Measure 3-530 Gladstone Library May 2018

This May, Gladstone residents will consider a plan for a new library:

If the measure passes it would permit the City to lease the Gladstone City Hall property to Clackamas County as the site for a new library. The County would construct the library using accumulated Library District reserves and a future revenue bond. The City would continue to contribute approximately \$200,000 per year for operating expenses. The measure does not include any changes to taxes.

If the measure does not pass the library would remain at its current location. Library facilities and services would not change.

Why is this measure on the ballot?

Gladstone's library is in need of structural upgrades and

In 2014, another library measure was on the ballot for voter consideration. The 2014 plan proposed one large library in Gladstone that would be operated by the City of Gladstone

The latest (May 2018) ballot measure would authorize the City to enter into an agreement with the County to provide two libraries, one of which would be located in Gladstone.

Gladstone Library

If the measure passes, where would the new library be located?

At 525 Portland Avenue, the current location of City Hall. A relocated City Hall would be constructed at 18505 Portland Avenue

If the measure passes, how would the library be funded?

The City would lease the property to the County for \$1 per year. Funding for construction of the new library would come from existing funds from the District's property tax of 0.3974 dollars per thousand of assessed value and a future revenue bond by the County. Library operating costs would not change with the District continuing to fund the majority of the Library's operating costs, currently \$700,159 annually, and the City continuing to contribute approximately \$200,000

If the measure passes, what would be the size of the new library?

Approximately 6,000 sq. ft. That could change based on the actual space needed and construction cost estimates. A financial analysis would be completed before any construction would begin


If the measure passes, who would run the library?

Clackamas County would jointly manage the new Gladstone library and the proposed Oak Lodge library.

If the measure passes, what would happen

The City and County would hold public meetings and outreach events to better understand what the community wants and needs in a new library. Based on this input, a design for the new library would be developed and a financial analysis would be completed before construction would begin.

Spring is here and we're about to get busy with community activities. The Gladstone Police Department is proud to sponsor Drug Takeback Day and our event in Gladstone will be held May 5th from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. We will be accepting your prescription medications that are no longer needed and will dispose of them properly. We ask that you do not bring liquids, needles or sharps, and loose pills will not be accepted. All you need to do is drive up in

front of the City Hall/Police building located at 535 Portland Ave., and we will meet you and take custody of your drop-off.

Some other highlights of the Drug Takeback Day:

<u>E-recycling – the Kraxberger Middle School Robotics Club</u> will be on-site to accept electronics that no longer function and/or wanted. They will accept computers, TV's, radios, microwaves and such. This station will be located on the Dartmouth St. side of City Hall.

<u>Shred Service</u> -the Gladstone-Oak Grove Rotary Club will be hosting a shred truck. Please bring paper documents you wish to dispose of, keep your sensitive information out of the wrong hands. This is free to residents. We ask that you limit to 10 boxes of documents, stay at the station while your documents are being shredded, and take the container/box with you as we cannot process other materials. The truck will be located in the Watt's parking lot across the street from the City Hall/Police building.

<u>Ice Cream</u> - don't forget the ice cream! Our Gladstone Baskin-Robbins will be on hand to dish out a free ice cream treat to event-goers.

You can't burn that in Gladstone - From Fire Marshal Mike Funk



Every year about this time Gladstone citizens start heading outside to maintain their yards as the long Winter yields to Spring and Ore-

gon sunshine. First thing, I would like to say Thank You. The majority of residents do a great job at making this City look sharp with flowers, trimmed bushes and fresh mowed yards.

Please remember that while all the trimming looks great, we need to remember that you are not permitted to burn any of this yard debris. All yard debris should be composted or placed in your brown yard debris can provided by the garbage hauler.

There have been a number of inquiries lately concerning outdoor burning. Because Gladstone is situated within the Metro - DEQ no burn area, outdoor burning is generally not <u>allowed</u>. While general outdoor burning is prohibited in the city limits, there are provisions that allow for (small) recreational or cooking fires.

Recreational fires are fires that are small and contained to a commercial patio pot, burn pit or stove. Fuels used in these situations are restricted to clean seasoned firewood.

Under no circumstances do these (recreational fire) guidelines allow the ting life jacket. burning of garbage, grass, leaves, twigs, yard debris, plastics, tires, petroleum products, construction debris or any other product that release offensive smoke or odors into the surrounding area.

Some people are sensitive to burning wood; however the fire department has no authority to regulate recreational fires that are burning only clean seasoned firewood.

Address Numbers on Your Home

The Gladstone Fire Dept. requests residents please check address numbers placed on the front of their homes. Address numbers need to be 4 inches or larger, have a light for night time hours and stand out in a contrasting color to the home. Their quick response when responding to emergencies is dependent upon them finding your home. Please do your part by placing large, lighted, contrasting numbers on your

River Safety—From Fire Captain Kirk Stempel

Spring is here, with summer just around the corner, which means the river is full of boats and people enjoying the water everywhere. Just a reminder that it's a really good time to start to think about water safety. Currently the Clackamas river is in the low 40's and without the proper equipment, such as a Personal Flotation Device (PFD'S), someone that happens to fall in only has a short time before hypothermia sets in. On recreational vessels underway, children under 13 years old must wear a Coast Guard -approved life jacket unless they are below decks or in an enclosed cabin. Here are some facts to think about when fitting a life jacket:

Make sure the life jacket is properly zipped or buckled. Raise your arms straight up over your head while wear-

ing your life jacket and grab the shoulder material, gently pulling up.

If there is excess room above the openings, and the life jacket rides up over your chin or face, it does NOT fit properly. A snug fit in these areas signals a properly fitting life jacket

Fit Facts

It is extremely important that you choose a properly fit-

Life jackets that are too big will cause the flotation device to push up around your face, which could be dangerous.

Life jackets that are too small will not be able to keep your body afloat.

Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. Curfew

According to Gladstone Municipal Code, Chapter 9.16.040, It is unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years who is not emancipated pursuant to ORS 419B.550 to 419B.558, to be in or upon any street, highway, park, alley, public right of way, or other public place between the hours specified in this section unless such minor is accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person twenty-one (21) years of age or older and authorized by the parent or by law to have such care and custody of the minor, or unless such minor is then engaged in an authorized school activity or lawful employment that makes it necessary to be in or upon such public place during the hours specified in this section. The curfew is between 11:00 p.m. and 5:30 a.m. of the following

Gladstone City Business Licenses

Gladstone Municipal Code states in part, "No person shall carry on any business within the city without first obtaining a license" All businesses pay a fee of \$100, plus \$5 per employee, and if the business is operating out of a home residence, an additional \$50 fee is required. For owners of rental properties, the \$100 fee applies plus an additional \$25 per rental property. Business license applications may be downloaded from the city's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us. Community Promotions—Business Development Ad-Hoc Committee

In summer of 2018 the City of Gladstone will establish an Ad Hoc Committee to discuss how revenues from the Business License program should be spent. The Council adopted resolution No. 1098, a resolution formalizing the revenue collected for business licenses and fees be transferred to the Community Promotions-Business Development line item in the City's budget. Business licenses are required for a business operating within the city limits, whether for a rental property, commercial, or home-based business. In an attempt to improve transparency and accountability with the use of public funds, the City Council desires to formalize how the revenue will be spent. Two members from Council and up to seven members of the community (citizens and/or those that have a business license in Gladstone) will make-up the committee. 'Ad-Hoc" means a public body created by Council for a particular purpose, issue, or need. Therefore is it expected this committee would meet monthly until recommendations on how the funds should be spent for fiscal year 2018-19 is completed. Sometimes, all they are looking for is someone to talk to and vent about their concerns. In a recent survey done by the State of Oregon, it was found that 90% of primary care physicians polled believed that loneliness and depression were a normal part of aging; loneliness and depression are not normal. Loneliness is an accepted social norm that we all deal with as we age. However, loneliness, untreated does lead to more serious issues such as depression. So, what is the anti -dote? The anti-dote is simple: engagement. Engagement is as simple as saying hello or good day. If you see a senior in need, reach out and offer assistance. Yes, it is that simple. There are however times where a simple hello or good day will not suffice. In those instances, please feel free to have them reach out to us here at the Senior Center. Take a good look around at the outside of your home, garden & property. Now that spring is here, it's time to spruce things up. Toss out junk that's been piling up in the yard or carport and dispose of that old car you'll never drive again, tune up the lawnmower and keep the grass

mowed and get weeds in the garden pulled and under control. The goal of Code Enforcement is to work with the community to enhance and safeguard the quality of life in our community through education, guidance and enforcement of city codes. Please do your part by taking an active role in maintaining and improving the quality of our community by following Gladstone's Municipal Code, which can be found online at www.ci.gladstone.or.us.

Nuisances

Similar to most cities, Gladstone administers a "nuisance code" which essentially prohibits conditions that may affect public health or safety. For example, unsanitary and unsafe conditions such as accumulations of debris or rubbish or storage of junk, obstructing clear vision at an intersection, tall grass or weeds are all prohibited by the nuisance code. A public nuisance may also be caused by any fence, dam or other obstruction of any kind of natural water course that could back up water and significantly affect other property or improved public street. Gladstone Fire Department Employment Opportunity

Gladstone Fire Department is currently recruiting for paid-on-call firefighters. Being a firefighter for the City of Gladstone is a very rewarding and valuable way to serve the community and prepare you for a possible career in the fire service. It takes dedication, many hours of training and commitment to become a firefighter. If this sounds like you, here are our minimum requirements

Job qualifications required:

- •high school diploma or equivalent;
- •must be a minimum of 18 years of age;
- •must pass a criminal background check and drug test;
- •must possess a current, valid Oregon driver's license and maintain a driving record insurable by the City's insurer in order to drive a department vehicle;
- •must pass the entrance physical ability test, written exam (70% or better) and interview to be accepted for the department fire academy;
- •must pass a full firefighter physical;
- •must obtain a EMT license within one year after probation and maintain it during duration of employment;
- •recruits are required to complete the fire academy (time commitment; approximately 120 hours);
- •In addition to a high school diploma, post-high school education or an equivalent combination of education and experience is preferred and will be considered.

The application deadline for this process closes May 18th 2018.

Let's Talk About Trash: Bulky Items

Options for getting rid of bulky items, such as furniture, appliances, tires, mattresses, etc.:

The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property and are liable to any person suffering injury due to a defective sidewalk. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." This is similar to property owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection.

Library Storytime Can Change the World By: Councilor Michael Milch



Every decade or so, my wife and I find ourselves in the role of part-time caregivers to a toddler or preschooler. Among the many community resources we have come to depend on when caring for these nieces, nephews, or grandchildren (it takes a

village, you know), our favorite by far is library storytime.

Three times or so each week, we strap our grandson into his car seat or rendezvous with him and his mom to visit a local library (usually Gladstone) where a gifted and energetic librarian engages a group of young children and their caregivers in music, movement, stories, puppetry, and active play.

We observe first hand the exponential growth in his comprehensive vocabulary, watch him tap his feet and sway his hips to the music of the ukulele, and see him forming his first friendships with children his own age and with Heather, his favorite librarian.

I have sat next to a 3-year-old who speaks both Ukrainian and English while he and his little sister sing songs using ASL hand motions and realized that he already knows three times as many languages as I do (not counting my smattering of high school Spanish).

We have been to all-ages storytime where a developmentally challenged young man in his 20's participated with the same enthusiasm and love for learning as the young children seated around him.

Not content to simply observe, I have also checked out one of the six ukuleles which are part of the Gladstone library's collection and am learning the chords to play and sing "Snuggle Puppy" to my grandson while we are at home.

We have revisited the library where his 12-year-old twin cousins went to storytime at age two, and we were greeted by

Every decade or so, my wife and I the same veteran librarian who helped to instill in them a love selves in the role of part-time care- of books and learning that continues to this day.

I'll leave it to a librarian to articulate the ways that story-time activities promote cognitive growth in young children — ask one, they'll tell you — but for now my mantra on the long-term benefits of library storytime is something I saw in a study of 2-year-old development reported on slate.com:

The early years consist of some of the most important moments in child development. The size of a child's vocabulary at age 2 can predict his academic and behavioral abilities at the start of kindergarten. School readiness at the start of kindergarten can affect a child's ability to read by third grade. Kids who read by third grade are more likely to graduate from high school. People who graduate from high school have higher earnings and are less likely to end up in jail. Parents who aren't in jail and who have the capacity to earn a living wage are more likely to have children with larger vocabularies by age 2.

Of all the ways that city, county, and regional governments collaborate to serve the needs of children and youth in their communities, including parks, schools, transportation, and safety, libraries are one of the most essential. Occasionally I hear from a constituent or a politician who tries to make the case that modern technology has made libraries obsolete. Nonsense. Words, whether printed on a page, glowing on a screen, or soaring digitally through cyberspace, are the foundation of language and communication. Modern libraries rest on this foundation and provide universal access to all the tools needed to build upon it.

Libraries are hubs for inspiration, discovery and opportunity that can change lives. Take a baby or toddler or preschooler you love to library storytime. Change their world. And ours.
