### HB 4006 Severely Rent Burdened Populations By City Administrator Jacque Betz



House Bill (HB) 4006, passed in 2018, and provided funding to the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development and Oregon Housing and Community Services to assist cities in housing (technical assistance grants) and collect housing-related information to better understand the barriers and solutions. Another purpose of HB 4006 was to increase awareness of rent burden causes and potential solutions to encourage and support

cities to address the need.

HB 4006 requires cities greater than 10,000, who are "severely rent burdened" to complete a survey and hold a public meeting to discuss the causes of severe rent burdens, the barriers to reducing rent burdens, and possible solutions". The legislation defines a household as "severely rent burdened" if the household spends more than 50 percent of the income of the household on gross rent. A city is "severely rent burdened" if more than 25 percent of the renter households are severely rent burdened. In Gladstone, 34% are severely rent burdened (628 out of 1,827 renter households).

The City of Gladstone is actively working towards satisfying the requirements of HB 4006 and has scheduled a round table discussion at the December Planning Commission meeting. We look forward to engaging the community and listening to people share their stories and ideas in reducing rent burdens in our community. In addition, Julie Garver, from Innovation Housing, Inc. will provide a presentation on how their agency develops diverse affordable housing in severely rent burdened communities. The City is also participating in a countywide housing needs analysis which will establish baseline data in the current state of housing in Gladstone.

Gladstone is not unique in addressing our housing needs, as this is a state-wide issue. We may not have the answers either, but we recognize that the lack of housing is impacting economic development efforts and cities need to deal with the crisis directly since 67 percent of Oregonians reside in a city. Please join us for a community conversation to assist Gladstone in understanding where the City needs to focus and what the desires of its community are, to be successful.

#### Utility Rate Increase

Water Rates will be increasing 10% and Sewer Collection rates will be increasing 5% starting January 1st, 2019. Residents who use 600 cubic feet of water (4,488 gallons) or less will see an increase of \$2.47 on their January statement that will be received in February. For those accounts served by Tri-City Service District the minimum bill will increase from \$63.67 to \$66.14, those served by Oak Lodge Sanitary District will increase from \$92.33 to \$94.80. Water usage over 600 cubic feet will be billed at \$2.42 per 100 cubic foot (748 gallons).

#### Business License Renewals

Business license renewals are due January 1st of each year. For businesses located within Gladstone the fee is \$100, plus \$5 per employee over 3 FTE's, an additional \$50 fee is required for any <u>NEW</u> businesses being operated out of a home. For rental properties, the fee is \$100 + \$25 for one rental unit, \$100 + \$50 for 2-5 rental units, \$100 + \$75 for 6-12 rental units and <u>\$100 + \$100 for 13+</u> rental units. #### Change in Hours of Operation at Gladstone and Oak Lodge Public Libraries

In response to community need, the Gladstone Library Board recently approved a change in hours of operation at the Gladstone and Oak Lodge library branches, effective January 1, 2019.

Members of the public can enjoy expanded hours at Oak Lodge Library, where the weekly schedule will increase by three hours. While the number of hours for Gladstone Library will not change, the update reflects more even distribution of open hours throughout the week with convenience in mind.

This change is meant to better serve the public by providing access to libraries during times that are more flexible with busy work and life schedules.

#### Liquor License Renewals

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) advises the City yearly for businesses that are eligible for a liquor license renewal. Oregon Revised Statues (ORS) 471.166 establishes the process for local governments to make recommendations of approval or denial to the OLCC. #### Gladstone Disposal Company Rate Adjustment Notice

Gladstone Disposal Company provides garbage, yard debris and recycling services for the City of Gladstone. The City Council has approved the following rate adjustment for the residential service in the City effective January 1, 2019.

Rates Effective January 1, 2019	
Weekly Service	Curbside (within 3ft. of Public Street)
35-Gallon Roll Cart	\$28.80 per Month
65-Gallon Roll Cart	\$39.15 per Month
95-Gallon Roll Cart	\$42.35 per Month
Monthly Service	\$6.50 per yard per pickup per Week
Yard Debris Subscription	\$4.50 per Month
On-Call Service (yard debris service not included)	\$4.00 per yard per pickup per Week

There will be additional fees for any special service provided.

Please keep the roll carts and bins we provide for garbage, yard debris, and recycling in good condition, and remove them from the street or curb after collection. Do not overfill the roll carts; the lids must be closed and the material must fall loosely when emptied.

Please call our office at 503-656-9426 to make changes to your garbage service, to schedule a pickup of large items (furniture, appliances, tires, etc.), or to order a large container for a clean-up project.

For those of you that must drive in the weather that winter brings, consider a new can of deicer for your car. Driving with frozen windows can cause accidents. Don't forget to keep an emergency travel kit in the car with a blanket, water, high energy food and an Emergency light and /or road flares.

CHIMNEY SAFETY REMINDER: Always dispose of fireplace ashes in a metal bucket and place it outside away from any combustibles. Never use a paper bag for your ashes and do not place the ashes inside your garage until final disposal. Have your chimney cleaned or checked regularly. Prevention is a lot cheaper than a fire caused by a dirty or clogged chimney. Please recycle Christmas gift wrap. There are an increasing number of chimney fires each year from placing wrapping paper in the fireplace or woodstove.

#### A Rake is All it Takes!




Wet and rainy Pacific Northwest winters require that we all get weatherized. Some things

that you might not think about are the catch basins in your neighborhood. Gladstone Public Works is diligent to keep our stormwater drains and conveyances cleaned out and rain ready. However, with over 1,000 stormwater catch basins within our city, Public Works appreciates citizen assistance in helping to keep the storm basins clear. If a catch basin in the street near your house becomes covered with leaves, a rake is all it takes to clear the leaves away. Please sweep up debris from your yard and driveway, and do not blow or hose leaves or other material into the streets, as it will wash into the storm basins. Keeping the catch basins clear allows stormwater to leave the city and helps prevent neighborhood flooding. Remember, a rake is all it takes!

#### Portable Storage Containers

The City of Gladstone requires a permit to use portable storage containers or "PODS". PODS can be placed on the street or public right of way for up to 72 hours. PODS can be placed on private property for up to 30 days. #### Clean Water Tips

Protecting our groundwater is important, especially since 70% of flooding. Residents are asked to help keep catch basins clear of debris. If a catch basin is full or is not draining after a rain event

#### Public Works Sanding

Sanding roadways during winter months is done after snowfall by spreading small sized crushed rock on streets to improve vehicle traction. During inclement snow and ice conditions, the city's Public Works Dept. will sand Oatfield & Webster roads and sometimes just the STOP intersections along Portland Ave. Depending on road conditions, Los Verdes Dr & Springhill Dr may also be sanded for use by residents in the Sherwood Forest, Los Verdes, Forest Park, Springhill & Charolais Heights neighborhoods. In addition, Caldwell Rd & Park Way to Oatfield Rd are often closed to through traffic during ice & snow conditions. Other streets may be sanded or closed to through traffic depending on weather and driving conditions. Please note that sanding of city streets is generally not effective unless done after snowfall ends. City residents are also requested to keep sidewalks clear of ice and snow. Thank you!

#### Clackamas County Public Alerts

On Sept. 1 2018, Clackamas County upgraded how it communicates with residents during times of disaster by replacing its emergency notification software system. All residents are urged to enroll, or reenroll, at www.clackamas.us/publicalerts.

By providing contact information, county residents can receive critical emergency messaging via email, phone call, and text during times of disasters. Important messages that could be relayed include notices to evacuate, shelter-in-place, shelter locations, etc. Residents enrolled in the previous system - the Clackamas County Emergency Notification System, or CCENS must re-enroll themselves in the new system in order to receive future messages.



#### Use Common Sense When Using GPS Navigation

When roads are closed and your GPS navigation system directs you onto a detour route, keep in mind that the device you count on for guidance could instead guide you into trouble. Most navigation tools don't take current road or weather conditions into consideration. They may direct you onto remote roads that are neither maintained nor passable in all weather conditions.

Already this season someone had to be rescued after following their GPS navigation device off the main highway and onto a snow covered forest service road near Mount Hood. Fortunately, they received help and everyone was safe but this is not always been the case.

Navigation systems and similar smart phone apps are great tools, but travelers may need to verify the identified detour route is appropriate given current conditions for the vehicle they are driving. Here are a few tips to consider:

What you can do:

- Be aware that the app on your phone or in your GPS device might not have the latest information don't follow it blindly!
- Use TripCheck.com (available on your computer and on your phone) to get the latest on state road conditions, or call 511.
- Remember, in winter conditions (or in summer's fire season), roads can be impassable, so USE COMMON SENSE.
- If you are not familiar with an area and current road conditions, stay on state roads and don't attempt detours onto roads you don't know.
- Alter your travel plans. If you are not sure of the route and road conditions your GPS device directs you to, ask local folks for information and consult a map. It is better to stay the night in town rather than be stuck on a remote road in the middle of nowhere.

What we will do:

- ODOT crews work continually to keep state highways safe, but during certain conditions, such as blowing snow and freezing temperatures, you may want to avoid travel altogether.
- ODOT will issue media flash alerts if roads are closed. These will be updated continually on TripCheck.com. ## ODOT ##

#### Winterizing Your Water Pipes Inside & Out

Fall is the time of year to start thinking about winterizing your water pipes. Here are some precautionary measures you can take now to help avoid the expense and inconvenience of frozen water pipes later. \*Disconnect and drain all outdoor hoses, and protect outside pipes and faucets. \*In some homes, the outside faucet has a separate "shut-off" in the basement or crawl space. If you do have a separate valve for outside faucets, shut it off. Then go outside, disconnect the garden hose and turn on the faucets to drain water from the line. Even if you do not have a separate "shut off valve" for outside faucets, wrap and/or cover ALL outside faucets and hose bibs. Disconnect garden hoses, otherwise, a single hard freeze can burst the faucet or the pipe it connects to. \*If you have water pipes in unheated areas such as the garage or crawl space, wrap the water pipes with pipe insulation or wrapping materials. \*Turn off the water to the irrigation system at the main shut-off valve. \*Open all drain valves and drain water from system. \*Wrap insulating material around ground valves and backflow prevention devices. #### Street Parking Regulations



We are approaching the time of year when owners of boats, trailers, and RVs are preparing them for winter storage. Gladstone Code Enforcement

would like to remind its citizens that there are city ordinances regulating on-street parking and these ordinances are very specific as to the type of vehicles that can be parked on city streets. Chapter 10.04.230 of the Gladstone Municipal Code (available online on the city's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us) describes parking issues. Please be mindful of neighbors and use alternative parking, such as RV pads or local RV storage facilities, etc. By following these guidelines we can all enhance city services, improve public safety and help make our neighborhoods more "neighbor friendly" for Gladstone residents.

#### Hanging Tree Branches

Public Works is asking residents to trim low hanging tree branches that may damage vehicles or injure pedestrians by cutting branches seven feet (7') above sidewalks and fourteen feet (14') above streets. Please cut up your branches and place them in your yard debris cart. If Public Works determines there is a risk of damage or injury, they may cut your tree branches without notice. During winter months, please remove portable basketball hoops from city streets to reduce interference with street sweeping.

#### Your Gladstone Nature Park: What Is FOGNAP?





Confirm security: before paying online, look for an "s" in "https://" in the address box; pay by credit card as shoppers can dispute charges if ordered items are not delivered or if unauthorized charges occur; keep documentation of online orders and check credit card statements for suspicious activity.

### Protecting Your Inside Plumbing

Cold weather can play havoc with winter pipes. To help prevent issues with your plumbing during the colder, winter months, here are a few tips: \*Keep garage doors closed if there are water supply lines in the garage. \*Open cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing. \*When the weather is very cold outside, let the cold water drip from the faucet. Running water through the pipe—even at a trickle helps prevent pipes from freezing. \*Keep the thermostat set to the same temperature both during the day and at night. If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F. \*Install outside hose bib insulation bonnets. \*Blow out outdoor irrigation system piping.
