After Low-Pressure Issue Your Water is Safe to Drink

The City of Gladstone recently experienced an event with the Be Prepared drinking water system that required the City to issue a Boil Water The City has an essential role in preparing the community for Notice. That situation has been fixed and Gladstone customers' drinking water is safe to drink.

What happened?

On Friday, July 12, Public Works was repairing a leak on one of our largest pipes—a 24-inch main. The City's water system is in poor you will use around a half-gallon for condition due to a lack of adequate investment over many years. Public Works staff repair leaking pipes regularly.

To fix the leak while keeping the line in service, the pressure in the pipe was reduced (standard operating procedure). Water pressure was monitored near the repair site with no indication of issues Investing in Our Infrastructure during the repair.

After post-repair flushing of the line, staff responded to a customer call and observed air in the line. This was evidence that the water system had failed to maintain adequate pressure to protect public replacement of failing systems. health.



Utility Rate Increase

You may notice an increase on your next Gladstone Utility Bill. The pass-through rate for Oak Lodge Sanitary District has increased 4.5%; the pass-through rate for Tri-Cities Sewer District has increased by 5% and the pass-through rate for North Clackamas Water Commission (NCCWC) has increased 3.2%. Residents who use 600 cubic feet of water (4,488 gallons) or less will see an increase in their August statement (July's usage). For those accounts served by the Tri-City Sewer District, the minimum bill will increase from \$66.14 to \$68.05, those served by the Oak Lodge Sanitary District will increase from \$94.80 to \$97.88. Water usage over 600 cubic feet will be billed at \$2.50 per 100 cubic foot (748 gallons).

Gladstone Police Department (GPD) Chief's Corner By Chief John Schmerber



As we enter the summer months and enjoy the outside, BBQ's, family gatherings and community events, you may see two of Gladstone's finest on patrol, walking around parks or during community events. I want to introduce you to Officer Dustin Olson and K9 Officer Nanuk. A little over a year ago the Gladstone Police Department increased its capability of

solving crimes and or finding missing people or articles of evidence by expanding the police department to include K9 Officer Nanuk. Officer Nanuk is a 3-year-old German Shepherd who was born in Slovakia, June 23, 2016. Officer Olson started his career in law enforcement in May 2002 and holds an advanced police officer certification by the Oregon Department of Public Safety and Standards.

Although the City of Gladstone had selected both the officer and K9 as a patrol team, there was much work to be done. Officer Olson and Officer Nanuk attended a five-week K9 academy in April of 2018 where they trained for 8 hours a day to ensure both handler and K9 were qualified and prepared for patrol work. In July 2018, the K9 team of Olson and Nanuk were certified by the Oregon Police Canine Association as a patrol team and ready to patrol the City of Gladstone. In Officer Olson's words, "The primary function of a police service dog is the utilization of the canine's superior sense of smell". Olson continues by saying "Studies estimate that a dog's sense of smell is between a thousand and a million times greater than a human".

The capabilities of a police canine include the ability to successfully track for a suspect, missing person, search for evidence and search buildings for hidden

suspects. It should be noted also that a canine is the only use of force tool which can be recalled when appropriate.

Officer Nanuk is very social and enjoys community events! Look for K9 Nanuk at community events throughout the year and say hello.



A Message from Gladstone Fire Marshal Mike Funk

With the year half gone, we start to enjoy the warmer weather that comes with July then into hot August nights. Following several days of warm temperatures in June we have a jump start on the un-kept lawns and wooded areas in town turning into fire hazards. The Fire Marshal and City Code Enforcement Officer are both working to resolve code issues as we become aware of them as quickly as possible. Unfortunately, the legal process takes time to force residents to respond to code violations. Please assist us by mentioning to your neighbors that lawns need to be kept low during the summer to minimize fire danger. Please do not toss or flick ashes from a burning cigarette out as that is all that is needed to start a fire in this low humidity season.

With the warmer weather during summer months be sure to keep well hydrated during outdoor activities. It is easy to receive a serious sunburn this time of year. Don't forget to check on our older loved ones during the very hot weather, because as we age our body changes physically in the way it deals with the heat. Watch for any signs of heat exhaustion when working outside. Be aware that heat stroke may be near when exposed to prolonged heat exposure and you reach the point where you stop sweating.

Remember summer also brings additional children outdoors. While we may have relief in SOME school zone areas, we will experience a greater number of children outdoors, in the crosswalks and riding bikes at the sides of the road on our community streets. Please watch for kids on bikes and skateboards as well as being sure your child is wearing proper protective headwear.

Gladstone Firefighters hope to see you at the Community Festival parade the first weekend in August. Firefighters will be out all weekend sharing fire prevention and safety messages. City Office Closures

All Gladstone City offices will be closed on Monday, September 2, 2019 in observance of Labor Day.

Gladstone/Oregon City Pedestrian Bridge

Clackamas County Water Environment Services (WES) will close the 82nd Drive pedestrian bridge beginning August 12, 2019 to perform seismic upgrades. The closure is expected to be in effect until February 2020.

The seismic upgrades will make the bridge able to withstand a magnitude 9.0 earthquake, which means the bridge would be able to serve as a vital path across the river for emergency vehicles in a disaster.

During the closure, pedestrians and bicyclists will not have access to the bridge from either the Oregon City or Gladstone sides of the river. Signs will be posted directing pedestrians and bicyclists to the detour route of Oregon Highway 99E/SE McLoughlin Blvd. in Oregon City. For more information visit www.clackamas.us/wes/pedbridge.html

Low Income Discount for Water/ Sewer Bills

Water and sewer discounts of 50% are available to low-income residents who are billed directly by the City. Applications are renewable on an annual fiscal year basis. Applications may be downloaded from the city's website at www.ci.gladstone.or.us, picked up at City Hall or by calling 503-557-2771. Low-income discounts are based on Federal poverty guidelines.

Heat Related Illness

With the weather heating up it is important to recognize signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses

HEAT EXHAUSTION: Heavy sweating; cold, pale and clammy skin; fast, weak pulse; nausea or vomiting; muscle cramps; tiredness or weakness; dizziness; headache; or fainting.

WHAT TO DO FOR HEAT EXHAUSTION: Move to cool place; loosen your clothes; put cool, wet cloths on your body; sip water.

Get medical help right away if: You are throwing up, symptoms get worse, or your symptoms last longer than 1 hour.

HEAT STROKE: High body temperature (103 degrees F or higher); hot, red, dry, or damp skin; fast, strong pulse; headache; dizziness; nausea; confusion; losing consciousness.

WHAT TO DO FOR HEAT STROKE: Call 911 right away! Heat stroke is a medical emergency! Move the person to a cooler place; help lower the person's temperature with cool cloths or a cool bath; do not give the person anything to drink.

If you must be out on these hot days, pace yourself, take lots of breaks, and drink plenty of water.



Vegetation and Water Quality

Trees, forests and other vegetation affect water quality by slowing and reducing stormwater runoff. Trees reduce runoff through rainfall interception by the tree canopy, and by releasing water into the atmosphere through evapotranspiration. Trees also promote



infiltration of water through the soil and increase the storage of water in the soil and humus on the forest floor. With no tree canopy, rain falling on impervious urban surfaces such as parking lots, roofs, and streets gathers pollutants. The cumulative effect of the tree canopy is to temporarily detain rainfall and gradually release it, regulating the flow of stormwater runoff downstream and thereby preventing some of the pollutants in rainfall and on urban surfaces from being transported to local waterways. Trees provide additional water quality benefits through the uptake of pollutants from the atmosphere, soil and groundwater. Research provided by The Center for Watershed Protection shows that trees can intercept between 6% to 66% of rainfall. Urban trees can transpire from 0.2 to 46.7 gallons per tree per day! Streamside vegetation helps to create fish habitat and keep the waters cool for our native aquatic life. Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. Drop Off Unwanted Prescriptions at Gladstone PD



Flushing drugs down the toilet or putting them into the garbage has damaging effects on our environment and can contaminate our surface & groundwater supplies. Both drinking and wastewater treatment plants are not designed to treat these kinds of chemicals. Drop off your old, expired

or unwanted prescriptions at the Gladstone Police Department, MED RETURN receptacle, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm. No paperwork or fee required! Please note that all syringes and inhalers must be taken to Metro Recycling. Please call 503-557-2760 for any questions.

Fire Hydrants are Receiving Annual Maintenance and Flushing



Each year Gladstone Fire Department employs non-firefighters to assist with fire hydrant maintenance. You may notice crews performing weed removal in preparation for flow testing and painting. Oregon Fire Code requires a 3-foot clearance around all fire hydrants, which includes flowers, trees and shrubbery. Please give attention to the fire hydrant on your property and cut back any impinging growth prior to maintenance crew arrival. In addition to the direct clearance around hydrants, as the law applies to vehicles, clear vision and access must be maintained at all times. A 10- foot wide space is required in front of hydrants. Do not park a vehicle within 5 feet (either direction) of where the fire hydrant faces the street.

When seasonal crews flow hydrants in Gladstone, they are checking for volume of water flow and pressure available at that hydrant. The yearly flow also helps keep the system clean. The volume of water flowing is very different than the normal residential use in any neighborhood. Because of this high volume flushing you may experience a minor discoloration in your tap water during or just following our test flows. All normal pressure will return as we exit your neighborhood. If you do notice a discoloration in your tap water just run the faucet for a minute or until the water runs clear.

Please clear around your nearby fire hydrant, never park in front of it, and leave the testing to us. As always, If you have any questions please contact Michael Funk, Fire Marshal at 503-557-2775 or funk@ci.gladstone.or.us

A Minute of Gladstone History – by Kim Argraves Huey, Gladstone Historical Society Historian

What is a summer vacation without a good mystery read? For your enjoyment, read "Who done it?" from the pages of Gladstone History.

Summer of 1913: During hot weather, many housewives took their domestic chores outside, and some Gladstonians enjoyed an evening bath in their backyards; all of which led to the town becoming en-bubbled in a sudsy dilemma. Bars of soap—no matter size, shape, scent, or purpose—vanished if left outside unattended. One lady reported that she was missing five casteel cakes. Professional sleuths were brought in to solve the case. Their expert opinion: a clean get-a-way by either small boys, strange birds, or a yet unidentified soap-eating beast.

Winter 1915: Wednesday, around 4 a.m., an explosion rocked Portland Avenue. Later, the Post Office safe was found blown through an interior wall that contained the individual post office boxes. \$20.00 cash and \$100.00 in stamps were taken, with \$550.00 damage done to the building. Because this was the second attempt to rob the Post Office in three months, Federal Investigators were called. After interviewing the surrounding neighbors, all of whom admitted to hearing a bomb go off but chose to ignore it, the crime was declared unsolvable. Score one for the robbers. No score for the neighbors.

1922: For several years, not securing one's cow for the night was a disturbing problem that plagued Gladstone. According to newspaper reports, each morning after the nightly round-up, the police chief found himself in possession of a herd of overfull bovines desperately in need of milking. What's a police chief to do? Get a bucket and get the deed done. That's when the fight started. Errant cow owners, "finally" coming to claim their cow, demanded that their cow's milk contribution be handed over with their cow. Nothing doing! Chief Miller claimed the milk in lieu of a "cow past curfew" fine (even though no such law existed). When asked what he planned to do with all the milk he collected, Chief Miller wouldn't spill.

Sidewalks and Clear Vision



A couple of residents recently expressed concern about sidewalks and clear vision. The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property

and are liable to any person suffering an injury due to a defective sidewalk. The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed a 1/2 inch vertical lift." This is similar to property owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection.

Fish on the Run, Irrigation Done!



We all know practicing water conservation year-round is the most important thing we can do to be good stewards of our drinking water source.

This summer the Clackamas River Water Providers (CRWP) is asking their water customers to take another step to help keep water in the Clackamas River by reducing or shutting-off outdoor watering in time for the fall fish runs.

In addition to providing drinking water to over 300,000 people the river is home to migrating salmon and steelhead virtually year-round. Most of the year there is plenty of water in the river, however

summer is the time of year when the Clackamas River is flowing at its lowest levels and we get the least amount of rainfall. This is especially important in late August as Fall Chinook and Coho Salmon begin returning to the Clackamas River on their way to their spawning grounds. As our summers are getting longer and hotter, making sure there is enough water in the river for the fall fish runs is getting more challenging.

So, if you live in Clackamas or Washington County and get your drinking water from the Clackamas River, whether you use a hose or have an underground watering system to water your yard and garden, and care about protecting our river water for people, and wildlife here's your chance to be part of our *"Fish On the Run, Irrigation Done"* campaign to help migrating fish.

Starting the last week of July go to www.clackamasproviders.org to find out what kind of changes you can make to your outdoor watering to ensure sure that you are using our drinking water in the most efficient ways possible. Take the pledge and receive a free yard sign letting neighbors know that you are doing your part to keep water in the Clackamas River for fish. The more water we can conserve the easier this journey will be for these threatened and endangered salmon species.
