Finding the Good in Government; Fall in Love With Your City.



Last month the City Council and I had a retreat facilitated by LB Day to explore how we could provide effective leadership for the City of Gladstone and defined our desired culture and determine ways to reinforce this culture. We watched a tedtalk by Peter Kageyama called, "for the love of cities", stating the mutual love affair between people and their

place is one of the most powerful influences in our lives, yet rarely thought of in terms of a relationship.

People do what they love, what they are passionate about, and what engages those leads to happiness. Government is not responsible for legislating happiness but smart communities make it a little more likely to happen by their policy decisions. There are four outcomes from our retreat 1) improve our council meetings, 2) deal with disgruntled citizens better 3) involve the citizens in helping the City, 4) improve the

"coffee with the councilor" forum.
Gladstone has been "growing up" the past couple years and for some that is very uncomfortable. We have been working on a Downtown Revitalization Plan, Transportation System Plan, Parks Master Plan, internal technology software upgrades and fiber connectivity among civic buildings, and we launched a new website. That is just a glimpse from our strategic plan, but is a lot of changes for a small community.

In trying to repair relationships any relationship we need to understand its history and how we arrived at the current state of affairs. We need to understand what each party needs, start changing behaviors and to recognize that it takes time to build trust. Most importantly we need to spend time educating the public on how money is being spent and listen to what is making you uncomfortable.

Please join us for our annual Town Hall meeting on Wednesday October 18th at 6:30 pm at the Gladstone High School Auditorium (18800 Portland Avenue). You don't hear "love" being mentioned in council meetings or planning commission meetings- we experience cities emotionally, yet talk about them technically. We need to work on that. Staff and the elected officials are committed to letting people know they matter and want to enhance their experience in Gladstone, perhaps even help them fall in love with their city.

Gladstone Fire — Eagle Creek Fire



On September 2^{nd} , The Eagle Creek Fire was reported in the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, and overnight grew to 3000 acres. By day three, with strong winds, the fire exploded to over 20,000 acres. On September 13th, Gladstone Fire Engine 393 deployed as part of the Clackamas County task force to help contain the Eagle Creek Fire. The crew consisted of Captain Kirk Stempel, Engineer John Cerda, and Firefight-

ers Austin Krieger and Jacob Lehrbach. Gladstone Fire had the assignment of protecting the Multnomah Falls Lodge during the evening shift which proved to be a very rewarding experience. The Eagle Creek Fire saw 5,230 structures threatened (only 4 were lost), 1,822 people evacuated, and required an Oregon record 30 task forces and strike teams made up of personnel from 83 Oregon fire agencies and 6 Washington fire and Tighe Vroman. fire prevention week is Oct. 8-14, 2017. This year is really the year of smoke in their home if a fire were to start while they sleep. The facts the smoke alarm. This year as part of fire prevention week, Gladstone Fire Department has selected the Tri-City mobile park community as a location to install new smoke alarms in owner occupied homes. On the last day of fire prevention week Gladstone firefighters will be working side by side with volunteers from our local Rotary club installing new 10 yr smoke alarms in this mobile home park neighborhood.

While the department cannot fund a new smoke alarm for everyone that resides within our City, we do our best to install alarms in homes that are without them and to those homeowners that cannot afford one. That is why fire prevention folks call your smoke alarm your "Nose at Night".

> If you are living in a rented space, there are laws that require the property owner that rents the space to you to provide at least one working smoke alarm in the rental for your protec-

tion. Remember it is against the law for you to remove the battery or otherwise disable the smoke alarm that the property owner supplies.

Preparing Your Swimming Pool for Winter

Did you know that if chlorinated or saltwater pools are not maintained properly, it could affect the water quality of streams and lakes in our region?

When preparing a pool for winter, remember these three details:

- 1. Pool water is not stormwater and should not be placed in ditches, street gutters, or storm drains;
- 2. The same chlorine or salt used in a pool that disinfects water for recreational use has a high concentration of chemicals that negatively impacts stream health and aquatic life; and.
- 3. There is a safe way to drain or de-chlorinate pool water.

Generally, pool water is safe to drain after waiting five to seven days for the chlorine to evaporate. After that timeframe, slowly release the water into a large, vegetated area so that plants and soil can clean the water before it goes to storm drains and local waterways.

Pool Water Discharging Illegal? Pool water is only considered an illegal discharge if the water is chlorinated or "shocked" immediately before draining, or if disposing of it causes environmental damage. In this case, the property owner may receive an illegal discharge violation. Other

items that should not go in the storm drain include paint, wash water, gasoline, wastewater, grease and oil, yard waste and leaves, pet waste, and litter. Illegal discharges can be reported to the Gladstone Public Works Department at 503 656-7957, or by e-mailing to PWOffice@ci.gladstone.or.us

Stay warm, safe and remember—no texting while driving, and remember the new Oregon Cell phone law which went into effect October 1, 2017 limiting use to a single "touch or swipe" and hands free use only.

* <u>School has Started</u>: School has started which means it's time to remind ourselves of the changes we all need to make to our driving habits. One of the most important things to pay attention to is the speed limit change in school zones. School Zone speed is 20 M.P.H. Pay close attention to pedestrians, stop signs and crosswalks. New Utility Billing Software/Changes

The City recently converted their utility billing software. With this conversion comes some changes to our billing. All customers have been assigned new account numbers—please refer to new account number when making payment. Your billing statement is currently for the two month cycle, your current bill should reflect the date range of 09/01/2017—11/01/2017. Bi-monthly utility bill statements will remain in a postcard format and late notices/shut-off notices will continue to be generated in an 8 1/2" x 11" format. Effective July 1st, all residents are assessed a \$10.00 per billing cycle stormwater fee. Any account not paid by the due date will be assessed



a \$7.00 late fee. Payments may continue to be mailed or paid in person at City Hall, by check, cash or credit card (VISA, MasterCard & Discover). Credit card payments may also be made online at http://www.ci.gladstone.or.us/gladstone-online-payments/ or by calling 503-305-9030. You must provide your new utility billing account number when making an online or phone payment and a service charge will be added to your transaction. Prior to completing your transaction you will be advised of the charge. Residents may also request their bimonthly utility bill to be automatically deducted from their checking or savings account. The authorization agreement for Auto Pay (ACH Debits) may be found on the City's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us or by stopping by City hall, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. Funds will be withdrawn on the DUE DATE only for the AMOUNT DUE listed on the billing statement. No alternative payment dates will be available.



Nationally, studies of students who meet regularly with a mentor show that:

64% develop more positive attitudes toward school

59% achieve higher grades

46% are less likely to start using illegal drugs

27% are less likely to start drinking

33% are less likely to engage in violence

Indoor Water Conservation



Every day the average American can splash, pour and flush between 40-130 gallons of water down the drain. In the Clackamas River Water Providers service area, the average person uses 80-100 gallons of water each day, and a family of four typically consumes around 320 gallons per day. We use water to cook, take showers, clean and drink. There are a number of ways you can learn how to save water indoors whether it is through fixing leaky faucets or leaky toilets, to installing new low flow fixtures and appliances, (which can reduce your indoor water usage by up 50%), to learning how to use your water meter to check for leaks. Other water

saving ideas include: *Take a shallow bath instead of a shower (saves 15-20 gallons per day); *Turn off water while brushing your teeth (saves 3 gallons per day); *Run only full loads in washing machine and dishwasher (saves 75-200 gallons per week); *Keep a bottle of cold water in the refrigerator for drinking instead of running the faucet (saves 200-300 gallons per For information on water conservation, visit Clackamas River Water Provider's www.clackamasproviders.org.



Public Works schedule our leaf pick-up service with cost effectiveness and efficiency in mind. The schedule below best utilizes public funds reflected in both manpower and equipment hour costs.

We will be picking up your leaf piles within the following date ranges. Please identify the number of your neighborhood area on the map.

Areas 1 and 2: October 23 - 27

Areas 3, 4 and 5: October 30 – November 3

Areas 6 and 7: November 6 – 9 Areas 8 and 1: November 13 – 22

Areas 2, 3 and 4: November 27 - December 1

Areas 5 and 6: December 4 – 8 Areas 7 and 8: December 11-15


Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb. This extra space between the curb and the leaf pile is to allow water to drain into the city's storm basins.

Please have your leaf pile ready for pick-up by the first day of your area's designated pick-up schedule. While it is important to have your leaves ready for pick-up by the first day on your schedule, please remember that leaves placed in the street too far in advance of leaf pick-up will cause the leaves to wash into our storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding in your neighborhood. The best practice is to put your leaves out for pick-up the day before your area's first scheduled day. The city currently does not have a chipper or a way to dispose of tree limbs, twigs or other green waste, so we ask that you please not mix anything in with your leaves. Public Works always appreciates our citizen cooperation in helping to keep our city streets clean and our storm drains clear of leaves, allowing rain water to drain away from homes and businesses.

Once the public works crew has visited your area, they will not return until the next scheduled pick-up date for your area.

This year's leaf pick-up schedule ends on Friday, December 15^h. However, for citizens with hardships that prevented them from putting their leaves out during the scheduled city-wide leaf pick-up service, the Public Works crew will pick-up large leaf piles, by request only, between Monday, December 18th through Friday, January 12th. To be considered as a large leaf pile, leaves must be a volume of at least two heaping wheelbarrow loads. Smaller amounts of leaves may be disposed in your yard debris cans. Public Works appreciates everyone's consideration of the cost involved in providing the leaf pick-up service to the community. Working together, we can make this effort as efficient and cost effective as possible.

We have exciting news to share with you! The Board of County Commissioners has formally approved the new Water Environment Services Advisory Committee (WÉSAC). In accordance with Clackamas County guidelines, we are now recruiting to fill the 16 available positions, each of which carries a three-year term. The committee will provide input and make recommendations on surface water and wastewater issues to WES and the Board of County Commissioners.

We are looking for people who will represent the WES service area's diverse community and economic development needs, businesses and industry sectors, river health affiliates, and broad customer base. Ideally, members will have experience and/or background in wastewater management, watershed health and restoration, economic development, and surface water.

Members must reside or work within the WES service area, which includes the cities of Gladstone, Happy Valley, Johnson City, Milwaukie, Oregon City, West Linn, and the communities of unincorporated Clackamas County. Committee meetings will be held quarterly in the evenings from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. The first meeting will be held in January 2018.

Back Flow Prevention

The purpose of backflow prevention devices is to eliminate potential contamination of your drinking water by "cross contamination" with a pollution related substance such as fertilizer or industrial chemical. For example, a cross connection occurred in Virginia when a water customer's garden hose was connected to an outside faucet and was left in a barrel of highly toxic insecticide, and the insecticide was back-siphoned into the public's water supply. This contamination could have been prevented if a backflow device had been installed in the customer's water supply line. Oregon Administrative Rules and City code require annual testing of all backflow prevention devices. Devices are required for residential irrigation systems and non-residential uses including medical clinics, commercial laundries, dry cleaners, etc. Please contact the city's Public Works Department at 503-656-7957 if you have questions including whether you need to install a device.
