Gladstone gets a New Boat Dock at Meldrum Bar Park!



In March the City of Gladstone was successful in obtaining a grant from the Oregon State Marine Board for the fabrication and delivery of aluminum boarding docks at Meldrum Bar Park. Gladstone Public Works conducted a competitive bid process and a contract in the amount of \$127,448 was awarded to CR Fabrication to complete the work.

The rehabilitation of the Meldrum Bar boat launch area is a three phased grant process. The first was the sediment analysis, which was completed at the end of February. The second phase is the fabrication,

delivery, installation of the dock and the third phase is to dredge the boat launch area so that the dock operates properly and boaters can functionally use the launch area well into the future without the sediment build-up in the portion of the river. The City will be notified on the status on the dredging grant this month.

An exorbitant amount of time from our Public Works staff has gone into making these projects successful. Thank you to our Gladstone City Council and the Parks and Recreation Board as we continue to enhance our beautiful natural assets along the rivers in the Gladstone community.

Utility Rate Increase

You may notice an increase on your next Gladstone Utility Bill. Starting July 1, 2019, the pass-through rate for Oaklodge Sanitary District will increase 4.5%, the pass-through rate for Tri-Cities Sewer District will increase by 5% and the pass-through rate for North Clackamas Water Commission (NCCWC) will increase 3.2%. Residents who use 600 cubic feet of water (4,488 gallons) or less will see an increase in their August statement (July usage). For those accounts served by the Tri-City Sewer District, the minimum bill will increase from \$66.14 to \$68.05, those served by the Oak Lodge Sanitary District will increase from \$94.80 to \$97.88. Water usage over 600 cubic feet will be billed at \$2.50 per 100 cubic foot (748 gallons).

CSO Boyle does not just respond to complaints from the community, he also is directed to take a proactive approach towards violations throughout the community. ● Facilitate voluntary compliance with City codes. ● Promote the well being of the community through collaboration with other Public Safety Departments. ● Establish compliance programs based on community priorities.

Sunshine Can be Tragic to Pets

With hot weather, leaving our pets in vehicles can turn tragic extremely fast. Here are some tips and thoughts that can help keep our pets safe:

Myth - 'If I park outside, I can leave the window cracked an inch or two.' NO. Per a 2005 American Academy of Pediatrics Study, in terms of heatrise over time, it makes very little difference whether a car's windows are closed or partially open. In both cases, a car's interior temperature can rise approximately 40 degrees within one hour, even when the exterior temperature is only 72°F.

Myth - 'If I park in the shade and just run a quick errand, it should be fine.' NO. Never leave your pet in a parked car when the outside temperature is above 70°F. Not even with the windows partway down, not even in the shade, not even for a quick errand. Dogs and cats can't sweat like humans, so they pant to lower their body temperature. If they're inside a car, recycling very hot air, panting gives no relief, and heat stroke can happen quickly. - Michael Dix DVM, Medical Director, Best Friends Animal Society.

If you plan on going out on these hot days, it is best to leave your pets at home in a cool comfortable home with plenty of water. If you are going to take your dog for a walk, remember that concrete and asphalt get extremely hot and pets have very sensitive paws.

A Minute of Gladstone History – by Kim Argraves Huey, Gladstone Historical Society Historian

Pioneers were patriotic people, and the Fourth of July was the most anticipated celebration of the entire year. The Cason and Rinearson families, Gladstone's first settlers, spent the holiday in Oregon City, where for many years, the town held a picnic overlooking Willamette Falls. Other events included historical readings, a band concert, running games, the annual Grand Ball, and fireworks.

So, when did Gladstone shoot off its first fireworks? On July 14, 1896, to celebrate the conclusion of the third Chautauqua, a pyrotechnic expert was brought to Gladstone Park to explode roman candles while an all-female band played patriotic music. Attended by a huge crowd, the event was considered to be the finest American celebration to take place in

Hoping to outdo all previous Fourth of July celebrations ever held in Clackamas County, the Oregon City Y.M.C.A. undertook to present a patriotic extravaganza in Gladstone Park. Events scheduled included band concerts, choirs, a baseball game, picnic under the shade trees, a balloon ascension, and fireworks. With 1500 in attendance, a rainstorm hit shortly before noon and intensified as the day continued. The baseball diamond turned to mud. Attendees were forced to crowd inside the beehive to eat their lunches. The Master of Ceremonies for the afternoon program became stranded in Portland and a volunteer from the audience was called. The reading of the Declaration of Independence was drowned out by the beating of the rain against the auditorium roof. The Anvil chorus, performed with real anvils, was accompanied by a pounding rain and both jarred and excited the audience. The balloon basket filled with water and could not be launched. And the fireworks fizzled. The celebration of July 1897 earned the reputation as "worst Fourth of July ever".

Fire Hydrants are Receiving Annual Maintenance and Flushing



Each year Gladstone Fire Department employs non-firefighters to assist with fire hydrant maintenance. You may notice crews performing weed removal in preparation for flow testing and painting. Oregon Fire Code requires a 3 foot clearance around all fire hydrants, which includes flowers, trees and shrubbery. Please give attention to the fire hydrant on your property and cut back any

impinging growth prior to maintenance crew arrival. In addition to the direct clearance around hydrants, as the law applies to vehicles, a clear vision and access must be maintained at all times. A 10- foot wide space is required in front of hydrants. Do not park a vehicle within 5 feet (either direction) of where the fire hydrant faces the street.

When seasonal crews flow hydrants in Gladstone, they are checking for volume of water flow and pressure available at that hydrant. The yearly flow also helps keep the system clean. The volume of water flowing is very different than the normal residential use in any neighborhood. Because of this high volume flushing you may experience a minor discoloration in your tap water during or just following our test flows. All normal pressure will return as we exit your neighborhood. If you do notice a discoloration in your tap water just run the faucet for a minute or until the water runs clear.

Metro investing \$11,600 in Gladstone Nature Park



The Friends of Gladstone Nature Park are excited to announce the funding of a new grant for the Nature Park. The 2019 Nature in Neighborhoods restoration and community stewardship grants were approved at Metro's June meeting. The Gladstone Nature Park grant is one of 15 successful grants out of 33 submissions. This grant will help the Friends of Gladstone Nature Park

(FOGNAP) build a butterfly/pollinator hill in the park that will attract butterflies, pollinators, birds, and visitors to the park and to the Gladstone area. The project is intended to be a model demonstration site and will include interpretive signage to help visitors identify native plants and species.

All three of Gladstone's schools are partners in the grant, along with the City of Gladstone, Bosky Dell Natives and Exceed Enterprises, a group of adults with special needs who are currently helping to build a bird garden near the west entrance of the Nature Park.

Gladstone/Oregon City Pedestrian Bridge

Clackamas County Water Environment Services (WES) will close the 82nd Drive pedestrian bridge beginning in July, 2019 to perform seismic upgrades. The closure is expected to be in effect until February 2020.

The seismic upgrades will make the bridge able to withstand a magnitude 9.0 earthquake. which means the bridge would be able to serve as a vital path across the river for emergency vehicles in a disaster.

During the closure, pedestrians and bicyclists will not have access to the bridge from either the Oregon City or Gladstone sides of the river.
