Many people forget the 🛱 Be aware of bus routes and where buses line up when staged. speed limit on Portland Avenue is only 20mph! Keep in mind:

- Traffic fines are greatly increased in school zones.
- Traffic congestion is an on-going issue at Gladstone High School (GHS) & Gladstone Center for Children and Families (GCCF), on Portland Ave. between Abernethy St. and Nelson Ln., when the two schools let out at 3pm. If driving through the area, please consider alternate routes at that time of day if feasible.
- #Traffic congestion also occurs at John Wetten Elementary (JWE) between 2:10-2:40 p.m., on East Exeter St. between Chicago Ave. and Yale Ave., while parents line up their cars to pick up their children. Again, consider using alternate routes at that time of day if feasible.
- Kraxberger Middle School (KMS) lets out at 3:10 p.m. so please be extra cautious for kids leaving the middle school and walking along Webster Road at that time.
- Something you may see at JWE is a new black fence on the south attempting to get into their parent's vehicles at pick-up time. With you all have a wonderful school year!

With school back in session, there will be a substantial increase in the new fence, it will help channel the children through one safe

- Last year, there were several times when cars would be parked along the curb on the north side (Gloucester St.) of JWE preventing the buses from parking. Please observe the signs that detail when the buses will be there for child pick-up/drop-off.
- ₩With safety in mind, please report any suspicious activity you see or hear (whether it's in person, third-hand, or on-line). If your instincts tell you something isn't right, you're probably correct! Burn Ban Continues in Gladstone By: Fire Marshal Mike Funk



The hot topic of outdoor fires in Gladstone continues. As soon as the Cardiac arrest: An electrical malfunction in the existing burn ban can be safely lifted it will be. Your best and most accurate news will come from Gladstone Fire Dept. when the burn

ban is lifted. Another reliable resource will be the City website. As soon as the outdoor burn status changes, the "No Burn Banner" on the City website will be removed.

The City has been burning in the month of August. Gladstone fire crews have responded to multiple local grass and brush fires in the City as well as assisting neighboring fire agencies with several large fires along the roads and freeways. There have been, and continue to be, devastating wild land fires across the State. One of the most common fires has been the discarded cigarette butt that lands in the bark dust or landscaping around our homes and local businesses.

Late summer and sometimes into Fall, before the Oregon rain saturates the ground, is the worst time of year for these grass, bark dust and brush fires. Please understand that a little rainfall does not quickly change the ground fuel moisture status. It takes several soaking rains for this to change.

Gladstone is a great place to live. Please refrain from all open flames outdoors a few more weeks. Help us keep you and your neighbors safe from these accidental fires by holding off outdoor burning just a little longer.

When outdoor fires are permitted again, please be sure to follow the outdoor burn regulations outlined on the City website. In Gladstone city limits only clean, seasoned firewood burning is allowed. The burning of yard debris, garbage, plastics, construction debris and any kind of waste is prohibited year around.

Hands Only CPR

heart that causes an irregular heartbeat and disrupts the flow of blood to the brain, lungs and other organs – is a leading cause of death. When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on early CPR! According to the American Heart Association, about 90% of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrest die. Immediate CPR can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

Steps to take:

Step 1. CALL 911!

Step 2. Push on the victim's bare chest deep and at a rate of 100 - 120 compressions per minute (the beat of Stayin' Alive by the Bee Gees will help your pace). For more information, visit: heart.org/handsonlycpr

Along the way we will see stormwater outfalls, two of WES' restoration projects, lower river tributaries that flow into the Clackamas, a railroad crossing, and at all four of our lower river drinking water intake structures. It should provide you with a unique perspective of this amazing river that we get our drinking water

All transportation, meals, and beverages will be provided by the Clackamas River Water Providers. The day will begin at Clackamette Park with a light breakfast of coffee, juice and pastries. Gladstone Public Works Department schedules our 2018 leaf pick-up service with cost effectiveness and efficiency in mind. The schedule below best utilizes public funds reflected in both manpower and equipment hour costs.

We will be picking up your leaf piles within the following date ranges. Please identify the number of your neighborhood area on the map.

Areas 1 and 2: October 22 - 26

Areas 3, 4 and 5: October 29 - November 2

Areas 6 and 7: November 5 - 9 Areas 8 and 1: November 13 - 21

Areas 2, 3 and 4: November 26 - November 30


Areas 5 and 6: December 3 - 7 Areas 7 and 8: December 10 - 14


Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb. This extra space between the curb and the leaf pile is to allow water to drain into the city's storm basins.

Please have your leaf pile ready for pick-up by the first day of your area's designated pick-up schedule. While it is important to have your leaves ready for pick-up by the first day on your schedule, please remember that leaves placed in the street too far in advance of leaf pick-up will cause the leaves to wash into our storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding in your neighborhood. The best practice is to put your leaves out for pick-up the day before your area's first scheduled day. The city currently does not have a chipper or a way to dispose of tree limbs, twigs or other green waste, so we ask that you please not mix anything in with your leaves. Public Works always appreciates our citizen cooperation in helping to keep our city streets clean and our storm drains clear of leaves, allowing rain water to drain away from homes and businesses.

Once the public works crew has visited your area, we will not return until the next scheduled pick-up date for your area. This year's leaf pick-up schedule ends on Friday, December 14th. However, for citizens with hardships that prevented them from putting their leaves out during the scheduled city-wide leaf pick-up service, the Public Works crew will pick-up large leaf piles, by request only, between Monday, December 17th through Friday, January 11th. To be considered as a large leaf pile, leaves must be a volume of at least two heaping wheelbarrow loads. Smaller amounts of leaves may be disposed in your yard debris cans. Public Works appreciates everyone's consideration of the cost involved in providing the leaf pick-up service to the community. Working together, we can make this effort as efficient and cost effective as possible.

Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. October 21st-27th: National Teen Driver Safety Week

Earning a driver's license has long been a rite of passage for America's teens—a first step toward freedom and independence. As part of National Teen Driver Safety Week, which runs from October 21-27, Gladstone Traffic Safety is urging parents to start a conversation about safety with their teen driver. Let your young driver know that obeying the rules of the road is a prerequisite for the privilege of driving. Driving is the first and only task when behind the wheel. Teen Driver Safety Week may only last 7 days, but remind your teen driver about these safety rules every day—you can remind them every time they head out the door, leave notes by their keys, or even invade their timeline with (possibly embarrassing) messages to drive safely. If you keep the conversation about safe driving going, you'll help keep our roads and our teen drivers safe.

Sidewalks and Clear Vision



The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property and are liable to any person suffering injury due to a defective sidewalk. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." This is similar to property

owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection

October 3rd: Walk/Bike to School Day!

Bike safety tips: Every bike ride begins with putting on a helmet. But it's equally important that you ensure a proper fit so your helmet can best protect you. Ride your bike responsibly. Be focused and alert to the road and all traffic around you; anticipate what others may do, before they do it. This is defensive driving—the quicker you notice a potential conflict, the quicker you can act to avoid a potential crash. By driving predictably, motorists get a sense of what you intend to do and can react to avoid a crash. Drive where you are expected to be seen, travel in the same direction as traffic and signal and look over your shoulder before changing lane position or turning. No one learns to drive a vehicle safely without practice and experience; safely riding your bike in traffic requires the same preparation. Start by riding your bike in a safe environment away from traffic.

Clackamas County Public Alerts

On Sept. 1 2018, Clackamas County upgraded how it communicates with residents during times of disaster by replacing its emergency notification software system. All residents are urged to enroll, or reenroll, at www.clackamas.us/publicalerts.

By providing contact information, county residents can receive critical emergency messaging via email, phone call, and text during times of disasters. Important messages that could be relayed include notices to evacuate, shelter-in-place, shelter locations, etc. Residents enrolled in the previous system—the Clackamas County Emergency Notification System, or CCENS—must re-enroll themselves in the new system in order to receive future messages.
