Measure 3-530. Gladstone Library

If the measure passes, how would the library be funded? The City would lease property to the County for \$1 per year. Funding for the construction of the new library would come from existing funds from the District's property tax of .3974 dollars per thousand of assessed value and a future revenue bond by the County.

Library operating costs would not change with the District continuing to fund the majority of the Library's operating costs. Currently \$700,159 annually and the City would continue to contribute approximately \$200,000.


How was the approximately \$200,000 calculated?

In the current settlement agreement between Clackamas County and the City of Gladstone it states the City will submit a measure to its electors for the May 2018 primary election to authorize a roughly 6,000 square foot library located in Gladstone and also specify that the City will contribute approximately \$200,000 per fiscal year of general fund revenue, with increases indexed to the annual rate of increase of the City's property tax revenue, to fund operating costs. A breakdown of those costs are as follows:

The City has never run a formal cost allocation plan, and that is normal for cities of our size, but the costs have been of an ongoing nature historically. If we recapped the previous two years utilizing the same information (adjusted for applicable year costs) the Library would be responsible for approximately the same proportionate share as calculated for FY 16/17. It is true that former administrations have not reported this subsidy to the State, however the City has always subsidized the operations of library services utilizing general fund revenues in addition to library district funds.

Gladstone Fire Department Swift water training

Gladstone Fire's surface water and rope rescue teams will operate in conjunction with our existing dive rescue team. This will greatly improve our ability to respond to incidents on and near the Clackamas and Willamette Rivers, as well as anywhere within Clackamas County that regional water or rope rescue resources are needed.

This Levy has been in place since 1998 and we will soon be seeking a renewal with no additional increase in the levy rate.

There are many benefits having the Levy which increases the safety of all of our citizens. Our Levy provides funding for approximately 25% of our personnel and operating expenses. Some of the highlights of the Levy include funding for:

School Resource Officer (SRO) - provides a dedicated officer to be assigned to the Gladstone Schools to partner with faculty to enhance the safety of students and staff. This officer provides on-site presence during the school year and special events.

K9 Program - this program is back in service having received a \$10,000 donation from a good citizen to purchase the new dog. Maintenance, training, and care of the dog are funded through the Levy.

2 Police Patrol Officers - are funded through the Levy, ensuring Gladstone citizens have 24/7 coverage that meets the staffing standards for Oregon.

Community Service Officer (CSO) - this position is responsible for code enforcement directed at enhancing the

The Gladstone Police Department is partially funded by a livability in our city. The CSO also receives "non-suspect" crime reports and assists officers on accident scenes, help-

> Executive Assistant – this position which began in 2012, is responsible for invoice tracking/payment, arranging training, assisting walk-in customers, assisting the records clerk, correspondence, and coordinating our emergency management efforts. Having this position allows sergeants to be free from "station duties" and spend more time patrolling the community.

> <u>C-COM Dispatch Service</u> - C-COM is the Clackamas County dispatch center that provides police and fire dispatch services for Gladstone. This is the center that answers your 911 calls and sends an officer to assist.

> All of the above programs greatly assist us in providing quality service and maintaining a safe community. We made a conscience decision not to ask for an increase, but to work hard to provide services in a financially responsible manner. The Police Levy is not a new tax, does not increase taxes, and specifically, does not replace any other city program.

> We continue to value and appreciate the support of our community and are dedicated to providing safety for our citizens. Thank you!

High Rocks, AMR Lifeguard Program & Gladstone Fire Department (GFD)

High Rocks Park is approximately 1.5 acres in size with the Clackamas River bordering Gladstone and Oregon City, and is a popular place for people to escape the heat or just to enjoy a family outing. High Rocks has seen many fatalities over the years that could have been prevented with a life jacket or a little bit of education on the dangers of the cold and fast water. The Clackamas River in the High Rocks area hides many dangers including strong currents, extremely cold water, large underwater rocks, and large pieces of scrap steel. Some of these items are barely under the surface where many people jump from the rocks and river temperatures range from the mid-40 degrees in the winter to mid-60 degrees in the summer. After numerous drownings over the years, American Medical Response (AMR), our local ambulance company, brought their River Safety and Rescue Program to our local waterway in 2002. Even with AMR Lifeguards on duty from Memorial Day to Labor Day, there are those situations that require additional resources or a "full marine rescue". The Clackamas Water Rescue Consortium, including the GFD, responds to incidents that require specialized rescue including divers, swift water swimmers, and boat operations. This year, the GFD will be doing outreach programs to educate swimmers about the dangers of the Clackamas River to include High Rocks. Please be safe as you enjoy High Rocks Park this year and remember to have a healthy respect for the dangers of swimming in this area.

You can't burn that in Gladstone -Part 2

Thanks for reading. From the number of questions I re- What do you mean by construction debris? If the wood has been ceived regarding outdoor burning, I can see that several of you are concerned about doing the right thing.

Please read the following as I will do my best to explain the rules and provide some better definitions.

The first message I need to get out to you is outdoor burning is not allowed in the city of Gladstone. Because Gladstone is situated within the Metro - DEQ no burn area, outdoor burning is generally not allowed.

Gladstone does not have burn days. If you call a hotline and get the information or recording that it is a <u>burn day</u>. That message **DOES NOT APPLY TO YOU**. Outdoor burning of garbage, grass, leaves, twigs, yard debris, plastics, tires, petroleum products, any type of construction debris or any other product that may release offensive smoke or odors into the surrounding area, IS NOT ALLOWED IN GLADSTONE.

There are nearby communities such as Molalla. Estacada. Canby, Oregon City and Damascus where all or part of their city are outside this DEQ boundary. These cities may allow residents outside the DEQ boundary to burn. But not those residents within the ban area.

THIS IS NOT THE CASE IN GLADSTONE DUE TO THE ENTIRE CITY BEING WITHIN THE DEQ BOUNDARY.

What is seasoned fire wood? Can I use the stuff I see at the store? You can use what is available from the store as long as it is dry. If the wood from the store has been in the rain- it should not be used until it is dried out. Seasoned fire wood is considered wood that has not been living for 6 months to a year. Most wood will be dry throughout, after a year.

used in the building homes or furnishings it would be considered construction debris. Another way to determine acceptance - has it been painted, stained, oiled or coated in any way? If there are nails driven into it, glued together or has sheet rock attached it should not be burned.

What about wood pallets? Most wood pallets should not be used. The pallet may look clean however many times they have been used in industry or food service. After use in this way most pallets should not be burned due to absorption of food and industrial chemicals.

Do the same rules apply if I burn inside my house? YES, in fact you will be placing yourself and/or your family at greater risk when burning prohibited materials inside the home.

What about a recreational fire or a cooking fire? While general outdoor burning is prohibited in the city limits, there are provisions that allow for (small) recreational or cooking fires. Recreational fires are fires that are small and contained to a commercial patio pot, burn pit or stove. Fuels used in these situations are restricted to clean seasoned <u>firewood</u>. (See season firewood above)

Some people are sensitive to burning wood; however the fire department has no authority to regulate recreational fires that are burning only clean seasoned firewood.

Under no circumstances are these (recreational fire) guidelines intended to allow the use of any prohibited materials (see the list at the first of this article.)

Backyard Barbecue & Outdoor Fun



Summer is on its way—time to have a BBQ! Always be in attendance while you use your propane or charcoal cookers. To help insure your safety, check the date near the handle of your propane bottle. Propane bottles need to be recertified after 12 years initially and every 5 years thereafter. If charcoal briquettes are more your style, be sure to store the bag in a dry place at all times. If your charcoal based fuel gets wet or damp, they can self-ignite under certain conditions, and that can spell disaster. If

The City Council has determined that excessive sound is a serious hazard to the public health, welfare and the quality of life and it shall be the policy of the city to prevent excessive sound which may jeopardize the health, welfare and safety of citizens or degrade the quality of life. No person shall knowingly continue, cause or permit to be made or continue to make any excessive or unnecessary sounds. The following acts are

declared to create excessive and unnecessary sounds in violation of this chapter without regard to the maximum sound levels: Radios, Phonographs, Tape players, Television Sets, Stereo Systems, Amplified sounds, external speakers, paging systems, Revving engines, Compression braking devices, Exhausts, Idling engines on motor vehicles, Vehicle tires, Motorcycles, go-karts, dune buggies, Motorboats, Powered model vehicles, Fireworks, Tampering, Animals, Steam whistles, Horns, and Compressed air devices. See table for allowed sound levels. Day time hours are between 7:00am-10:00pm the same day, Night time hours are between 10:00pm and 7:00am the following day. Address Numbers on Your Home

The Gladstone Fire Dept. requests residents please check address numbers placed on the front of their homes. Address numbers need to be 4 inches or larger, have a light for night time hours and stand out in a contrasting color to the home. Their quick response when responding to emergencies is dependent upon them finding your home. Please do your part and place large, lighted, numbers on your home!

Clean Water Tips

Protecting our groundwater is important, especially since 70% of the state relies, at least partially, on it for drinking water. This is why we must keep our groundwater clean by: *preventing oil & fluid leaks with proper vehicle maintenance; *picking up pet waste; *never dumping any type of waste into gutters, catch basins or into the street. Cleaning catch basins also helps maintain good flow through the stormwater system preventing flooding. Residents are asked to help keep catch basins clear of debris. If a catch basin is full or is not draining after a rain event and residents have removed any road debris from the catch basin, please contact Public Works at 503-656-7957.

Let's Talk About Trash: Rigid Plastics

Due to weak plastics pricing, recycling depots have suspended accepting bulky and rigid plastics. These plastics belong in the garbage.

Bulky and rigid plastics include lawn furniture, crates and storage bins, take out trays, containers, cups, etc. Limit plastics going into the landfill by remembering to use reusable containers whenever possible. Bring your own containers to the store.

Community Promotions—Business Development Ad-Hoc Committee

In summer of 2018 the City of Gladstone will establish an Ad Hoc Committee to discuss how revenues from the Business License program should be spent. The Council adopted resolution No. 1098, a resolution formalizing the revenue collected for business licenses and fees be transferred to the Community Promotions-Business Development line item in the City's budget. Business licenses are required for a business operating within the city limits, whether for a rental property, commercial, or home-based business. In an attempt to improve transparency and accountability with the use of public funds, the City Council desires to formalize how the revenue will be spent. Two members from Council and up to seven members of the community (citizens and/or those that have a business license in Gladstone) will make-up the committee. 'Ad-Hoc" means a public body created by Council for a particular purpose, issue, or need. Therefore is it expected this committee would meet monthly until recommendations on how the funds should be spent for fiscal year 2018-19 is completed. Gladstone City Business Licenses

Gladstone Municipal Code states in part, "No person shall carry on any business within the city without first obtaining a license" All businesses pay a fee of \$100, plus \$5 per employee, and if the business is operating out of a home residence, an additional \$50 fee is required. For owners of rental properties, the \$100 fee applies plus an additional \$25 per rental property. Business license applications may be downloaded from the city's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us. Sidewalks and Clear Vision

The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property and are liable to any person suffering injury due to a defective sidewalk. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." This is similar to property owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection.

Dog Licenses



All dogs are required to be licensed when they reach 6 months of age. The City currently contracts with Clackamas

County for dog licensing. License renewals are due the last day of the month in which the license expires. Additional information and renewal forms may be found at the county's website at www.clackamas.us/dogs or by calling 503-656-8628.
