist of resident paid property taxes along with other generalized revenues earned that are used to subsidize programs not fully supported by a direct revenue source (such as utility costs). These general fund revenues support many programs and activities, including Police, Parks, Fire and Library subsidies, administrative costs and, as stated above 85% of the annual costs incurred at the Gladstone Community Center.
- Of the 15% funding received directly by the center, about 10% comes from the Federal government, through Clackamas County, to assist with costs associated with Congregate Meals, Home Bound Meals and Senior Transportation for medical needs and daily subsistence (groceries, etc.).
- The Adventure Trips were developed to provide some recreational activities to Community Center participants, an a small scale, once a week. These trips are not part of the Federal funding, and costs were to be recovered (at least the majority) by the fees charged to the attendees.
- These fees are set by management and calculated to recover fuel, van usage and labor cost of the Tram Driver (the City makes no profit off of trips). Originally, the labor cost was only assessed at 50%, but has now been increased to full recovery. The trips are benefitting a small number of participants, and not truly eligible to be subsidized by limited general taxpayer funds; especially when a participant does not reside in Gladstone.
- The trips outlined in the monthly newsletters are calculated at the correct rates, including the full labor costs, fuel, van usage and any entrance of food costs that must be paid upfront for the entire group. These entrance and food costs should be itemized with the trip description, at the time of registration and we will work with Community Center staff to assure that occurs moving forward.
- The Gladstone Senior Foundation has graciously offered to assist certain senior participants who are unable to participate due to financial concerns, and that information should be available now at the Community Center.



Alarm Program for the City of Gladstone

In order to reduce the number of false alarms and increase time for police officers to respond to emergencies and other legitimate calls for service, the City of Gladstone has a standing Alarm Ordinance (Municipal Code, Chapter 5.60). The City of Gladstone has partnered with Alarm Program Systems, LLC/CitySupport to administer the Gladstone Alarm Program.

Existing accounts can manage their information by visiting <u>gladstoneor.citysupport.org/</u>, New accounts can register for an alarm permit by visiting <u>gladstoneor.citysupport.org/licenses</u>,

Per Ordinance, every residence or business operating an alarm system in Gladstone must obtain a permit and renew it on an annual basis.

Gladstone Back Then From Gladstone Historical Society Historian, Kim Argraves Huey



1922 Clackamas River Flood. Car stalled on 82nd. Drive between Gladstone and Oregon City.

What's a winter without a little bad weather? Cold, rain, ice, or maybe you prefer snow? Living next to the Clackamas River means there might even be a flood. During the winter of 1920-1921, the Clackamas and Willamette Rivers flooded.

While the north banks of the Clackamas River managed to contain the high water, the south banks could not hold it back. Large areas of Park Place went underwater by five feet. The basements and first floors of surrounding houses filled with muddy water. The paper mills shut down. The Chinese vegetable gardens (present-day Oregon City Shopping Center) were destroyed. And the

roadbed of the 82nd. Ave. bridge between Park Place and Gladstone barely floated above the water while flood debris pummeled its underpinnings.

The good news was that the road south of the bridge was dry for a short distance. The bad news was that the rest of the road to Oregon City was underwater. Gladstone and Oregon City residents were cut off from one another except by boat, which most agreed was a dangerous crossing at best because of all the loose logs and broken trees swirling around.

In no time, the local newspapers began extolling Willamette Falls as a 'glory to behold', a truly 'magnificent roaring plunging cataract'. Folks from Portland, having no idea of how disastrous the situation was, couldn't wait to view the 'seething torrent of water'. They hopped in their automobiles and raced for Oregon City via Gladstone.

Ignoring all the warnings (and good common sense, too, it would seem,) the excited spectators took the 82nd. Drive bridge at breakneck speeds. They slid around the first turn, went sideways around the second corner, and then plunged unexpectedly into the middle of a lake. Before they could comprehend what happened, they were submerged in the Clackamas River water up to their windshields. No amount of engine revving and tire spinning (if it was even possible) would free them. The wonder of Willamette Falls was quickly forgotten as crowds soon gathered to view the growing collection of nearly underwater automobiles with their drivers and passengers wading ashore.

Gladstonians, always a resourceful group of folks, decided not to let a good flood go to waste and turned into Sunday afternoon entrepreneurs. Cranking up their own tin lizzies or hitching up an antiquated team of horses, the gentlemen of Gladstone drove to the rescue. Along with plenty of good thick rope, they pulled and tugged the soggy autos to dry land, all the while being cheered on by the enthusiastic crowd. Towing charges ranged from \$1.00 to \$5.00. 10 Ways to Help Save Water Indoors

Indoor water usage, unlike outdoors, is largely the same year-round. That's good news, because it means a few water-saving measures can save a lot on indoor water consumption.

Here are 10 ways to help you start saving water indoors today:

- 1. Replace an older toilet with a WaterSense labeled high efficiency toilet. Older toilets can use up to 4 times more water per flush. Plus, many water providers offer rebates to help you save money when you upgrade.
- 2. Regularly check for and repair water leaks. Even small leaks can waste hundreds to thousands of gallons of water a month. Many water leaks can be fixed by a do-it-yourself plumber, and repair parts are relatively inexpensive to purchase (\$5-20).
- 3. <u>Take Shorter Showers.</u> Each minute you shave off your shower time saves up to 2.5 gallons of water.
- 4. Install an aerator on your bathroom or kitchen faucet and save about 1 gallon per minute. An aerator reduces the flow from the faucet, and uses air to maintain good water pressure.
- 5. Select an Energy Star approved clothes washer next time you purchase a new washer. They use 15-20 less gallons of water per load, and you will see savings on your energy costs too.
- 6. <u>Install a high efficiency showerhead</u>, and you could save an about 1 gallon of water per minute.
- 7. Know where your master shutoff valve is located. This could save water and prevent damage to your home.
- 8. Wash only full loads. Dishwashers use about the same amount of energy and water regardless of the number of dishes inside, so run full loads whenever possible.
- 9. Turn the sink faucet on only to rinse or use a large container filled with rinse water when washing dishes by hand. You will save about 2.5 gallons of water for every minute your faucet does not run.
- 10. <u>Scrape dishes instead of rinsing</u>. Save yourself up to 20 gallons of water by scraping food off your dishes instead of pre-rinsing them. Energy Star qualified dishwashers and today's detergents are designed to do the cleaning so you don't have to. If your dirty dishes sit overnight, use your dishwasher's rinse feature. It uses a fraction of the water needed to hand rinse.
