I was very excited to tell you about the new civic building projects (City Hall and Police Department) this month, but then something unexpected happened: we lost one of our



city employees. Maria Aikin passed away on September 4th. My excitement suddenly turned to sadness.

Maria had been employed with the City since 2011. She worked as the administrative assistant for Police Chief Jolley, and Chief Pride. Her position, I believe, is one of the most sought after positions in any municipality. I may be prejudiced, but I can say that, because that is the position I held when I started my career in local government 18 years ago. I envied Maria because she knew everything that was happening in this small town and she was responsible for taking care of the police officers (and usually their significant others). She served as the central communication link between the Chief's office, law enforcement and civilian staff, and the general public. Maria handled administrative procedures such as fiscal, equipment purchase, and staff communication and made recommended improvements. Her position performed confidential

duties for all of the department functions.

Gladstone is a small town and in a time of crisis, we take care of our own. There is no procedure on how to grieve properly and I hope there never is. Maria wanted so much to be part of the new police department, so now my sadness is focused on making sure that happens. Please remember that finding the "good in government" sometimes comes from within, and Maria was our "good in government". Thank you for your service Maria. You will be missed.


Gladstone Fire Dept. Updates—Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives

The message from the fire department has been the same for years. Only working smoke alarms save lives. Over the years, there have been a number of people and groups that have supported the fire department smoke alarm program. This year Gladstone /Oak Lodge Rotary Club has teamed up with Gladstone firefighters in a campaign to install 100 new smoke alarms in a Gladstone neighborhood. The target date for installation is set for fire prevention week this October.

ONLY - Working smoke alarms -save

Remember smoke alarms do not last forever. The effective life of a smoke alarm is 10 years. Even if the alarm still operates when you test it, please replace it after 10 years. Between the 10 year device replace-

ments, you should perform battery testing and replacement. If you have a 10 year battery in your alarm (and you test it <u>Monthly</u>), the battery should last 7-10



If you own your home and cannot afford a new smoke alarm the fire department program can provide and install one in your home for you. This can be done free of charge to you if you qualify. For those people that reside in an apartment or a rental home laws require your landlord to provide you with at least one working alarm. For any questions contact Michael Funk at 503-557-



New Utility Billing Software/Changes

The City recently converted their utility billing software to Incode/Tyler Technologies. With this conversion comes some changes to our billing. All customers have been assigned new account numbers—please refer to new account number when making payment. Also note that due to the software conversion billing dates did not convert correctly. Your billing cycle is currently for the two month cycle, however dates did not reflect correctly on the bill. Your current bill should reflect the date range of 07/01/2017—09/01/2017. Bi-monthly utility bill statements will remain in a postcard format and late notices/shut-off notices will continue to be generated in an 8 1/2"



x 11" format. Effective July 1st, all residents are assessed a \$5.00 per month stormwater fee (see stormwater related article on page 5). Any account not paid by the due date will be assessed a \$7.00 late fee. Payments may continue to mailed or paid in person at City Hall, by check, cash or credit card (VISA, MasterCard & Discover). Credit card payments may also be made online at http:// www.ci.gladstone.or.us/gladstone-online-payments/ or by calling 503-305-9030. You must provide your new utility billing account number when making an online or phone payment and a service charge will be added to your transaction. Prior to completing your transaction you will be advised of the charge. Residents may also request their bi-monthly utility bill to be automatically deducted from their checking or savings account. The authorization agreement for Auto Pay (ACH Debits) may be found on the City's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us or by stopping by City hall, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. Funds will be withdrawn on the DUE DATE only for the AMOUNT DUE listed on the billing statement. No alternative payment dates will be available.

Gladstone New Stormwater Program: What You Need to Know

Introduction:

Gladstone's elected leaders are committed to catch up on infrastructure needs. Water, sewer and stormwater systems are in poor condition due to long deferred maintenance and lack of timely replacement of failing infrastructure. Recently, Gladstone took steps to address longstanding deficiencies in the City's stormwater infrastructure that result in chronic sewer overflows that put public health and the environment at risk. During storms, the rainwater enters sewer pipes and mixes with untreated sewage. The combined sewage/stormwater then overflows onto local streets and into the Clackamas River and other local streams. Those events lead to regulatory violations which can result in stiff fines.

Stormwater Utility Provides Resources to Solve the Problem:

Until recently, Gladstone was the only city in the region without a stormwater utility and fee. Without a stormwater fee, Gladstone could not comply with state and federal regulations to protect public health and the environment. Creating a stormwater utility and enacting a stormwater fee and system development charge allows Gladstone to maintain, operate, and upgrade the stormwater system to prevent sewer overflows and avoid costly regulatory violations. The new stormwater fee will be phased-in, starting below the level in peer communities - to begin, households will pay \$5 per month in the first year. Businesses will pay a proportionate amount depending on their impervious surface (the area covered by roofs, parking, and other hard surfaces that do not absorb water).

Keeping Services Affordable:

The City is committed to maintaining and fixing the stormwater system and keeping it affordable for all customers. Other funding options being pursued are grants, partnerships, and low interest loans from the state.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's):

What is stormwater?

What's wrong with Gladstone's stormwater system?

Storm drains, catch basins, and stormwater pipes are designed to carry rainwater away from developed areas to prevent flooding. In Gladstone, some catch basins are directly connected to the sewer system. During storm events the rainwater enters sewer pipes and mixes with untreated sewage. That combined sewage/stormwater then overflows onto local streets and into the Clackamas River and other local streams. Those events lead to regulatory violations.

How is the stormwater problem being solved?

In June 2017, the Gladstone City Council took action to become the final city in the region to initiate a stormwater utility and fee. This will enable Gladstone to proactively manage the quality and quantity of stormwater in our city. The Council's action:

- * Establishes a stormwater utility
- * Enacts Gladstone's first stormwater When will customers receive their fee for property owners
- *Adopts a stormwater system development charge (SDC) to be paid by new development.

How much is the stormwater fee?

The new stormwater fee will be phasedin, starting below the level in peer communities. To begin, households will pay \$5 per month in the first year. The charge will increase to \$10 per month on July 1, 2018.

Commercial and other nonsingle family residential accounts are charged \$5 per ERU or 3,000 square feet of impervious area.

How will the City use the money?

The money will enable Gladstone to proactively manage the quality and quantity of stormwater in our city. The first step is to ensure stormwater is separated from the sewer systems to prevent sewage overflows.

Do other communities in Oregon charge for stormwater services? (How much?)

More than 40 other Oregon communities charge a separate stormwater fee. For a single family residential home owner, the service charges in the region range from \$26.59 in Portland to \$9.35 in Oregon City (2015 rates).

Will the stormwater bill come on the same bill as the sewer and water bill? Customers will receive a single bill from the City for sewer, water, and stormwater charges.

The stormwater rate takes effect July 1, 2017 and the first bills with stormwater charges will arrive in early September.

What is a Stormwater System Development Charge?


Stormwater system development charges (SDCs) are fees that are collected when new development occurs in the city. The funds are used for stormwater projects identified in Gladstone's

Leaf Pick-up Schedule

Our beautiful autumn leaves will soon be falling, which means leaf pick up season is coming! In an effort to best utilize public funds, the Public Works Dept. has slightly changed the leaf pick up schedule this year. It is our hope this new scheduling method will allow us to cover our leaf pick up areas in the most cost effective manner, saving your dollars in both manpower and equipment hour costs. We will be picking up leaves with in the date ranges above. Please identify your neighborhood area on the map above. Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb. This extra space between the curb and leaf pile allows water to drain into the city's catch basins. Please have your leaf pile ready for pick up on the first day of your area's designated pickup date. Leaves placed in the street too far in advise will cause leaves to wash into storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding. Put leaves out the day before your area's first scheduled day. The City does not have a chipper or a way to dispose of tree limbs or twigs, so please do not mix anything in with your leaves. Public Works always appreciates our residents cooperation in assisting to keep our city streets clean and our catch basins clear of leaves, allowing water to drain way from homes & businesses. Once our crews have visited your area, they will not return until the next scheduled pick up date for your area. The year's pick up schedule ends December 16th. December 19th.—January 13th, the public works crew will do large pile pick up. This post-season pick up will be by request only for citizens with hardships that prevented previous pick up. Large leaf piles must be at least two heaping wheel barrow loads. Smaller amounts may be placed in your yard debris cans. Gladstone Fire — Called to Action



On August 21st, Gladstone Fire Department was activated as part of the conflagration response team for the Milli Fire in Sisters, Or. Gladstone was assigned to a strike team consisting of Boardman, Umatilla, Hermiston, and LaGrande Fire Departments, as well as the Kingsley Air Base team. GFD's primary duties were the survey and prep of the homes within the level 2 or 3 evacuation areas of the Cross Roads and Toll Gate residential developments. At the time that we were deployed, the fire sat at 12,000 acres with 0% contained. Gladstone Fire prepped over 200 homes being proactive just in case the fire overtook the structures. Thankfully, the fire moved away from these developments. The teams that were deployed with us all worked very hard and

we were successful in their mission. We were demobilized on August 24th

Hanging Tree Branches

Public Works is asking residents to trim low hanging tree branches that may damage vehicles or injure pedestrians



by cutting branches seven feet (7') above sidewalks and fourteen feet (14') above streets. Please cut up your branches and place them in your yard debris cart. If Public Works determines there is a risk of damage or injury, they may cut your tree branches without notice.

Sidewalks & Clear Vision

The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible to maintain sidewalks abutting their property. The city's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." Property owners are also responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision at street intersections. Thank you!

Drop Off Unwanted Prescriptions at PD

Flushing drugs down the toilet or putting them into the garbage have damaging effects on our environment and can contaminate our surface & groundwater supplies. Drinking and wastewater treatment plants are not designed to treat for these kinds of chemicals. Drop off your old,



expired or unwanted prescriptions at the Gladstone Police Department, MED RETURN receptacle, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. No paperwork or fee required!

Low Income Discount for Water/Sewer Bills

Water and sewer discounts of 50% are available to low income residents who are billed directly by the city. Applications are renewable on an annual fiscal year basis. Current discounts need to be renewed by September 30, 2017. Applications may be downloaded from the city's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us, picked up at City Hall or by calling 503-557-2771. Low income discounts are based on Federal poverty guidelines.

Back Flow Prevention

The purpose of backflow prevention devices is to eliminate potential contamination of your drinking water by "cross contamination" with a pollution related substance such as fertilizer or industrial chemical. For example, a cross connection occurred in Virginia when a water customer's garden hose was connected to an outside faucet and was left in a barrel of highly toxic insecticide, and the insecticide was backsiphoned into the public's water supply. This contamination could have been prevented if a backflow device had been installed in the customer's water supply line. Oregon Administrative Rules and City code require annual testing of all backflow prevention devices. Indoor Water Conservation



Every day the average American can splash, pour and flush between 40-130 gallons of water down the drain. In the Clackamas River Water Providers service area, the average person uses 80-100 gallons of water each day, and a family of four typically consumes around 320 gallons per day. We use water to cook, take showers, clean and drink. There are a number of ways you can learn how to save water indoors whether it is through fixing leaky faucets or leaky toilets, to installing new low flow fixtures and appliances, (which can reduce your indoor water usage by up 50%), to learning how to use your water meter to check for leaks. Other water saving ideas include: *Take a shallow bath in-

stead of a shower (saves 15-20 gallons per day); *Turn off water while brushing your teeth (saves 3 gallons per day); *Run only full loads in washing machine and dishwasher (saves 75-200 gallons per week); *Keep a bottle of cold water in the refrigerator for drinking instead of running the faucet (saves 200-300 gallons per month). DriveHealthy Campaign Launches

A new campaign supported by AAA Oregon/Idaho, ODOT, LifeSaver and the Oregon State Police is designed to help reduce the incidence of distracted driving in Oregon by a little friendly competition. Using the LifeSaver app on their smart phones, drivers are scored based on attempted phone use while a vehicle is in motion. Less phone use equals a higher score. Over time, drivers can improve their score and see where they stack up compared to other drivers and organiza-
