report any suspicious or illegal activity.

The City Council has determined that excessive sound is a serious hazard to the public health, welfare and the quality of life and it shall be the policy of the city to prevent excessive sound which may jeopardize the health, welfare and safety of citizens or degrade the quality of life. No person shall

knowingly continue, cause or permit to be made or continue to make any excessive or unnecessary sounds. The following acts are declared to create excessive and unnecessary sounds in violation of this chapter without regard to the maximum sound levels: Radios, Phonographs, Tape players, Television Sets, Stereo Systems, Amplified sounds, external speakers, paging systems, Revving engines, Compression braking devices, Exhausts, Idling engines on motor vehicles, Vehicle tires, Motorcycles, go-karts, dune buggies, Motorboats, Powered model vehicles, Fireworks, Tampering, Animals, Steam whistles, Horns, and Compressed air devices. See table for allowed sound levels. Day time hours are between 7:00am-10:00pm the same day, Night time hours are between 10:00pm and 7:00am the following day. Door to Door Solicitation

Door to Door solicitation is legal for those with a valid business license, if applicable. A business license is required if the solicitor is selling an item or service, such as roof repair, pest control, books, etc. Solicitation is allowed only between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. Solicitation is prohibited entirely if the property owner has posted a "No Solicitation" sign on the premises, per Gladstone Municipal Code Chapter 5.28. "No Solicitation" signs may be downloaded from the city's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us/community/page/ community-applications-forms or picked up at City Hall for 25¢. 

A Message from Gladstone Fire Marshal Mike Funk

June 21st marks the official start of summer but on recent weekends, the smell of good cooking fills the air in my neighborhood and I suspect yours as well. While you are out there enjoying yourself be sure to practice the following safety tips for outdoor cooking:

Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.Cooking grills should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. **Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area. **Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill. **Never leave your grill unattended. **Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS: There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel. If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire. Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources. There




Please take a moment to glance at the city website https://www.ci.gladstone.or.us/ for important information about outdoor burning. Many materials are prohibited from burning year-round in Gladstone. Burning of any yard debris is prohibited. No plastic, garbage or medical waste.

If you're the person that doesn't think about summer BBQ, you might be the July 4th celebration type. If this is you, take a moment to be sure you are purchasing ONLY <u>Oregon Legal fireworks</u>.

Fireworks: be cautious to use only <u>Oregon Legal</u> fireworks in Oregon. Oregon fireworks laws differ from our neighboring state, Washington. Oregon law only allows the use of 1.4G (class C) consumer fireworks. Classes 1.4 G are consumer fireworks that do not explode, fly into the air, or travel more than six feet

horizontally and/or 12 inches vertically from the point of ignition. DON'T FORGET- to be Veteran and Pet sensitive during this time. Fireworks can be frightening to animals and near torture to some of our War Veterans.

Preventing Our Kids From Falling Out Of Windows



Each year, according to the CDC, over 5000 children accidentally fall from windows each year. As the warmer weather is here, we need to recognize and prevent

these accidents from happening. These simple tips and hardware ideas that can be found at any local hardware store will help prevent these accidents from happening.

Prevention Tips

In homes with children, install window guards on all second-story or higher windows.

Use window stops to prevent windows from opening more than 4 inches.

Window screens are not designed to stop a child from falling. A normal window screen is NOT enough to keep children safe.

It is best to purchase window guards with a quick release mechanism. This will allow the window to be opened easily by an adult in the case of a fire emergency.

Install locks on sliding windows to prevent children from opening them.

Move all furniture away from windows. Children can climb on furniture to access windows that are otherwise out of reach.

Create soft landing surfaces such as bushes or plant beds under windows to help prevent serious injuries in case of a fall.

Do not allow children to play on fire escapes, roofs or balconies.

Make sure that older children understand the dangers of climbing out of or jumping from windows.

Young children should never be left at home unsupervised.

Low Income Discount for Water/ Sewer Bills

Water and sewer discounts of 50% are available to low income residents who are billed directly by the City. Applications are renewable on an annual fiscal year basis. June Is Occupant Protection Awareness Month

Gladstone Police Department will be working with fellow law enforcement officers across Oregon to ensure the message gets out to drivers and passengers. We cannot overstate the importance of wearing a seat belt. It's the law, but it's more than that: By far, buckling up is the simplest thing you can do to limit injury or save your life during a crash. We see the results of not wearing a seat belt all the time. We see the loss of life. So often, it could have been prevented with the simple click of a seat belt.

The national seat belt use rate in 2017 was 89.7 percent, which is good—but we can do better. The other 10.3 percent still need to be reminded that seat belts save

Among young adults 18 to 34 killed in crashes in 2017, more than half (57%) were completely unrestrained—one of the highest percentages for all age groups. Men make up the majority of those killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes. In 2017, 65

percent of the 23,551 passenger vehicle occupants who were killed were men. It comes as no surprise that men wear their seat belts at a lower rate than women do-51 percent of men killed in crashes were unrestrained, compared to 39 percent of



Curfew

According to Gladstone Municipal Code, Chapter 9.16.040, It is unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years who is not emancipated pursuant to ORS <u>419B.550</u> to <u>419B.558</u>, to be in or upon any street, highway, park, alley, public right of way, or other public place between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 5:30 a.m. of the following morning. That is unless such minor is accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person twenty-one (21) years of age or older and authorized by the parent or by law to have such care and custody of the minor. Additionally, if such minor is then engaged in an authorized school activity or lawful employment that makes it necessary to be in or upon such public place during the hours specified in this section.

Street Parking Regulations



It is that time of year when owners of boats, trailers, and RVs are using them for summer outings. Gladstone Code Enforcement would like to remind its citizens that there are City ordinances regulating on-street parking, and these ordinances are very specific as to the type of vehicles

that can be parked on city streets. Chapter 10.04.230 of the Gladstone Municipal Code (available online on the City's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us) describes parking issues. Please be mindful of neighbors and use alternative parking, such as RV pads or

local RV storage facilities, etc. By following these guidelines we can all enhance City services, improve public safety and help make our neighborhoods more "neighbor friendly" for all Gladstone residents.



Clackamas County Public Alerts

By providing contact information, county residents can receive critical emergency messaging via email, phone call, and text during times of disasters. Important messages that could be relayed include notices to evacuate, shelter-in-place, shelter locations, etc. Residents enrolled in the previous system - the Clackamas County Emergency Notification System, or CCENS - must re-enroll themselves in the new system in order to receive future messages. 

there are far too many reasons to list why. The best thing that we can do to protect ourselves and our loved ones is to be informed. Understand the basics of

scams, what to know and what to do when you think you may have been a victim of a scam. The best advice to have is to simply hang up, don't answer the phone if you don't recognize the phone number. If you are concerned about a call or piece of mail you have received, please call your local law enforcement agency non-emergency phone number. Take time today to protect yourself and loved ones today, it's never too late to be of assistance.



Summer time is almost here! So, let's take a moment to get ready while we still have time to. Summers in the Pacific Northwest have become longer and hotter over the last few years. As we all grow older, it is important for us to understand how the heat can effect our bodies. If proper precautions are not taken, the heat and sun can be down right deadly for aging adults.

Here are some important tips to help you prepare for this summer:

- 1. <u>Talk to your doctor-</u>Check with your medical team to make sure any medications you are on won't be affected by higher temperatures especially if you don't have air conditioning in your home. Some medications are less effective if stored at temperatures higher than room temperature (about 78 degrees F).
- 2. <u>Stay hydrated-</u> Seniors are more susceptible to dehydration than younger people because they lose their ability to conserve water as they age. Remember to drink water often, and be sure to pack some for those long summer drives.
- 3. <u>Keep your cool-</u> Even small increases in temperature can shorten the life expectancy for seniors who are coping with chronic medical conditions. Shopping malls, movie theaters and libraries provide welcome, cool spaces if a senior's own home isn't air-conditioned. They also afford a great opportunity to get out of the house and get some exercise without the exhaustion of the heat.
- 4. <u>Stay in touch-</u> High temperatures can be life-threatening, so communication plays an important role in ensuring the safety of aging adults. Seniors should let friends and family know if they'll be spending an extended period of time outdoors, even if they're only gardening.
- 5. <u>Know who to call-</u> Prepare a list of emergency phone numbers and place them in an easy-to-access area. This way, the right people can be called to help quickly preventing any further issues or preventing medical problems from getting worse.
- 6. Wear the right stuff, clothing & eye protection- Stock your summer wardrobe with light-colored and loose-fitting clothes to help feel cooler and more comfortable. Vision loss can be common among seniors, and too much exposure to the sun can irritate eyes and cause further damage. Wearing sunglasses can protect your eyes from harmful UV rays and preserve your vision.

One great way to beat the heat is to visit your local cooling center. Here in Gladstone, we have 2 such centers: The Gladstone Public Library and the Gladstone Senior Center.



A Minute of Gladstone History – by Kim Argraves Huey, Gladstone Historical Society Historian

The Gladstone Library will soon have an important birthday! In 1915, Juliette Cross Burke organized the Gladstone chapter of the popular Euterpean Society; a women's club focused on culture. Besides listening to opera, admiring Michael Angelo's works, and nibbling petit-fours, the ladies also adopted projects that were of cultural and educational value to the community. One such project was the Gladstone Library.

In August 1920, Gertrude Oswald, Sadie Gault, and Marceline Cross Hammond convinced the City Council to share their chambers with books and flower vases. With temporary shelves and 160 donated books, the ladies opened a pleasantly appealing library every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon. But then, the council chambers moved. Those intrepid Euterpean ladies packed up their books and trotted right along behind the gentlemen, even convincing the councilmen to let them wallpaper the new chambers/library room.

For the next forty years, the library followed City Hall wherever it went: from the back room of the Gladstone Pharmacy, to the I.O.O.F. building, to the basement of the first City Hall built in 1941. In 1962, a permanent library building was constructed approximately 150' east of the library's first location. And now, the current plan is for the nearly 100-year-old library to return to its 1941 location. Which only goes to prove that what goes around, does come around again. 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
