Celebrating Women's History Month: Trailblazing Women in Oregon's Rich History

As March ushers in the transition from winter to spring; we honor the extraordinary contributions of women throughout history. Women's History Month serves as a powerful reminder of the achievements, resilience, and impact women have had on society. In the vibrant tapestry of Oregon's history, there are exceptional women whose stories continue to inspire future generations.

Women's History Month allows us to celebrate the accomplishments of women who have broken barriers, challenged norms, and contributed significantly to their communities. In Oregon, we are fortunate to have many trailblazers who have embodied the spirit of empowerment and progress.

Trailblazing Women in Oregon's History:



Abigail Scott Duniway (1834-1915)

One of Oregon's most prominent figures in women's history, Abigail Scott Duniway, was a tireless advocate for women's suffrage. Born in Illinois, Duniway moved to Oregon in 1852. She dedicated her life to the cause of women's rights, establishing herself as a persuasive speaker and writer. In 1912, Oregon became one of the early states to grant women the right to vote, owing much to Duniway's unrelenting efforts.

Dr. Bethenia Owens-Adair (1840-1926)



A pioneering physician and advocate for women's health, Dr. Bethenia Owens-Adair made significant contributions to the medical field in Oregon. Overcoming societal expectations and challenges faced by women in the late 19th century, she became one of the first female physicians in the Pacific Northwest. Dr. Owens-Adair played a crucial role in improving healthcare for women and children and remains an inspiration for aspiring women in the medical profession.

Beatrice Morrow Cannady (1889-1974)



Beatrice Morrow Cannady was a trailblazing African American civil rights advocate who dedicated her life to fighting for racial equality and justice. Born in Texas, she moved to Oregon in 1912 and became a prominent figure in the Portland community. Cannady was the editor of The Advocate, Oregon's largest African American newspaper, where she fearlessly addressed issues of racial discrimination and inequality. Her activism laid the groundwork for future generations of civil rights leaders in the state.

Low Income Utility Assistance Program

The City of Gladstone provides residential customers a Low Income Utility Assistance Program which permits a reduced monthly charge for Water, Sewer and Storm Water services. As shown in the City's Master Fees & Charges Schedule, the reduced rates are 50% of the base rate only, for each type of utility.

Qualifications:

- A residential customer of Gladstone with one or more utility services provided by the City.
- The property is the principal residence and occupied by the applicant.
- No delinquent payments owed to the City, including utilities, court fines, and any other assessed fees or charges.
- Written application must be submitted on the City form and include all requested documentation for proof of income from all sources listed, from all income earners.
- Approval expires every year on June 30th and re-qualification must be submitted with current information annually.

The Finance Department will notify all applicants of approval or denial in writing. If denied the applicant will have the ability to appeal within ten days from the date of the denial letter.

Income Limits:

- Based upon Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits/Very Low Income Limits (50% of Median Family Income) for the Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro, OR-WA MSA as published at HUD.gov and updated annually. Limits in effect as of July l will apply for the fiscal year period.
- Income limit areas are based on the current fiscal year Fair Market Rent (FMR) areas.
- Income levels are incrementally based on households of one to eight persons.

Great progress has been made on the Public Works facility. Things continue to move along very quickly even with the snow and ice event we had in January.





A few of many milestones that have been completed include:

- Installation of all of the electrical, plumbing and HVAC.
- All of the walls have been framed and sheet rocked.
- Installation of all of the cabinetry.
- The right of way work is done.
- The curbing and sidewalks are done.
- Installation of the window and door frames and *some* of the glass.

Current construction involves:

- Installation of the drop ceilings.
- Painting on all of the interior walls.
- Installation of the lighting fixtures.

Coming next:

- Flooring to be installed.
- Paving of the parking lot.

There is still a lot to be done before the doors open to the public but construction is currently on time and within budget!

A Message from Code Compliance

Did you know if you rent a POD, you are required to obtain a permit? Gladstone Municipal Code 5.22.040(1) A permit must be obtained



from the City prior to using a portable storage container within city limits.

Gladstone Back Then From Gladstone Historical Society Historian, Kim Argraves Huey



he Brig Owyhee Photo: pre-1846

1830 was an eventful year. Dr. John McLoughlin, Chief Factor for the Hudson Bay Company, was busy canoeing up and down the Willamette River between his newly relocated Ft. Vancouver and the Willamette Falls in Oregon City. The fur trade in British Columbia and the present-day states of Oregon and Washington flourished. European trading ships were coming, going, and sometimes wrecking on the unpredictable tides and sand bars at the mouth of the Columbia River. That summer, the rig, Owyhee, decided to take a sail down the Willamette River.

The Owyhee is memorable for several unique reasons. It was the first American trading vessel to visit Ft. Vancouver and join the competitive fur trade. Also, when the Owyhee arrived, it brought the first peach trees from the Spanish South Seas to Ft. Vancouver. Several decades before the

Hudson Bay employees of Ft. Vancouver and Oregon City munched on apples, pears, or oranges, sticky peach juice dripped down their chins. Finally, the Owyhee was the first ocean-going vessel to drop anchor in the Willamette River opposite present-day Gladstone. Captain Dominis had planned to sail to Willamette Falls, but the Clackamas Rapids proved a little too daunting. Instead, he parked the Owyhee near Clackamas Point, before he and the crew took off in small boats for an overnight trip to see the mighty falls.

So, what happened when the captain and crew were away? The Owyhee hosted a party of Clackamas Indians. A mostly mischievous and somewhat angry group of the Clackamas People decided to turn the ship loose. During the previous three decades, the lower Columbia River Basin and Willamette Valley had fallen victim to several severe smallpox epidemics. The Clackamas knew that the white explorers and traders had brought the sickness, so they reasoned that if the white men's ship disappeared, the white men would leave, too.

During the night, the Clackamas Indians cut the anchor rope on the Owyhee and then crept back to their beds in their longhouses. The next day, when Captain Dominis and crew returned to the Clackamas Rapids, they discovered their boat was gone. It was full of furs and other trading supplies destined for the Orient! Fearing the Owyhee was well on its way to Ft. Vancouver, the ocean, or run aground on a sandbar and wrecked, a frantic Captain and crew rowed down the Willamette River hoping they weren't too late to save their ship. So, what happened to the missing Owyhee? The question will be answered next month. In the meantime, don't forget to view the Clackamas Tribe slideshow and longhouse display at Gladstone's Civic Center (City Hall). The indigenous dwellings were crafted by Kraxberger teacher Amy Otto's seventh-grade history students and the attention to detail is amazing! Be sure to remove the roofs and look inside the houses but be very quiet when you do. Some of the people are sleeping, especially the papooses. Also, check out the ferry and canoes. The Gladstone Police Department has responded to several overdose incidents related to Fentanyl over that last couple of years. There seems to be a lot of information out regarding this drug, however, we

Counterfeit pills are extremely dangerous because people purchasing them may think they purchasing legitimate prescription care. Here are some facts about Fentanyl that we medications. However, these fake pills may contain lethal amounts of fentanyl.

> Distributors in the US are selling counterfeit pills on social media, appealing to a younger, more opioid naïve audience that use these apps. Opioid naïve individuals are at high risk of accidental overdose because they do not have a tolerance for opioids, may not have access to naloxone, and may not know how to decrease overdose risk.

> the likelihood of a fatal overdose. Naloxone is an opioid antagonist that rapidly reverses the effects of an opioid overdose. With a fentanyl overdose, two or more doses of naloxone may need to be administered. Always call 911 in the event of a suspected overdose.

Studded tire season runs through April 1, 2024. ODOT encourages drivers to consider other types of traction tires or chains. If you must travel when weather conditions are difficult, use other types of traction tires or chains, or postpone your

travel until conditions change for the better.

Alternatives to studded tires: *Chains—link chains, cable chains or other devices that attach to the wheel, vehicle or outside of the tire that are specifically designed to increase traction on snow and ice. Drivers should note that link chains may not be recommended for use on some types of vehicles. *Other traction tires—these traction tires meet Rubber Manufacturers Association standards for use in severe snow conditions and carry a special symbol on the tire sidewall showing a three-peaked mountain and snowflake. They work about as well as studded tires on ice, but work better than studded tires or regular tires in most other winter conditions. And they cause no more damage to road surfaces than regular tires.

How to Recognize a Phone Scam

Phone scams are becoming more and more common as scammers have figured out countless ways to cheat you out of your money. The scammer may act friendly and helpful or be threatening and try to scare you. People have lost a lot of money, sometimes even their live savings. The Gladstone Police Department would like to help arm you with tips on how to recognize a phone scam so you do not become the scammers next victim.

Phone scams come in many forms, but they tend to make similar promises and threats, or ask you to pay certain ways. Here's how to recognize a phone scam.

- There is no prize- The caller might say you were "selected" for an offer or that you've won a lottery. But if you have to pay to get the prize, it's not a prize.
- You won't be arrested- Scammers might pretend to be law enforcement or a federal agency. They might say you'll be arrested, fined, or deported if you don't pay taxes or some other debt right away. The goal is to scare you into paying. But real law enforcement and federal agencies won't call and threaten vou.
- You don't need to decide now- Most legitimate businesses will give you time to think their offer over and get written information about it before asking you to commit. Take your time. Don't get pressured into making a decision on the spot.
- There's never a good reason to send cash or pay with a gift card- Scammers will often ask you to pay in a way that makes it hard for you to get your money back — by wiring money, putting money on a gift card, prepaid card or cash reload card, or using a money transfer app. Anyone who asks you to pay that way is a scammer.
- •Government agencies won't call to confirm your sensitive information- It's never a good idea to give out sensitive information like your Social Security number to someone who calls you unexpectedly, even if they say they're with the Social Security Administration or IRS.
- •You shouldn't be getting all those calls- If a company is selling something, it needs your written permission to call you with a robocall. And if you're on the National Do Not Call Registry, you shouldn't get live sales calls from companies you haven't done business with before. Those calls are illegal. If someone is already breaking the law calling you, there's a good chance it's a scam. At the very least, it's a company you don't want to do business with.



Fentanyl has proven to be a much stronger narcotic that should be avoided unless prescribed under professional medical are have obtained from the Oregon Health Authority:

illicitly manufactured fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that can be up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. Because it is an illicit substance, its potency can change depending on the batch. It is a major contributor to fatal and nonfatal overdoses in the US, including Oregon.

Powdered fentanyl looks just like many other Fentanyl mixed with drugs or alcohol increases drugs that come in powder form. In Oregon, we have seen white and colored powdered fentanyl. It is commonly mixed with drugs like heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine and made into pills that are made to resemble other prescription opioids such as oxycodone. Fentanyl-laced drugs are extremely dangerous, and many people may be unaware that their drugs are laced with fentanyl. It is nearly impossible to tell if drugs have been laced with fentanyl without the use of fentanyl test strips because fentanyl cannot be seen, smelled, or tasted. Oregon is experiencing an influx of counterfeit pills that contain fentanyl. Many of



March 18 - 24 is Fix a Leak Week!

Finding and fixing leaks at home is a quick and easy way to save water and money. Household leaks waste more than one trillion gallons of water nationwide each year, from visible faucet drips to silent toilet leaks. Get in the habit of checking your whole house for leaks at least twice a year. If you already check your smoke and carbon monoxide



detectors twice annually, add this to your list! In 20 minutes you can do your part to help save water at home. If we all do our part to use water wisely at home throughout the region, together we can make a real difference.


Get started by learning where to find leaks at home and then head to the bathroom!

Toilet leaks are common, but may be silent and easy to miss. Take 20 minutes to celebrate Fix a Leak Week by checking your toilet for leaks with these 5 easy steps:

- 1. Remove the toilet tank lid.
- 2. Drop one dye tablet, strip, or 10 drops of food coloring into the tank.
- 3. Put the lid back on. Do not flush.
- 4. Wait 20 minutes.
- 5. Check your toilet bowl. If you see colored water, you have a leak. If not, you don't.

Backflow FAQ's & Why is Backflow Testing Required?



What is Backflow? When pressure in a water system isn't maintained, the risk for water to flow backward the water svstem and is greatly contaminated increased. Backflow testing monitors the health and safety mechanisms designed to protect water purity. testing helps prevent water contamination or pollution. What is this "test due" notice I keep receiving? Why do I have to do this? It is a reminder for you to get your backflow assembly tested. It is an important annual test that helps make sure the public drinking water remains clean and safe.

I did this last year. Why am I getting this notice again? Because Backflow Assemblies are mechanical units they must be regularly checked to ensure they are in working condition.

What is a backflow assembly? A backflow assembly is used to protect potable water supplies from contamination or pollution due to backflow. These are often found connected to sprinkler systems and fire systems.

Do I need a backflow preventer on my sprinkler system? YES, sprinkler system backflow prevention devices are safety mechanisms to prevent contaminants from entering water supplies. Irrigation backflow devices are designed for installation on potable water lines to protect against both back-siphonage and backpressure of contaminated water into the potable water supply.

What is a cross-connection? A cross-connection is a "link" between drinking water and a system or fixture that carries or contains something other than drinking water. An example would be a garden hose lying in a hot tub.

Scoop the Poop!

Gladstone Public Works Needs Your Help to Keep Our Water System Clean!

The current weather forecast typically involves rain. In Gladstone this water washes off the land and into the storm water system. Our storm systems drain water away from the City and into our local rivers. Along the way, it picks up pollutants, some of which you may not realize is considered a pollutant.

Bacteria is a natural component of lakes, rivers, and streams. Most of these bacterial agents are harmless, but some have the potential to cause sickness and disease in humans, pets, and other animals. Research conducted by Clean Water Services of Washington County found that, on average, 63% of E. coli bacteria contamination in streams originated from waterfowl and canine sources, i.e: Ducks and Dogs!

Gladstone Public Works encourages everyone to please pick up after your dog. It is essentially raw sewage and should not be left anywhere on the ground. In addition to E. coli, dog waste can contain harmful organisms such as Leptospira and roundworms. These organisms can be very serious to both humans and pets, and can be carried into your home after walking through yards or parks where

animal waste has been present. This same bacteria can wash into streams and rivers causing pollution.

Gladstone Public Works provides doggy-doo bags in all our parks to make cleaning up after your pets convenient for you. We appreciate everyone doing their part to help keep our city clean and green.



Spills and Leaks

Spills and leaks from contaminants, can be dangerous if left unattended. In addition, spilled chemicals can also pollute our streams and underground drinking water supplies, as well as harm pets, plants and wildlife.

Prevention is Key!

- •Keep unused containers closed tightly.
- •Store materials inside or under cover.
- Never use storm drains or gutters, ditches, or swales for waste disposal.
- •Keep waste container lids closed.

Possible Contaminants Include:

- Oil
- Paint
- Gas
- Pesticides
- Antifreeze

Spills Happen!

Your safety is of utmost importance in addressing spills and leaks. Stop work and move upwind immediately if you feel any symptoms (nausea, coughing, stinging eyes, nose or throat, dizziness). Call for help.

Call 911 if the spill is hazardous or an emergency.

If you are aware of the origin of the spill and it is not an emergency:

- •Try to stop the leak if you can safely. Keep people and vehicles away to prevent contact with the spilled substance. Use a drip pan if you spot a leak or drip; repair the leak promptly.
- Turn off any nearby equipment that could ignite a flame or explosion.
- •Never hose down a spill this can send hazardous pollutants to our waters.
- Protect waterways: Place absorbents such as kitty litter and barriers between the spill and any nearby storm drain, ditch or swale. Clean up the spill immediately.




