Keeping our Fish Happy and Healthy by Lowering Water Temperature

Gladstone Public Works wants to remind our residents that urban waterways can be polluted and heated by our everyday activities. We can improve water quality by making mindful decisions about lawn care and vehicle maintenance, and by being responsible pet owners (scoop the poop!) Not all water quality issues are so obvious. Gladstone Public Works is charged with monitoring the stormwater that ultimately flows into the Clackamas and Willamette Rivers. Urban development has disrupted original watershed processes, especially by the removal of riparian vegetation. This has resulted in elevated water temperature that can negatively impact coldwater fish and other coldwater aquatic species. One way to help cool the water is to maintain native riparian vegetation along the edges of streams. Shade, from trees and other riparian plants, has been shown to be more effective in temperature reduction when streams are 20 feet wide or less. Many of the streams that flow into the Clackamas and Willamette are less than 20 feet wide, with many being less than 10 feet wide. Does a stream flow through your property? Are you looking for ways you can help improve water quality in Gladstone? The Clackamas River Basin Council has streamside vegetation recommendations and they can be found at www.clackamasriver.org.

The Metro Council, the elected board that oversees the regional government for the greater Metropolitan area, has declared a vacancy for its seat representing Metro Council District 2, and will accept applications for that vacancy.

District 2 generally includes areas within Metro within Clackamas County east of Tigard, Durham, Tualatin, and Wilsonville, and west of that was formerly the city of Damascus. It also includes portions of Southwest Portland south of Interstate 5 and Southwest Canby Street. Some communities within District 2 include Lake Oswego, West Linn, Oregon City, Gladstone, Milwaukie, Happy Valley, Johnson City, Rivergrove, Jennings Lodge, Oak Grove, Dunthorpe and Stafford. Applicants must be a resident of District 2.

<u>Chair exercise class-</u>Each Tuesday and Thursday from 10:15 to 11:15 am. This is an video led, at your own pace, exercise program which is free to seniors. We hope to see you here.

Books and puzzles-We have a great selection of books to borrow and puzzles to challenge you.

<u>Computers</u>– We have a designated room for computers, for seniors only.

Programs

<u>Transportation</u>— The Senior Center has an 14– passenger, wheel chair ramp-equipped tram. The Senior Center provides transportation services for Gladstone residents only, aged 60 or older. This service is offered through a partnership with the non-profit Ride Connection. All rides are offered for a suggested donation of \$1.00 each way per person.

We provide transportation to and from the Senior Center, weekly and monthly shopping trips to area stores, and excursions to local attractions on Fridays. Additionally, we provide transportation to medical and personal appointments (*please call 503-655-7701 at least 72 hours before appointment*). The Friday trips are open to all adults and there is typically a fee associated with each trip. Please see the current issue of the Glad Tydings Newsletter for the list of upcoming trips.

Nutrition— The Senior Center hosts a congregate lunch every Tuesday through Thursday at 11:45 am. Lunch is a suggested donation of \$2.50 per person, age 60 or older. For everyone else it is \$4.00 per person. We offer a nutritious hot meal with a soup and salad bar.

The Gladstone Senior Center is also the area provider for home-bound meals. If you live in the City of Gladstone and feel you may need assistance, please contact the Senior Center staff to schedule an assessment. Home-bound meals are a needs-based service and is cost-free.

Faces of Drinking Water With Jim Whynot City of Gladstone, Public Works Director By Christine Hollenbeck, Clackamas River Water Providers



Ensuring the delivery of safe clean drinking water takes many different professionals with a variety of background and skills. Recently we sat down with Jim Whynot, the Public Works Director for the City of Gladstone since December of 2015. Though Jim is a Public Works Director now, he started out and spent many years working in public drinking water.

How long did you work in the drinking water industry prior to your current position with Gladstone?

My first job in public drinking water was in 1990. I was a field worker for the old Clairmont Water District which is now Clackamas River Water South. During my time with Clairmont I earned my Distribu-

tion Certification 1, and after three years I took a position with the City of Gresham in the water department. While at Gresham I continued my schooling and earned my Distribution Certification 2 and then my level 3 Certification. In 1998 West Linn was looking for a supervisor in the water department. I am always looking for ways to better myself and move forward so I applied and was given the position. I worked for the city of West Linn until recently in 2015 when I applied for and received the Public Works Director position here in Gladstone.

Do you have anything that you would say is your favorite or least favorite part of your job?

I really enjoy the challenges that come with working in public drinking water and public service. Sometimes it feels like unnecessary amounts of time is spent in the politics and being involved in personnel issues, but that is just the same thing that I enjoy. Because we are human we all need time to come to our own decisions. I see these challenges as great opportunities to better understand people and the issues with which we all are involved.

Do you plan on retiring from the City of Gladstone?

Sure (he says with a smile), but like I said, I'm always looking for a challenge.

What accomplishment/s are you most proud of in your career?

I am really proud of being a part of the positive turn around that occurred at the City of West Linn. Projects like the city's main replacement program, Water Master Plans, and the new 10 million gallon water reservoir are projects I am real proud to have been a part of. I like having the chance to help bring about positive change in a culture, see positive effects and receive positive feedback from the people I work for and work with.

What advice would you give to someone starting out in this field?

Start at the bottom and work your way up to the top. It really gives you a much better perspective of your own position and a healthy respect for the positions of the people with whom you work. Also, always try to get along with people. Being happy and enjoying the folks you work with is so much easier than being disappointed and miserable all of the time. How has the industry changed since you started?

Everything is so much more technical, there are more rules and regulations. Today we are doing so much more with much less. I am always saying, "Keep it real". I question everything and often ask, "Does that make sense?" Just because we have always done something one way doesn't mean that way is still working today.

What do you feel is most important about your job?

Being a leader, I try to lead by example and be consistent. This way everyone knows what to expect when they are working with me. What would you like the public to know about their drinking water?

People do not realize all that it takes to deliver their drinking water to them, the cost of the treatment facilities, the reservoirs, the distribution systems, the constant water quality sampling, and of course ongoing maintenance. Our water systems are designed and developed to meet peak day demand plus fire flow and it is all very expensive.

What can the public do to help make your job easier?

Support us, ask questions, and learn about their water systems, where the water comes from and how the system works. I think if people better understood the process of making and delivering safe drinking water they would understand why the cost is going up and be OK with it.

What's the one thing you can't live without at work?

I'm a pretty easy going guy, I don't require a lot to be happy. I guess if I had to pick something it would be to feel like I'm doing some good. It's nice to have harmony in the work place.

What would you say H2O is to you?

The obvious answer is LIFE. I think our public water is under appreciated. I've worked in a lot of different fields in public works and I enjoy the folks who work in drinking water the most. Their profession is very different than the others in public works. Their work is very physical and often done in less than optimal situations, yet they are fun and very happy people.

What do you do for fun when you're not working?

I enjoy hunting, camping, off roading and traveling with my wife.

What are the top priorities for the City of Gladstone in the next few years?

Getting our house in order, we are working hard to get the City into the present and preparing the City for the future. We are working to meet all industry standards and set Gladstone up for a sustainable future.

What is the biggest challenge facing your organization in the next couple of years?

Lack of funding and a lot of expectations to be met, we are working to bring the community together to help set priorities and make funding decisions.

In your opinion what is your agencies greatest accomplishments in the time you have been here?

The residents of the city of Gladstone recognized a need for change and the city staff is following through to answer their need.

Many utilities are struggling with the need to increase rates for their services, how are you approaching this?

We are going to phase in appropriate rates over time at a pace the community can support. It's much less of a shock that way, and we involve our residents in that decision making process.

If you could change one thing about state or federal regulatory programs, what would that be?

KEEP IT REAL! Anymore things seem to be over regulated, which makes programs and projects too complicated and way too expensive. I understand there is a process, but it sure would be more affordable and do-able if we could find a happy medium. What is something people might be surprised to know about your city?

That we are even here, Gladstone is such a small community and everything built around us has been built to go past us. We are a very tight community of good people. It's like Mayberry in the middle of the big city.

What is on your to-do list?


Continuing the process of moving us forward, I'm so glad to have the opportunity to help the City of Gladstone turn the corner.

Curfew

According to Gladstone Municipal Code, Chapter 9.16.040, It is unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years who is not emancipated pursuant to ORS <u>419B.550</u> to <u>419B.558</u>, to be in or upon any street, highway, park, alley, public right of way, or other public place between the hours specified in this section unless such minor is accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person twenty-one (21) years of age or older and authorized by the parent or by law to have such care and custody of the minor, or unless such minor is then engaged in an authorized school activity or lawful employment that makes it necessary to be in or upon such public place during the hours specified in this section. The curfew is between 11:00 p.m. and 5:30 a.m. of the following morning.

Noise Control

The City Council has determined that excessive sound is a serious hazard to the public health, welfare and the quality of life and it shall be the policy of the city to prevent excessive sound which may jeopardize the health, welfare and safety of citizens or degrade the quality of life. No person shall knowingly continue, cause or permit to be made or continue to make any excessive or unnecessary sounds. The following acts are declared to create excessive and unnecessary sounds in violation of this chapter without regard to the maximum sound levels: Radios, Phonographs, Tape players, Television Sets, Stereo Systems, Amplified sounds, external speakers, paging systems, Revving engines, Compression braking devices, Exhausts, Idling engines on motor vehicles, Vehicle tires, Motorcycles, go-karts, dune buggies, Motorboats, Powered model vehicles, Fireworks,

City Formalizes Fire Department Response Standards



After a comprehensive community risk assessment started last August, the Gladstone City Council adopted response time expectations for the Gladstone Fire Department at their January 23rd Council meeting. Formally known as "Standards of Cover", these standards provide guidance to fire department leadership so they can more effectively deploy personnel and request appropriate financial support from the City budget.

The development of these standards was based on national best practices, a historical data analysis, and input from elected officials, fire department staff, and a panel of citizens. Gladstone was able to adopt faster response standards than any other fire department in the Portland area, with response time benchmarks of five-and-a-half minutes for medical emergencies and six minutes for fires. "The advantages of Gladstone having its own fire department really became evident as we looked at setting our re-

sponse time standards," said Fire Chief Tom O'Connor. "With the addition of three full-time Fire Captains in late 2017, along with the continued commitment of our community-based fire firefighters, we are responding to 911 calls faster than ever before, 24-hours a day, every day of the year."

The complete *Community Risk Assessment: Standards of Cover* document is posted on the fire department section of the City of Gladstone website and is a must read for anyone interested in how the Gladstone Fire Department operates.


Dog Licenses
