Drug Take Back, Shred-it and E-Recycling Day



Gladstone's Drug Take Back, Shred-it and E-Recycling Day will take place on Saturday May 18th from 10:00 am - 2:00 pm in the Gladstone Civic Center parking lot, 18505 Portland Ave (parking lot is located off Duniway Avenue).

This is a great time to start your spring cleaning with one stop right here in Gladstone! Volunteers will be available to help unload.

Drug Take Back: Turn in your leftover prescriptions, old over-the-counter & pet medicines and get them disposed of safely.

Shredding: Bring your old documents to have them shredded. You never have to worry about your old documents & personal papers once they've been shredded. **10 Boxes of shred accepted - you must take your empty boxes with you.

E-Recycling: Kraxburger Gearheads Robotics Club will be onsite collecting equipment you don't want or use anymore such as computers, cell phones, cords, routers, small metal items, TV's that are

32" or smaller, laptops, blenders, toasters- anything with a cord. The Robotics Club tears down and recycle 95% of the product that comes in. All products are then sorted and shipped to either RS Davis Recycling or Universal Recycling Technology. All profits from e-recycling are used to fund the Kraxberger Robotics Club.



Free Meldrum Bar Parking Pass are available for Gladstone Residents

It only takes 3 easy steps for a Gladstone residents to apply and receive an annual parking pass (2 per address) for Meldrum Bar Park:

- 1. Visit the Gladstone Civic Center at 18505 Portland Ave.
- 2. Please bring a piece of mail with your name and Gladstone address as well as a valid picture ID.
- 3. You will be asked to complete a short application and will receive your passes at that time.

For residents who pay the City of Gladstone directly for water, sewer, stormwater- renewal passes will be mailed to the address on file by the first of the month that your pass expires.

Non-residents can purchase an annual or daily pass at the kiosk as you enter Meldrum Bar Park Annual passes may also be purchased by visiting the Gladstone Civic Center.

History of the Gladstone Newsletter

Starting on November 18, 1985, the image was changed into the Pow Wow Tree. Printed on legal sixed paper changing colors each month. This was used until March 15, 1990.

The Pow Wow Tree, also known as a Bigleaf Maple, is thought to be over 240 years old. It is believed to have been a traditional meeting place for the Clackamas native Americans. The tree can still be found on Clackamas River Blvd., between Beatrice Ave and Bellevue Ave.

Hanging Tree Branches

Public Works is asking residents to trim tree branches by cutting branches seven feet (7) above sidewalks and fourteen feet (14') above streets. Please cut your branches and place them in your yard debris cart. If Public Works determines there is a risk of damage or injury, they may cut your tree branches without notice. During winter months, please remove portable basketball hoops from city streets to reduce interference with street sweeping.

Wildfire Prevention Month

In Oregon, May is designated as Wildfire Awareness Month. Clackamas Fire District is engaged in a month-long campaign to encourage, empower, and inform the community to help prevent and prepare for wildfire.

There are many things you can do to be prepared for wildfire. One of which is following Clackamas Fire District's Ready, Set, Go program. Get READY before wildfire happens, is the first step in protecting yourself and your property from the threat of wildfire. Begin in the spring by creating defensible space around your home and property. Defensible space is a 100-foot buffer zone between your home and the surrounding wildland area.

Getting SET means creating and preparing your wildfire action plan. The plan will be unique to your family and should include everyone even your pets. The plan is a check list that includes different evacuation routes and emergency meeting locations.

Wildfires are unpredictable, move quickly, and change direction without warning. When a wildfire approaches your home, it is time to GO! When you evacuate early, you give your family the best chance of surviving; you also may avoid getting caught in smoke, fire, and traffic jams. Also important in a wildfire emergency, is to stay informed. Pay attention to news and information from local authorities and sign up for emergency notifications at Clackamas County Public Alerts.

The threat of wildfire in our area is real. By following the Ready, Set, Go program, you can help your family increase their chances of surviving a wildfire emergency. For more information, visit https://clackamasfire.com/readyset-go/.



Create Defensible Space

Defensible space is the space between a structure and the wildland area that, under normal conditions, creates a sufficient buffer to slow or halt the spread of wildfire to a structure. It protects the home from igniting, due to direct flame or radiant heat. Defensible space is essential for structure survivability during wildfire conditions and improves the safety of firefighters in defending your home.



- O feet around your home or

Eliminate Ladder Fuels

Ladder fuels are those that will allow the fire to climb from the surface fuels into the upper portion of the tree. They can be eliminated by increasing horizontal and vertical separation between vegetation. Consider alternatives to backyard burning, such as chipping.

Safe Sidewalks

Everyone has a right to expect Gladstone sidewalks to be in good condition and free of defects in order to prevent possible injury. Well-maintained sidewalks help create a vibrant community. Unfortunately, tree roots, ground settlement, freezing weather, and other acts of nature can damage sidewalks. Property owners are responsible for maintaining the sidewalk and planting strip abutting their property. This includes keeping sidewalks clear of debris such as leaves, ice, snow, weeds, and overgrown shrubs. Trees must be pruned to allow safe pedestrian and vehicle passage. A defective sidewalk is one that creates an unreasonable risk of danger to persons or property. For example, if a portion of the sidewalk is elevated enough to cause someone to trip, it is considered an unreasonable risk

The Gladstone Municipal Code, 8.04.100 states that maintenance of sidewalks, curbs, and driveways is the responsibility of the abutting property owners. Any vertical uplift exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ inch is a violation of city code and the sidewalk must be repaired. Contact Code Compliance at 503-557-2763 or if you have any questions.

Gardening, Pesticides and Fertilizers

Spring is here and many residents are enjoying the spring weather working in their gardens. Products can help your lawn and garden look great, but if used and disposed of improperly, they can harm beneficial bugs, plants, soil microbes and ultimately, our streams and rivers. Remember to follow these steps when using pesticides and fertilizers:

- BUY—think before you buy;
- \bullet USE—Use only what you need and
- DISPOSE—Not down the drain.

Picnics/Parties at Gladstone City Parks




Gladstone parks have been the site of many picnics and birthday parties.

Oregon 811- It's Free. It's Easy. It's the Law



What is Oregon 811? A state of the art one-call system for any

company or person doing any type of digging to contact to process a locate request to have the underground lines marked out prior to

shallow jobs are a risk if you don't know where utilities are buried. Call 811 any time you dig, for any type of project.

Who Marks the Lines? Utility companies (NOT 811) mark their own lines. 811 is the communication network that notifies these companies to respond to a locate request. Some utility members use contract locating companies to mark their lines. Member companies are not responsible to mark privately owned facilities.

Why Should I Call Oregon 811? There are over 20 million miles of underground facilities in the U.S. alone. Damaging an underground facility is dangerous for you and for the people around you. A broken pipe or cable may cause outages, expensive repairs, and legal problems. A safe

digging project must always start by contacting 811, either by phone or online.

How Far in Advance do I contact 811? At least 2 full business days and not more than 10 business days prior to excavation, contact 811 call center by dialing 811, calling 1-800-332-2344, or by going online to www.digsafelyoregon.com

What Information do I need? When you call, When should I call Oregon 811? Even small, you will be asked a series of questions about your worksite. Being prepared greatly speeds up the process! Please have this information ready:

- •Your name, phone number, company name (if applicable), and mailing address.
- •The name and phone number of an alternate contact person, in case the utilities have questions and cannot reach you.
- •What type of work is being done.
- Who the work is being done for.
- •The county and city where the work is taking
- •If no address is provided, cross street, distance, and direction are required.
- Marking instructions (specific instructions as to where the work is taking place).

Pressure Washing and Surface Cleaning

What's the problem? Although convenient for cleaning surfaces and equipment, pressure washing can send dirty runoff containing oil, soap, chemicals, metals, and sediment into the storm drain system. Most storm drains have zero to minimal treatment and drain directly toward the surface water and groundwater we all need to

Here's how our waters are being negatively impacted: Sediment clouds the water, hinders aquatic plant growth, and clogs fish gills.

Even biodegradable soaps rob water of life-giving oxygen. Household hazardous wastes, like pesticides, paints, solvents, and auto fluids that collect on driveways and other outside surfaces can poison aquatic life. Animals and people can become sick or die after consuming polluted water or fish.

Ingestion of pre-1978 paint flakes containing lead can be a concern as it can result in intellectual disabilities in

Avoid using hot water and chemicals as that type of wastewater has a greater negative environmental effect.

What can you do? Use dry cleanup methods first (sweep, blow, vacuum). Dispose of debris in the trash.

Soak up oil and fluids using absorbents (cat litter, sawdust, sand) and dry-cleanup methods before washing. This, too, goes in the trash.

Direct dirty runoff into a lawn or landscaped area away from the storm drain system.

(If wash water cannot be directed to landscaped areas, collect for disposal to the sanitary sewer via a clean out, toilet, or sink.)

Follow EPA lead paint guidelines if pre-1978 era paint is involved.

Specialized Equipment Can Help. Berms, storm drain covers or mats, sump or vacuum pumps, wet vacuums, filtering or absorbent equipment such as socks, booms, bags of absorbent bark chips, etc. can help prevent dirty water from entering the storm drain or allow for collection before it does.

Avoid Violations! Polluted discharges from any property that enter a storm drain system are considered an illicit discharge violation and are subject to enforcement. If you are using hot water or chemicals, this water is not allowed to enter storm drains without an Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) permit.

Service Line Inventory

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) along with Oregon Health Authority Drinking Water Services (OHA -DWS) is requiring all public water systems to conduct an inventory of the water service line coming into, and out of, each water meter in their territory.

You may have already noticed Public Works staff in your neighborhood inspecting the water meter outside of your property. Does your water meter have letters painted on it? That means the necessary information has been collected. The markings are an abbreviation of the type of pipe at each connection.



C = Copper G = Galvanized PO = Poly (Polyethylene) X or PEX = Cross-Linked Polyethylene PVC = Polyvinyl Chloride

Inventory is due to be submitted in October so you'll likely see crew around the city gathering this information through the summer.

Gladstone Back Then From Gladstone Historical Society Historian, Kim Argraves Huey

What did Gladstonians do a hundred years ago when winter rolled away and spring sprung? As soon as the weather warmed, folks rushed out the door to picnic and play baseball. The people of Gladstone love picnics so much that they planned outdoor dining events for every occasion they could think of. Engagement picnics. Social club picnics. Picnics to celebrate the beginning of fishing season. Family reunion picnics. May Day picnics. Sunday School picnics. Picnics to celebrate the opening of

a new road. And last but far from least, MASSIVE Fourth of July picnics in Gladstone Park. For three decades, Gladstone Park held private, patriotic, community, and county-wide picnics, most followed by a baseball game in the park's athletic field.

Baseball evolved from an older bat-and-ball game called "rounders". Already being played in England by the mid-1700s, immigrants brought the game to the US, where the modern version of baseball developed.

By the 1850s, baseball was a national craze. In 1876, game rules were standardized, and baseball swung into being America's favorite summer pastime, equaled only by attendance at a Chautauqua Assembly. The two were a match made in heaven. After a morning filled with classes and lectures, there was nothing better than grabbing a box lunch, finding a seat in the grandstands, and watching the boys line up to bat and run bases. Every day of the Gladstone Park Chautauqua (except Sunday), a baseball game was played at 3:30 pm in the athletic field and attended by thousands. Teams from as far away as Portland and Eugene applied to play at Chautauqua and win the trophy, but only five of the best teams were accepted each year. Almost always, one of those teams was the Chemawa Indian School. Besides having a top-notch orchestra and choir that performed regularly at the assembly, Chemawa had a nearly unbeatable baseball team, much to the dismay of the local Gladstone baseball teams who played against them.

However, one Chautauqua baseball game surpassed all the others in turning the enormous crowd "insane in their enthusiasm"! In 1917, the Kirkpatricks (believed to be a family team) played Wilsonville (town residents), in a nail-biter competition.

During the game, Wilsonville's Henry Hasselbrink stole three bases after beating out three bunts, got a clean single in five times at bat, and scored two of the four runs made by his Still, all seemed lost for Wilsonville until Henry, the one-armed, right-field phenomenon, decided to work his magic. In the game's final inning, Henry put out two of the Kirkpatricks. Then, wearing a glove on his only hand, he caught the ball in his glove, pulled off his glove without dropping the ball, and made a perfect throw from right field that cut off a Kirkpatrick runner at third base. Wilsonville beat the Kirkpatricks 4-3, and the Chautauqua Crowd lost their minds. Baseball remained the most popular athletic event at the Gladstone Park Chautauqua until its close in 1927. 

Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court.
