Downtown Revitalization Plan By Jacque M. Betz, City Administrator



Last year the City of Gladstone initiated a process to bring about revitalization of a segment of Portland Avenue, the civic heart and local commercial center of the community. On December 19th the Planning Commission will review the conceptual plan and consider recommending that the City Council approve it on January 9th.

The Gladstone Downtown Revitalization Plan presents a future vision of renewed business activity, investment, and connectivity for pedestrians, bikes, and vehicles (see side box for more on the vision). A thoughtful public outreach

process allowed citizens numerous opportunities to provide input. Residents, business owners, city staff, and officials provided vital comments through citizen and technical advisory groups, stakeholders meetings, two public open houses, and on-line surveys.

There are many benefits to adopting this plan; a revitalized downtown in Gladstone can positively affect economic growth and civic pride when the focus is to retain a sense of community. A healthy downtown can enhance jobs for existing

small businesses, who are the building blocks of a thriving economy. Strip centers and malls are too expensive for entrepreneurs and patrons and deter from the small-town ambience. A vibrant main street helps create the environment for a strong business community and reduces sprawl by concentrating retail in one area, and uses community resources wisely, such as infrastructure, tax dollars, and land. A traditional downtown is ideal for unique independent businesses, which in turn keeps profits in town, supports local families with family owned businesses, supports local community projects, and can provide a local economic foundation. A healthy downtown core also protects property values in surrounding residential neighborhoods and; finally, a revitalized downtown provides an important civic forum, where members of the community can congregate. Parades, special events and celebrations are held and reinforce an intangible sense of community.

A significant component of the Plan hinges on public investment in Portland Avenue, particularly as it relates to streetscape improvements. I believe public entities should take the lead in investing in themselves if they expect private entities to do same. With the library lawsuit now settled it gives the City an amazing opportunity to collaborate with the County on a public investment in the heart of Gladstone. We can initiate revitalization by constructing a new library. We invite you to attend the Planning Commission and City Council meetings in November and December and encourage you to review the draft plan at www.ci.gladstone.or.us/community/project/gladstone-downtown-revitalization-plan.

Gladstone Police Department (GPD) News

At Gladstone Police Department, we pride ourselves on being vested members of this great community. We recently completed a body of work, at the direction of our citizens and council, to modernize our municipal code. It is our goal to enhance livability in our community, and these proposals now before council can be viewed on the city website (https://www.ci.gladstone.or.us/ police/page/proposed-changes-codeenforcement-language).

Last week, we began our newest partnership supporting Neighborhood Watch. I met with a group of citizens who desired to initiate a watch program and was impressed by the interest and amount of support. Neighborhood Watch has not been in the forefront for many years here in Gladstone, and we seek to revitalize the concept. Neighborhood Watch is a partnership between the community and the police. It is a key component in the sharing of information in the effort to reduce crime and increase the quality of life in the community. A watch program will: teach techniques to citizens to reduce the risk of being victimized, train citizens to recognize and report suspicious behavior, keep your homes more secure, and provide an opportunity to get to know your neighbors better. Neighborhood watch groups are the extra set of eyes and ears that help protect the neighborhood from crime.

If you want to partner with GPD to have Neighborhood Watch in your area, please call Detective Graves or Chief Jolley.

Distracted driving includes anything that takes your mind off of the task at handdriving. These can include eating, drinking, rubber-necking at accident scenes, looking at that person walking down the street, and, of course, cell phones. Texting takes a driver's eye off the road for an average of 4.6 seconds. Keep in mind, an automobile traveling at 45 miles per hour will travel 304 feet in those 4.6 seconds! According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; each day in the United States, approximately 9 people are killed and more than 1,000 injured in crashes that are reported to involve a distracted driver. To help reduce these numbers, Oregon has implemented a new distracted driving law which went into effect Oct. 1, 2017. It will now be illegal to drive while holding or using an electronic device (e.g. cell phone, tablet, GPS, laptop). Use of hands-free devices are allowed, if the driver is 18 years of age or older, but must be a single touch or swipe to activate or deactivate the device. Drivers are allowed to call for medical help, but only when parked safely. It is not legal to use the device when stopped at a stop light, stop sign, in traffic, etc. Fines will increase to a presumptive fine of \$260 for the first offense (if not contributing to a crash), and \$435 for the second offense (or first offense, if it contributed to a crash). Committing a third offense within a 10-year period will be considered a Class B misdemeanor with a minimum fine of \$2,000 and up to one year in jail! Please pay attention at all times when in control of a vehicle.

<u>RATS!</u> IF YOU FEED THEM, THEY WILL COME!

With the exception of Antarctica, rats, mice and other vermin are dispersed across every continent on the globe. Yet, even in Antarctica, a rat eradication program is helping to protect that region's ecosystem from rats migrating in from the Falkland Islands.

The life expectancy of the common brown rat is only three years. But because rats reach sexual maturity at only five weeks, one female rat can produce nearly one litter per month, if the environment is favorable, birthing up to 14 offspring in each litter. One pair of rats can become 15,000 rats in a single year. This astounding extrapolation makes it clear that vermin are a health and environmental con-

breeding pair of rats can become 15,000 rats in a single year. This astounding extrapolation makes it clear that vermin are a health and environmental concern, making rat control an ongoing endeavor all around the world.

Western Oregon has many species of rats and mice that call our region home. One species is the Norway Rat, also known as the common rat, brown rat, and wharf rat. It is believed that these rats were spread around the world by infiltrating early ship travel and whaling boats. The Norway Rat is highly acclimated to urban living in close proximity to humans. Rats are opportunistic and will migrate to areas that provide them with food and shelter. Human activity inadvertently creates the ideal environment for the common rat to live and breed. In urban and suburban neighborhoods such as we have in Gladstone, gardens, fruit trees, backyard chicken coops, bird and squirrel feeders, pet food and feces, trash, lumber piles, stacked firewood, open trash receptacles, all make life very easy for rats and mice to take up residence. Overgrown yards provide cover for vermin to hide from their natural predators such as cats, coyotes, owls, and hawks. The best way to eliminate rats and mice from your neighborhood is to keep clean, well maintained properties, particularly if you feed outside animals or leave pet food outdoors. Your efforts will help keep your property and neighboring properties clear of rats. Rats and mice can take shelter in groundcovers such as ivy and vinca beds, under shrubbery, porches, and decks. They can fit into very small conveyances, and may find their way into your home through plumbing or electrical openings. In addition to rat eradication products, other materials are on the market to seal up holes around your plumbing pipes to prevent rodents from entering your home.

Rats find nutrition in animal feces, so it's important to clean up after your pets. In the city parks, Public Works provides doggie-doo bags and trash containers to make it easy and convenient for pet owners to keep their pet waste out of the parks. Public Works removes between four and eight tons of trash each week from the parks, and regularly mows and trims undergrowth. Public Works does not regularly encounter rats in the City sewer lines, but on the rare occasions that we do, they are baited. Additionally, for those residents who want to help keep our city clean while on your daily walks around town, Gladstone Public Works has trash pickers and trash kits available to check out from our office. The Public Works office is located at 18595 Portland Avenue. Just stop in and ask for a trash picker and kit.

Remember that it's an ongoing process to keep your property vermin-free. Making your environment inhospitable to rats and mice requires vigilance. They will migrate back if you allow your property to become attractive to them.

Get Ready for the Winter Months

Here are a few things you can do now to get your indoor and outdoor water systems ready for winter preventing costly repairs and wasted water.

Before shutting the irrigation system down for the winter, run each zone of the system separately checking for leaks, broken/misaligned spray heads, and other maintenance issues. When it is time to shut the system down for the winter completely drain all of the water out of the system to prevent freezing.

Shut off all outside water, disconnect hoses, open the hose bibs, and wrap or cover the hose bibs to prevent freezing. Store hoses, spray nozzles, and sprinklers inside, this will prevent freezing and breaking during the winter.

Insolate all exposed and venerable water pipes and cover the foundation vents to keep out the cold winter air.

Make sure everyone in the home knows where the main water shut off valve is and how to use it. If a pipe breaks during the winter the water will be shut off much quicker and could prevent costly damage. And last but not least, make sure the emergency phone numbers to your local water provider and a plumbing specialist are posted where everyone can see it. In an emergency this will save time and possibly prevent damage to your home.

Public Works is On Call All Day Every Day



With the recent devastation from hurricanes and fires in our country, it seemed like a good time to introduce folks to the 24 hour, seven days a week role of your Public Works Department.

Locally, the Gladstone Public Works Department works to ensure that clean drinking wa-

ter is safely delivered to your faucets. With approximately 40 miles of old and degraded water lines in the City's system, keeping the water flowing to your home is a continuous feat. Our work doesn't stop at the end of our day shift. We are on-call 24/7 to respond to those midnight emergencies. The after hours number is 503 655-8211.

Ready for Snowy, Icy Winter Weather?

When wintery weather blows will you be ready? It's time to take action now before the bad weather sets in. Find your snow shovel and place it close to where you will need it & make sure you have a good supply of de-icing compound. Check the antifreeze level in your car, replace older batteries, check your tires for proper inflation and keep the gas tank near full to avoid



freezing water in the fuel line. Things that could come in handy if you get stuck on the road: bags of sand or non-clumping cat litter, an ice scraper, jumper cables, tire chains, flares or reflective triangles, blanket, flashlight & batteries, a gallon jug of drinking water, jacket, hat, gloves, socks & sturdy shoes/boots, first aid kit and always travel with your cell phone fully charged so you can call for help if needed.

Studded tire season in Oregon begins Nov. 1

The studded tire season in Oregon begins Wednesday, Nov. 1, 2017 and runs through March 31, 2018.

ODOT encourages drivers to consider other types of traction tires or chains. If you must travel when weather conditions present difficulties, use other types of traction tires or chains, or postpone your travel until conditions change for the better. A study completed in 2014 concluded studded tires cause about \$8.5 million in damage each year on state highways.

Alternatives to studded tires

• Chains: Link chains, cable chains or other devices that attach to the wheel, vehicle, or outside of the tire that are specifically designed to increase traction on snow and ice. Drivers should note that link chains may not be recommended for use on some types of vehicles; check your owner's manual.

Other traction tires: Other types of traction tires are available. These traction tires meet Rubber Manufacturers Association standards for use in severe snow conditions and carry a special symbol on the tire sidewall showing a three-peaked mountain and snowflake. They work about as well as studded tires on ice, but work better than studded tires or regular tires in most other winter conditions. And they cause no more damage to road surfaces than regular tires.

How to Prepare for an Emergency

Being prepared means being equipped with the proper supplies needed in the event of an emergency or disaster. Here are 3 steps to help you prepare your family before an emergency strikes.

- 1. Get a Kit— Supplies should be kept in an easy to carry bag and include: Water, non-perishable foods, flashlight, extra batteries, stocked first aid kit, multi-purpose tool, sanitation and personal hygiene items, radio, whistle, emergency blanket, local map, permanent markers, tape, paper, photos of family members and pets, copy of health insurance card, pocket knife, light sticks, change of clothes and sturdy shoes.
- Make a Plan— Discuss how to respond to different types of emergencies. Identify responsibilities for each member of your household and how you will work together as a team. Practice as many elements of your plan as possible. Visit http://www.redcross.org/get-help/how-to-prepare-for-emergencies/make-a-plan for a family plan template.
- 3. Be Informed— Identify how local authorities will notify you during a disaster and how you will get information. Know the difference between different weather alerts such as watches and warnings. Know what actions to take to protect yourself during disasters that may occur in areas you travel as well as areas you live.

Winterizing Your Water Pipes Inside & Out

Fall is the time of year to start thinking about winterizing your water pipes inside & out. Here are some precautionary measures you can take now to help avoid the expense and inconvenience of frozen water pipes later. *Disconnect and drain all outdoor hoses, and protect outside pipes and faucets. *In some homes, the outside faucet has a separate "shut-off" in the basement or crawl space. If you do have a separate valve for outside faucets, shut it off. Then go outside, disconnect the garden hose and turn on the faucets to drain water from the line. Even if you do not have a separate "shut off valve" for outside faucets, wrap and/or cover ALL outside faucets and hose bibs. Disconnect garden hoses, otherwise, a single hard freeze can burst the faucet or the pipe it connects to. *If you have water pipes in unheated areas such as the garage or crawl space, wrap the water pipes with pipe insulation or wrapping materials. *Turn off the water to the irrigation system at the main shut-off valve. *Open all drain valves and drain water from system. *Wrap insulating material around ground valves and backflow prevention devices. Winter Driving Preparedness: Car Maintenance

Make sure to prepare your vehicle before the winter season begins. The following handy steps will help you ensure that your vehicle is safe to drive during winter weather:

1.Check your brakes, transmission and tires

- 2. Check that your battery and ignition system is in top condition and that battery terminals are clean
- 3. Check radiator coolant and sturdiness of hoses and belts
- 4.Check your anti-freeze and thermostat to avoid freezing
- 5.Check your windshield wipers and deicing washer fluid
- 6.Check your headlights, tail and brake lights, blinkers and emergency flasher
- 7. Check your exhaust system, heater and defroster
- 8.Check fuel and air filters
- 9. Check your oil and power steering fluids
- 10. Properly lubricate door locks that may be prone to freezing



Public Works schedule our leaf pick-up service with cost effectiveness and efficiency in mind. The schedule below best utilizes public funds reflected in both manpower and equipment hour costs.

We will be picking up your leaf piles within the following date ranges. Please identify the number of your neighborhood area on the map.

Areas 8 and 1: November 13 – 22

Areas 2, 3 and 4: November 27 - December 1

Areas 5 and 6: December 4 – 8 Areas 7 and 8: December 11-15


Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb. This extra space between the curb and the leaf pile is to allow water to drain into the city's storm basins.

Please have your leaf pile ready for pick-up by the first day of your area's designated pick-up schedule. While it is important to have your leaves ready for pick-up by the first day on your schedule, please remember that leaves placed in the street too far in advance of leaf pick-up will cause the leaves to wash into our storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding in your neighborhood. The best practice is to put your leaves out for pick-up the day before your area's first scheduled day. The city currently does not have a chipper or a way to dispose of tree limbs, twigs or other green waste, so we ask that you please not mix anything in with your leaves. Public Works always appreciates our citizen cooperation in helping to keep our city streets clean and our storm drains clear of leaves, allowing rain water to drain away from homes and businesses.

Once the public works crew has visited your area, they will not return until the next scheduled pick-up date for your area.

This year's leaf pick-up schedule ends on Friday, December 15^h. However, for citizens with hardships that prevented them from putting their leaves out during the scheduled city-wide leaf pick-up service, the Public Works crew will pick-up large leaf piles, by request only, between Monday, December 18th through Friday, January 12th. To be considered as a large leaf pile, leaves must be a volume of at least two heaping wheelbarrow loads. Smaller amounts of leaves may be disposed in your yard debris cans. Public Works appreciates everyone's consideration of the cost involved in providing the leaf pick-up service to the community. Working together, we can make this effort as efficient and cost effective as possible.
