*Lock It Up! Lock It Up! Lock It Up!: If you've got something you don't want somebody else to take, lock it up. That means you don't leave anything visible in your car that could tempt a break in. Be sure to lock your car every time you leave it. Lock the windows and doors of your home, especially when you're away and at night. Confirm your business is locked up tight when the last person goes home. Now that summer is here, we get even more calls from folks who've had something taken when it's put someplace that's not appropriately locked. The best way for you to safeguard your important things is to put them away and that also means locked up. Make it really, really hard for someone to take your things away from you.

*The Gladstone Fire Dept. is proud to announce that five more personnel recently completed the rigorous Blue Card Incident Command training program and are now certified commanders for local fire and rescue incidents. Blue Card is an accredited command training program consisting of 40+ hours of interactive online training, followed by an intense three-day simulation lab at Concordia University where students are challenged with multiple scenarios including house fires, apartment fires, strip mall fires, and large commercial fires. Those recently completing their Blue Card certification are: Assistant Chief Stan Monte, Lieutenant Kirk Stempel, instructions during this momentary de-Lieutenant/Engineers

Smith, John Cerda, and Barry Schafer. "We now have twelve personnel that have achieved Blue Card certification, ' said Gladstone Fire Chief Tom O'Connor, a certified Blue Card Instructor. "I am thrilled that our fire officers are getting such a high level of training, they are truly a dedicated group."

Stop for Emergency Vehicles: Gladstone's fire engine has to back off Portland Ave in order to park in our fire station facing the street. Please remember when emergency vehicles display flashing lights Oregon law requires motorists to slow and pull over to the right. When the fire engine is backing off Portland Ave into the fire station, DO NOT DRIVE BEHIND THE FIRE ENGINE OR INTO ONCOMING TRAFFIC. Our fire engines have no other option than to stop all traffic for about 30 seconds for the engine to back off the street. For your safety, as well as our firefighters, please obey firefighter Phil lay. Thank you.

New Utility Billing Software/Changes

The City recently converted their utility billing software to Incode/Tyler Technologies. With this conversion comes some changes to our billing. Bi-monthly utility bill statements will remain in a postcard format and late notices/shut-off notices will continue to be generated in an 8 1/2" x 11" format. However, effective July 1st, all residents will be assessed a \$5.00 per month stormwater fee (see stormwater related article on next page) and any account not paid by the due date will be assessed a \$7.00 late fee. Payments may continue to mailed in or paid in person at City Hall, by check, cash or credit card (VISA, MasterCard & Discover). Credit card payments may also be made online at http://www.ci.gladstone.or.us/gladstone- online-payments/ or by calling 503-305-9030. You must provide your utility billing account number when making an online or phone payment and a convenience fee will be added to your transaction. Prior to completing your transaction you will be advised of the charge.

Planning Commission Meeting

At its meeting on June 20th beginning at 6:30 pm, the Planning Commission will continue discussion of a public hearing on file #Z0236-17-D—a proposed 52 unit apartment development on property located at 1180 Beatrice Ave (at Beatrice south of Abernethy Lane). Proposed Changes to GMC

A variety of changes to Gladstone's Municipal Ordinance Code are being considered. The topics currently under review include: •Use of membrane structures; • Storage of vehicles on private property; •Adopting a registration process for vacant buildings; •Public drinking; •Graffiti revisions; •Some traffic regulations. You can find the full text of proposed changes on the city website. Printed copies will be available to review at the library and senior center. The Council is planning to conduct a final review of these proposed changes at their July 11th meeting.

Nuisances

Similar to most cities, Gladstone administers a "nuisance code" that essentially prohibits conditions that may affect public health or safety. For example, unsanitary & unsafe conditions such as accumulations of debris or rubbish or storage of junk, obstructing clear vision at intersections are prohibited by the nuisance code. A public nuisance may also be caused by any fence, dam or other obstruction of any kind in a natural water course that could back up water & significantly affect other property or improved public street. Free Landscape Water Audit

Clackamas River Water Providers are offering free landscape water audits. Water use more than doubles during the summer months due to outdoor watering. Higher than normal outdoor water use is often a sign of inefficient use of water in our yards or in an irrigation system that needs repair and scheduling adjustments. A landscape water audit is a way to get your irrigation system and landscape on track and running right. The Landscape auditor will assess your lawn & garden areas, irrigation system & more. Residential landscape water audit kits often include, but are not limited to: *A walk through your yard & gardens including all lawn; *Making note of existing soil types, plant material, naturally available water & sun exposure; *Locating water meter, noting any existing leaks from meter throughout the irrigation system; *Locating irrigation controller, making note of make/model & current schedule, each zone will be ran separately, recording gallons per minute used for each zone. When audit is complete you will receive a detailed report with all recommendations recorded. Clackamas River Water Providers will provide free landscape water audits during spring & summer months only. Audits available on first come first serve basis. Audits will be approx. 1.5 hours. 

*Gladstone Set to Fix Chronic Stormwater-Sewer Overflow Issues: Gladstone is taking several giant steps to address longstanding deficiencies in the City's stormwater infrastructure that



result in chronic sewer overflows that put public health and the environment at risk. During storms, the rainwater enters sewer pipes and mixes with untreated sewage. That combined sewage/stormwater then overflows onto local streets and into the Clackamas River and other local streams. Those events lead to regulatory violations which can result in stiff fines. "We have run out of time to do something," said Gladstone's Public Works Director Jim Whynot. On June 13th, the City Council is scheduled to consider establishing a stormwater utility, while also enacting Gladstone's first stormwater fee and system development charge (SDC). Without these additional funds, Gladstone lacks the resources to maintain, operate, and upgrade the

stormwater system to prevent sewer overflows and avoid costly regulatory violations. With Council's action, Gladstone becomes the final city in the metro area to initiate a stormwater utility and fee to proactively manage the quality and quantity of stormwater in our city. The new stormwater fee will be phased-in, starting below the level in peer communities — to begin on July 1st, households will pay \$5 per month in the first year. Businesses will pay a proportionate amount depending on their impervious surface (the area covered by roofs, parking, and other hard surfaces that do not absorb water). The City is committed to maintaining and fixing the stormwater system and keeping it affordable for all customers. Other funding options being pursued are grants, partnerships, and low interest loans from

What Does "Flushable" Really Mean, Anyway?

As all parents know, a lot of things can be flushed, but that doesn't mean they should be. Legos, crayons, small toys, can be flushed. But, would you call them "flushable"? And, the same is true with many products that are marketed as "flushable," such as baby wipes, toilet bowl scrubbers, etc. Yes, these items can fit down the pipe when flushed, but they are not biodegradable. Some areas have even enacted regulations to prevent companies from advertising these products as "flushable." Clackamas County Water Environment Services (WES) is the department that treats and cleans wastewater from Gladstone and several other cities at its Tri-City facility in Oregon City. WES estimates that it spends \$38,000 per year removing "flushable" wipes from their machinery. The wipes entangled themselves together until they become as large as a bed sheet and wind throughout the machinery, requiring countless labor hours in manual removal by plant operators. Keeping these items out of the sewers helps to keep our sewage treatment costs down. If you have any questions, please call our Public Works Department at 503-656-7957.

Transportation System Plan (TSP) Update

The Gladstone TSP update, which will identify the City's priorities for improving the transportation system over the next 25 years, is in its final stages of development. After a series of meetings with the project advisory committees, the Planning Commission and City Council, and two public meetings/open houses, the draft TSP document is currently underway. Streamline Vegetation Helps Keep Our Waterways Clean & Healthy



Rinearson Creek is an urban stream that flows through portions of the City of Gladstone, and outfalls into the Willamette River. Gladstone Public Works is required by the City's DEQ Stormwater Permit to promote the health and maintenance of Rinearson Creek. Gladstone residents have a vested interest in ensuring that this creek, and all our waterways maintain temperature and pollution

control for the fish, turtles and other wildlife that depend on these waterways for their survival. The confluence of Rinearson Creek & the Willamette provides essential rearing habitat for migrating salmon & steelhead, but pollution from roads and parking lots can harm these juvenile fish. Also, a lack of vegetation can raise the temperature of water through the reduction of shade. High water temperatures can create conditions which choke out oxygen and create unfavorable conditions for many aquatic creatures. One organization that helps to manage the quality of Rinearson Creek is the North Clackamas Urban Watersheds Council (NCUWC). NCUWC, through their Streamside Stewards Program (SSP), works with various entities and private landowners to improve the habitat of Rinearson, Boardman, River Forest, Mt. Scott and Kellogg Creeks. The focus of the SSP is to help maintain native streamside vegetation and remove invasive plants to create sufficient shading which keeps creeks cool enough for the fish and other wildlife to flourish, as well as to provide erosion control. Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs, locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court.
