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<u>Gladstone Civic Center Project Update</u> The City held its first public meeting this month on the new police department and city hall buildings to be located at 18505 Portland Avenue (adjacent to the City's existing public works/shops property). We expect them to be constructed and operational by March 2020. At the October 3rd Open House the Design-Builder team shared their findings to date specifically related to the Site Concept and project schedule, which included the following:

- Project description
- Projects status
- Process for public meetings and citizen engagement
- Bid opportunities
- Construction
- Construction camera for public access

The City is pursuing the Gladstone Civic Center Project through a unique process called "Progressive Design Build" in which the selected Design-Builder team is responsible for designing and constructing a project that: 1) accommodates the City's stated program, and 2) delivers a Base Project within the City's \$12 million budget.

The City's intent in choosing the Progressive Design Build approach is to provide a streamlined process that minimizes impacts on limited City staff resources while meeting the commitment to the voters who passed the measure. In the first phase, the Design-Builder's due diligence work has focused on assuring that:

- The previously-approved building program and parking fit on the site
- Desired functions can be accommodated within a cost-effective building form
- City staff is comfortable with the internal layout of the spaces.
- Interim cost estimates keep project within budget

On November 7th, the Design-Builder returns to City Council to summarize scope, schedule and budget findings based upon the following investigations conducted through October:

- Site geotechnical conditions
- Mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems approaches
- Building massing and site layout (concepts reviewed at July 24th Council work session and October 3rd Open House)
- Exterior building materials and envelope assumptions
- Code-required site improvements
- Required permits and approval processes
- Staff refinements to building layout
- 50% Design Development cost estimate

The team will then refine project scope, schedule and budget assumptions per Council direction from the November 7th meeting and are scheduled to return to Council by the end of November for Phase 2 direction. The Nov. 7th work session will begin at 5:30 pm.

House Checks While You Are Away

Did you know that the Gladstone Police Department will do house checks for you when you are on vacation, free of charge? All you have to do is come down to the Police Department, 535 Portland Avenue, and fill out a simple form. The Police Department will monitor your home for up to two (2) weeks.

We will need to know when you will be gone and an emergency contact. We will also need to know if someone else will be checking on the home, someone taking care of pets, or have kids that may come and go to avoid any confusion about who has permission to be at your home.

Once the form is filled out and turned in, a Gladstone Police Officer will drive by the home or may even conduct a premise check of the home every day while you are away. It's just another service the Gladstone Police Department will provide so you can enjoy your vacation free of worry.

2. Candles are very common especially around the holidays. Please be sure to give them extra attention and care to avoid some of the common accidents. $\blacktriangle Candles$ can be beautiful but are one of the leading causes of residential fires recorded in 2015. Never leave your candles unattended. ▲Be sure the candles are in an approved holder and in a safe place. Many times pets or children can accidentally knock them over during day to day living. Remember the new flameless candles are a safe option. They produce a nice flickering light – with no open flame. ▲In the event an accident occurs, teach all family members how to call 9-1-1, as well as the difference between a nuisance and an emergency. Remember: ONLY - Working smoke alarms save lives and smoke alarms need to be replaced every ten years.

Gladstone Public Works Department schedules our 2018 leaf pick-up service with cost effectiveness and efficiency in mind. Public Works asks your cooperation by filling your yard debris cans first before putting your leaves in the street. Each resident who puts their leaves in their yard debris can each week helps reduce the cost of sending out the street sweeper, a loader, and up to two dump trucks to provide this service to our residents. We do appreciate all our citizens who contribute in helping to maintain efficiency in our city. The schedule below best utilizes public funds reflected in both manpower and equipment hour costs. We will be picking up your leaf piles within the following date ranges.

Areas 6 and 7 November 5 - 9 Areas 8 and 1 November 13 - 21



Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb. This extra space between the curb and the leaf pile is to allow water to drain into the city's storm basins. With the rainy season coming, any help you can provide to keep your neighborhood's stormwater catch basins clear of leaves and debris will benefit both you and your neighbors. A rake is all it takes!

Please have your leaf pile ready for pick-up by the first day of your area's designated pick-up schedule. While it is important to have your leaves ready for pick-up by the first day on your schedule, please remember that leaves placed in the street too far in advance of leaf pick-up will cause the leaves to wash into our storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding in your neighborhood. The best practice is to put your leaves out for pick-up the day before your area's first scheduled day. The city currently does not have a chipper or a way to dispose of tree limbs, twigs or other green waste, so we ask that you please not mix anything in with your leaves. Public Works always appreciates our citizen cooperation in helping to keep our city streets clean and our storm drains clear of leaves, allowing rain water to drain away from homes and businesses.

Once the public works crew has visited your area, we will not return until the next scheduled pick-up date for your area. This year's leaf pick-up schedule ends on Friday, December 14th. However, for citizens with hardships that prevented them from putting their leaves out during the scheduled city-wide leaf pick-up service, the Public Works crew will pick-up large leaf piles by request only, between Monday, December 17th through Friday, January 11th. To be considered as a large leaf pile, leaves must be a volume of at least two heaping wheelbarrow loads. Smaller amounts of leaves may be disposed in your yard debris cans. Public Works appreciates everyone's consideration of the cost involved in providing the leaf pick-up service to the community. Working together, we can make this effort as efficient and cost effective as possible.



Are You Feeding the Skunks?



Like many of our native animals, skunks are opportunists at heart. They are attracted to easily obtained food, such as pet food left outside, as well as easily accessible denning sites, such as under a porch or a shed. During the fall, skunks are looking for a cozy den to spend the winter

months. If accessible habitat is not available for skunks, they will move on to better surroundings. If you are concerned about skunks, remember to not leave pet food outdoors and close off any areas around your property that might be an attractive denning spot. Skunks are nocturnal, generally mild mannered and non-confrontational. But if you allow your pets out at night, there is a chance it could have an unfortunate encounter with a skunk. The Humane Society recommends the following mix to clean and deodorize skunk spray:

1 quart of 3% hydrogen peroxide 1/4 cup baking soda

1 teaspoon liquid dishwashing soap

Wear rubber gloves and wash this solution into your pet's fur as soon as possible after spraying occurs, being careful to avoid your pet's eyes. Scrub deeply, but don't leave the mixture on any longer than necessary. Rinse completely and the smell should be gone. Do not mix up this solution ahead of time or store it. And remember, skunks perform a beneficial service in consuming insects and other pests. THE HIGH COST OF DEFERRING STREET REPAIRS & MAINTENANCE

Pavement Management is a set of tools and philosophies designed to manage the maintenance activities of asphalt concrete and Portland concrete pavements. A Pavement Management Plan (PMP) consists of a module to keep track of existing and historical pavement condition data and a decision making process to help choose the most cost-effective maintenance strategies and which streets to treat when. In December, 2016, Gladstone hired Capitol Asset & Pavement Services to conduct a pavement study of every street and road in Using industry accepted standards, they formulated a Pavement Management Program under which Public Works is operating to best manage the City's streets and roads in the most cost-effective manner possible, and extending the life of our roads as long as possible until such time that the City has funding for a capitol improvement project to replace our worst streets.

Two philosophies are generally considered in a PMP: One is the "worst first" policy. In a "worst first" policy, streets are allowed to deteriorate to a nearly failed condition before any rehabilitation (such as overlays or reconstructions), are applied. This can also be called the "If it ain't broke, don't fix it" mentality.

However, best practices in pavement management systems are designed with a more cost-effective, "best first" approach. The reasoning behind this philosophy, is that it is better to treat streets with lower-cost, preventative maintenance treatments, such as slurry seals, chip seals, and crack seals, and extend their life cycle before the street condition deteriorates to a state where it requires more costly rehabilitation and reconstruction treatments. Generally, paved streets spend about three-quarters of their life-cycle in fair to good condition, where the street shows little sign of deterioration and has a high service level. After this time, the street condition begins to deteriorate at a rapid rate and, if not maintained properly, will soon reach a condition where it will require costly overlays and reconstructions. If treated with a surface seal and other preventative measures, the street condition will remain at a good level for a longer period of time. Figure 1 shows a typical

Unfortunately, over the last decades, the city of Gladstone has not committed sufficient funding towards pavement management. This now finds many of our roads and streets in failed or failing conditions, with the best practice to be completely rebuilding those streets. Until the City has sufficient funding to undertake a large capital project such as this, we are focusing on keeping our other streets in as good repair as possible Doing otherwise and slurry sealing over a failed road is a waste of resources and could be considered as "Putting lipstick on a pig." That road would fail once again, very quickly, possibly in one season.

Fall Water Conservation Tips

Take Stock Of Your Water Usage Habits-Even if you're careful about your water usage in the home, chances are there are important steps you're not taking and factors that you're not considering. As the air begins to cool, for example, you may enjoy taking a few extra minutes in a hot shower. Standard shower heads use more than two gallons of water a minute. Even a small amount of extra shower time every day adds up to large water waste. Consider changing your old shower head to a newer 1 - 1.5 GPM (gallons per minute) low flow shower head. You can still enjoy that shower without wasting water.

Water Plants Less-Longer nights, cooler temperatures, and increased rainfall means outdoor plants and lawns require much less water. Purchase an EPA Watersense certified smart controller or rain sensor switch for your existing controller to stop your irrigation system from coming on when it isn't necessary. Visit our website for rebate information on EPA Watersense certified smart controllers and rain sensors. Lastly don't forget to winterize your irrigation system. Make sure to turn off and drain your irrigation no later than October 31st to prevent the pipes from freezing.

Install Water Efficient Faucets Aerators-While not running water needlessly, such as letting the faucet flow when brushing your teeth, or scrubbing dishes after a large holiday celebration many households can further decrease their water use by installing high efficiency (1 – 1.5 GPM) faucet aerators in the kitchen and in the bathroom.

Upgrade Your Toilets-Toilets are the number one water waster in the home, replacing your old toilet with a new EPA certified High Efficiency Toilet (HET) is an excellent way to reduce unnecessary water use. If you're unable to replace your toilets, you can use toilet tank banks, or fill cycle diverters to reduce the amount of water used per flush. Visit our website for rebate information on EPA certified High Efficiency Toilets.

Check Behind the Scenes-Check all faucets and, wherever possible, pipes for leaks. A single drip may seem insignificant, but that volume adds up — a single dripping faucet can waste more than 3,000 gallons of water a year. To check for leaks in hidden pipes, monitor your water meter for an hour or two when no water is being used, if the meter dial is moving, there is a leak.

November is Occupant Safety Month

Seat belts have been proven to be one of the best ways to save your life in a crash. Yet many still don't buckle up. Worse still, not wearing a seat belt is a habit that will pass on to impressionable youth, who in turn will think it's safe to not buckle up. Seat belts save over 13,000 lives every year. One of them could be yours... The top 5 things you should know about buckling up: Buckling up is the single most effective thing you can do to protect yourself in a crash. In 2015, seat belts saved an estimated 13,941 people from dying. From 2011-2015 seat belts saved nearly 64,000 lives—enough people to fill a large sports arena. During a crash, being buckled up helps keep you safe and secure inside your vehicle, whereas being completely thrown out of a vehicle is almost always deadly. Seat belts are the best defense against impaired, aggressive, and distracted drivers. Air bags are designed to work with seat belts, not replace them. In fact, if you don't wear your seat belt, you could be thrown into a rapidly opening frontal air bag; a movement of such force could injure or even kill you. Know how to buckle up safely. Place the shoulder belt across the middle of your chest and away from your neck, the lap belt and shoulder belt are secured across the pelvis and rib cage, which can withstand crash forces better than other parts of your body. Make sure the seat belt fits you correctly, if it doesn't make sure to research on how to get a correct fit. Occupant protection is for everyone. From babies to older adults make sure everyone is safe while riding in cars.

How Does It Work?
