Notice of Police and Fire Measures for November Elections By: City Administrator Jacque Betz

At the June 12, 2018 City Council meeting, the Council approved Resolution 1138, referring a ballot measure for the City of Gladstone renewal of current operating levy for fire and medical services; and Resolution 1139, referring a ballot measure for the City of Gladstone renewal of current operating levy for police services. Over the next few months the City will prepare public outreach to provide factual information on what these services provide. In the meantime, please feel free to reach out to Police Chief Jeff Jolley and Fire Chief Tom O'Connor to answer questions you may have.

Below is a summary of what has been provided to the election's office.

Measure 3-535 – Renewal of current operating levy for police services

What is the Police Services Levy? The City of Gladstone provides police services to preserve the safety and well-being of the community. This measure would continue to provide funding to maintain police services at their existing levels; the levy will continue the current level of service and the current level of staffing level to serve the Gladstone community.

What Would Renewal of the Police Levy Do? This measure renews the current police operating levy that will expire in June 2019. The City Council placed this measure on the ballot to maintain existing police services such as: -Current Staffing Level - 20% of staff funded via Levy. -Community Services Officer to administer Code violations -School Resource Officer -K9 Officer Program -Maintain connection with the regional county dispatch center (CCOM) to handle 911 priority calls and emergency response for fire, police, ambulance, search and rescue. -Crime prevention efforts / problem-oriented policing -Other services and equipment to maintain police service levels

With these positions, the Police Department is able to respond to emergency situations in a timely and effective manner and to provide consistent police services 24/7.

How does this Renewal Affect Property Taxes if Passed? The levy would continue the current rate of \$0.68 per \$1,000 of assessed value, unchanged from the current rate. The cost per household for a home with taxable value of \$200,000 (different from market value) would be, on average, about \$136. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an estimate only, based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of the estimate.

The proposed levy is a renewal request, not a new tax measure.

Measure 3-536 - Renewal of current operating levy for fire services

What is the Fire and Medical Services Levy? The Gladstone Fire Department, which responded to 1,600 calls for service in 2017, consists of 28 paid-on-call fire personnel and six full-time employees, one of which is funded by the current levy. The Fire Department combines 24 -hour on-duty crews with community based home responders to operate a fleet of two fire engines, one ladder truck, and one rescue squad for EMS and water rescues. The fire and medical services levy would continue the current staffing level and the existing level of fire and medical services for the Gladstone community.

What Would Renewal of the Fire and Medical Services Levy Do?

This measure will enable the Fire Department to maintain current fire and emergency medical services by funding one full-time training coordinator position to ensure firefighters receive proper required OSHA, state and federal training and that equipment is adequately maintained and repaired. In addition to continuing the current staffing level, the levy will provide capital funds for the purchase of necessary fire engines, rescue vehicles and protective equipment in the future along with other services to provide a high level of fire and emergency medical response to safeguard residents of Gladstone.

With continued support the Fire Department can:

Continue to efficiently and quickly respond to 9-1-1 calls 24/7

Respond to medical emergencies, vehicle accidents, structure and wild land fires, and water rescues

Properly train and equip firefighters with required skills and equipment to allow for optimal operation of the Fire Department Provide assistance to surrounding fire districts when needed


Maintain a safe workplace that meets heightened federal and state requirements


How Does this Renewal Affect Property Taxes If Passed? The levy would continue the current rate of \$.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value, unchanged from the current rate. The cost per household for a home with a taxable assessed value of \$200,000 (different than market value) would be, on average, about \$62.


What is the City's Recent Fire and Medical Service Tax Levy History? This levy was first authorized by voters in November of 1998. In 2012, the voters re-authorized a tax levy of \$.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value which expires in 2019. This levy would maintain the current rate of \$.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value for five years starting July 2019 through 2024.

The proposed levy is a renewal request, not a new tax measure.

What you should know about Gladstone's Stormwater Utility

1. Gladstone's elected leaders are committed to catch up on infrastructure needs. Water, Sewer, and Stormwater systems are in poor condition due to long deferred maintenance and lack of timely replacement of failing infrastructure. 2. A high priority is creating a Stormwater utility and a stormwater fee to address system maintenance needs. 3. The Stormwater utility/fee is needed to provide resources to prevent stormwater from mixing with untreated sewage and overflowing onto city streets and into the Clackamas River. 4. The city is committed to fixing the stormwater system and keeping it affordable for customers. Charter Review Advisory

At its September 11, 2018 meeting, the City Council will consider requests for appointments of eight positions into the Charter Review Advisory. The City Council is an elected policy decision-making body for the City of Gladstone. The council serves with an equal number of "lay members" on the Budget Committee and hears land use appeals of decisions made by the Planning Commission. Council members also serve as liaisons on City advisory boards, committees and commissions. Four-year terms of Mayor and City Council positions #1, #3 & #5, held by Tamara Stempel, Michael Milch, Matthew Tracy and Patrick McMahon respectively, will expire 12-31-2018. If you are interested in being a candidate, you must be registered voter and have resided in the City for twelve months immediately preceding the election on November 6, 2018. A nomination petition or declaration of candidacy must be filed between July 9 and August 28, 2018. th hot weather, leaving our pets in vehicles can turn tragic extremely fast. Here are some tips and thoughts that can help ep our pets safe: Myth – 'If I park outside, I can leave the window cracked an inch or two.' The answer is NO. Per a 2005 erican Academy of Pediatrics Study, in terms of heat-rise over time, it makes very little difference whether a car's windows are closed or parly open. In both cases, a car's interior temperature can rise approximately 40 degrees within one hour, even when the exterior temperature is y 72°F. Myth – 'If I park in the shade and just run a quick errand, it should be fine.' The answer is NO. Never leave your pet in arked car when the outside temperature is above 70°F. Not even with the windows partway down, not even in the shade, not even for a quick ernd. Dogs and cats can't sweat like humans, so they pant to lower their body temperature. If they're inside a car, recycling very hot air, panting rs no relief, and heat stroke can happen quickly. – Michael Dix DVM, Medical Director, Best Friends Animal Society.

you plan on going out on these hot days, it is best to leave your pets at home in a cool comfortable home with plenty of ter. If you are going to take your dog for a walk, remember that concrete and asphalt get extremely hot and pets have very sitive paws.

Fire hydrants are receiving annual maintenance and flushing By Fire Marshal Mike Funk

Summer 2018 is upon us and so is seasonal fire hydrant maintenance. Each year Gladstone Fire employs two or three non-firefighters to assist with fire hydrant maintenance. Our seasonal crew checks accessibility to all fire hydrants within the City. You may notice crews performing weed removal in preparation for flow testing and paint. Oregon Fire Code requires a 3 foot clearance around all fire hydrants, which includes flowers, trees and shrubbery. Please give attention to the fire hydrant on your property and cut back any impinging growth prior to maintenance crew arrival. Please note that in addition to the direct clearance around hydrants, as the law applies to vehicles, a clear vision and access must be maintained at all times. A 10 foot wide space is required in front of hydrants so do not park a vehicle within 5 feet (either direction) of where the fire hydrant faces the street. As always, never park in front of a fire hydrant.

Water flow testing is performed for a couple of reasons. First, as the fire department responds to a fire emergency, water supply plays a key role in extinguishing a fire. When seasonal crews flow each hydrant in Gladstone, they are checking for volume of water flow and pressure available at that hydrant. The yearly flow also helps keep the system clean which is why each hydrant is flowed for a couple of minutes. The volume of water flowing is very different than the normal residential use in any neighborhood. Because of this high volume flushing you may experience a minor discoloration in your tap water during or just following our test flows. A noticeable drop in water pressure will occur during our testing, but all normal pressure will return as we exit your neighborhood. If you do notice a discoloration in your tap water just run the faucet about a minute or until the water runs clear.

Have you ever wondered why the fire hydrants around town are different colors? Part of our annual maintenance is to turn on (or operate) every fire hydrant in town (over 300 of them). This ensures that none of the caps are stuck, it opens fully and it flows the expected volume of water. As you drive by a fire hydrant, most people see just that; a fire hydrant. As you look more closely you will notice some hydrants have 2 ports and some have 3. There are currently about 6 different manufacturers represented in Gladstone's fire hydrants. While all of our hydrants operate in a similar fashion the volume of water that flows from them differ. That is the reason for our different colored tops. We paint all the barrels "Safety Orange" but the caps are color coded to a national color standard that tells our firefighters what volume levels can be expected from the hydrant they are attaching the fire engine to.







Gladstone Food Pantry

A task force of concerned community members are working with Gladstone Schools to reopen the pantry as soon as it's practical and seek help from others who support this effort The Pantry has a location, large supply of food, and fantastic volunteers. However, as a school-based pantry, recent school funding cuts eliminated the Pantry Coordinator position, which is an integral part of managing volunteers, inventory, prep, and more. The task force is working to raise money to fund a part time coordinator over the next three years, which would allow the pantry to reopen and continue to serve the over 2300 households that visited last year, and more that we can't count. One Pantry client said, "This pantry helps me, and whatever I don't use, I take to neighbors who are shut-ins so they don't have to worry so much about how to get enough food." The minimum target is \$15,000 per year. Task force volunteers will be reaching out to neighbors and local businesses in the areas that are served by the pantry, including Gladstone, Milwaukie, and the surrounding neighborhoods, to sponsor the pantry. Several local businesses have already expressed interest in this effort and we are optimistic. Individual donations are welcome. Oregon's NEW Cell Phone Penalty

Beginning July 1st Oregon implemented increased fines for using cell phones while driving. According to information obtained by the Oregonian, over 10,000 accidents were at-

tributed to distracted driving between 2012 and 2015. Clearly, cell phone use is a major contributor which is the target of this legislation. First time offenders may receive a citation with a minimum \$130 price tag. Second offenses range from a minimum \$220 and a maximum of \$2,000. New in July, those with 3 offenses in a 10 year period could be fined up to \$2,500 and potential jail time. Of course when driving, you really shouldn't be doing anything other than focusing on......driving. Have a safe, accident-free summer!

Street Parking Regulations

We are approaching the time of year when owners of boats, trailers, and RVs are preparing them for summer outings. Gladstone Code Enforcement would like to remind its citizens that there are City ordinances regulating on-street parking, and these ordinances are very specific as to the type of vehicles that can be parked on city streets. Chapter 10.04.230 of the Gladstone Municipal Code (available online on the City's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us) describes parking issues. Please be mindful of neighbors and use alternative parking, such as RV pads or local RV storage facilities, etc. By following these guidelines we can all enhance City services, improve public safety and help make our neighborhoods more "neighbor friendly" for Gladstone residents.

Portable Storage Containers

The City of Gladstone requires a permit to use portable storage containers or "PODS". PODS can be placed on the street or public right of way for up to 72 hours. PODS can be placed on private property for up to 30 days. 
