Understanding Your Utility Bill

Safe Drinking Water Delivered to Your Home

Water Charges Include:

- Base meter charge: Covers the costs that are ongoing regardless of amount of water used (pipes, pumps, hydrants, reservoir maintenance and meeting state and federal requirements).
- Water conservation block rate charges: Covers costs associated with the amount of water used. Water is measured in ICCF increments, which equals 748 gallons per unit.
- Treatment: Pass-through charges of \$0.7486 per unit is included in the block rates, passed along to residents from the water treatment plant.

Sewer Removed From Your Home and Treated

Sewer Charges Include:

- Treatment: Pass through charges are not determined by the City, but passed through from the treatment plant.
- Collection: City costs associated with the operation and maintenance of the waste water collection system (Pipes, pumps and meeting state and federal requirements).

Stormwater Managed to Protect Homes and Rivers

Stormwater Charges Include:



Street Sweeping 101

Indoor Home Water Audit Kit



The City of Gladstone's DEQ stormwater permit requires regular maintenance of our

streets regularly to limit pollutant outflow into our rivers. The street sweeper operates on an efficiency pattern to make the best use of personnel time and wear and tear on the sweeper. If you see the street sweeper in your neighborhood and it seems like it missed your street, please be patient, it will be back within the next few days. The street sweeper typically does not sweep neighborhoods on garbage collection day, as maneuvering around trash cans poses a risk to your garbage cans and to the city's equipment. The same is true for parked cars, basketball hoops, overhanging limbs, or anything that blocks the travel portion of the street. Public Works asks that you please use your yard debris receptacles rather than the street for your yard cleanup needs. The Public Works crew very much appreciates the cooperation and assistance of our citizens. Together, we make the City a better place for all of us.

During our rainy season, if you see a catch basin that is backed-up. please remember a rake is all it takes! A quick sweep with a rake will resolve the matter quickly. You may also contact our Public Works Dept. Monday - Friday 8:00am -3:30pm at 503.656.7957.

Winter is a good time to take a look at your indoor water use. The Clackamas River Water Providers has Indoor Home stormwater conveyance system. Part of the Water Audit Kits to help determine your water usage inside permit requirements involve sweeping the your home. Conducting an audit will help locate leaks you may have in your home and identify which fixtures may need to be upgraded.

Indoor Home Water Audit Kits Include:

• Audit Kit Instructions - This brochure will guide you through the steps of how to conduct an indoor home water audit.

• Flow Meter Bag –Use this bag to measure how much water your household fixtures (kitchen faucet, showerhead, bathroom faucet) use.

• Drip Gauge – Use this to measure drips around your house. Even a seemingly small drip can waste a lot of water. This gauge will give you an idea just how much that might be.

• Leak Detection Tablets - Use these tablets to see if your toilet has a leak.

A Message from Gladstone Fire Department (GFD) Fire Marshal Mike Funk

HAPPY NEW YEAR, from the firefighters serving the City of Gladstone. The makeup of Gladstone's Fire Department is men and women that live in Gladstone and in nearby communities. Over the years, Gladstone Fire Department, due to call volume and response expectations, has evolved into a combination fire department. This means we have a combination of both full time personnel and "paid on call" (POC) members. There are currently



32 men and women that serve at the fire department that responded to almost 1600 calls for help in 2019. Gladstone FD has gone away from the "volunteer only" fire department due to changing IRS requirements and taxing issues dating back to about 2008. Gladstone Fire with the help of a federal staffing grant a few years back, now boasts 24 hours per day 7 days a week, staffing with a paid Captain and one or more (POC) persons. We no longer rely on whether there are volunteer firefighters in town to respond from home to an emergency call. This response model now allows Gladstone firefighters to respond to Gladstone citizens with highly trained firefighters and EMT's quicker than ever before.

These two guiding documents explain a great deal of what we do and how we operate to best serve this community.

Training update: Four firefighters began our training academy in the first part of September 2019. We are proud of all the hard work and training that has been successfully completed so far. With over 140 hours of academic study and practical hands on training, these four "recruits" will be ready to serve you after completing about 60 more hours of this rigorous training. Congratulations to Cody, Spencer, Jacob and Vlad for training hard. Keep up the good work.

SAFETY REMINDERS:

•Always dispose of fireplace ashes in a metal bucket, and place it outside away from any combustibles. Never use a paper bag for your ashes and do not place the ashes inside your garage until final disposal.

•When was the last time you cleaned your bathroom fan? Sure they always seem to work when we flip the switch, but are they working well? Over time these fans collect a coating of dust and dirt inside them. We need to go further than just vacuuming the front surface of these devices. Next time pull the face plate off and clean up into the fan. We responded to several of these type of fires in 2019. Don't become part of our 2020 fire statistics. Clean your fan this week.

Remember: outdoor burning of leaves, branches, lawn clippings, berry bushes, construction debris, garbage and other like substances are not allowed in the City of Gladstone. Only dry, seasoned, fire wood is allowed and then the fire must be small and attended at all times. When burning outdoors, have a water hose or bucket nearby.

Upgrades on 82nd Drive Pedestrian Bridge nearing Completion



Construction on the 82nd Drive Pedestrian Bridge is nearing completion. Structural strengthening of the bridge is now finished. Seismic retrofit work continues and will make the bridge capable of withstanding a magnitude 9.0 earthquake once complete. Crews have also began the installation of a new force main pipe on the bridge while bolstering existing piping that is carried across the Clackamas River.

Clackamas County Water Environment Services will soon announce the date when the bridge is expected to re-open. The enhanced bridge will be capable of providing passage for emergency vehicles across the river should a catastrophic earthquake occur. Water Environment Services has owned the bridge since 1998. Built in the 1920s, the

bridge was converted for use by pedestrians and bicyclists after Interstate 205 opened in the 1970s. For more information about this project, please visit https://www.clackamas.us/wes/pedbridge.html.

Did you know you can drop off your monthly utility bills, including: PGE, NW Natural, Gladstone Water/Sewer & Gladstone Disposal, at the Senior Center? No stamps needed! The drop box is located just inside the main entry door.

Do You Need a Real ID?

Something big is happening October first of this year. If you aren't paying attention, it might mean missing your flight out of PDX or any other airport across the U.S.

On that date the Transportation Security Administration, or TSA, begins requiring a new type of identification to board a commercial aircraft. The new ID must be compliant with something called the Real ID Act. It's designed to keep us safer in the air, but if you try to board an aircraft using your current Oregon driver license starting in October – it won't work. That's because the current Oregon driver license is not Real ID compliant.

Oregon DMV will begin offering a Real ID option on July 6, 2020. To fulfill the demand of nearly one million Oregonians who will want the Real ID option, DMV would have to issue 32 licenses a second every business day from July to October. That's just not possible.

If you don't have a Real ID compliant form of ID at the airport, TSA will put you through an alternate identity verification process that could take an hour or more, and you could miss your flight.

There is an answer for Oregonians: obtain and use a passport or passport card. The cost of getting a new passport card is roughly equal to that of getting a replacement license with the Real ID option – and you can apply now at one of over 76 acceptance sites across Oregon.

Harvey Cross & Gladstone's Founding

The Founder of Gladstone, Harvey Edwin Cross, was born in what is today the City of Canby on June 6, 1856. His parents had emigrated to Oregon in 1852 from Amboy, Illinois. In 1862 the Cross Family—Lorenzo, Dorcas and their four surviving children—sold their



Canby farmstead and moved to Oregon City. Lorenzo, a carpenter by trade, was not enthralled with farming, preferring to earn his living as a carpenter. Oregon City, then being in the midst of a building boom, was the perfect place for Lorenzo and his carpentry skills. What is more, he was eager for his children to receive an education, and life in town offered better prospects for schooling.

Older brother, Caleb, followed in his father's footsteps as a carpenter, while Harvey readily took advantage of the educational opportunities of life in town. He entered the Oregon City Public School System in 1862, graduating with apparent ease in 1873, whereupon he decided to become a schoolteacher himself. He was hired by the Revenue School District to teach classes during the 1874-75 school year, in a one-room log schoolhouse near Sandy, Oregon. Besides living in the homes of his students, his compensation amounted to \$100 per quarter. After a brief stint of teaching at another rural school, he sought and found employment in the Clackamas County Clerk's office. He was a sheriff's deputy for a time and collected tolls on the Barlow Road at the Rhododendron tollgate.

In the fall of 1875, he began the study of law in the Oregon City firm of Johnson and McCown. Three years later, on January 8, 1879, he was admitted to the Oregon State Bar and soon after opened his own Oregon City office to enter legal practice. It was at about this time that Harvey made the acquaintance of the Orpha Francis Tingle, a young woman who came to Oregon in 1870 with her parents. They had originally settled in Columbia County, later moving to Oregon City where Orpha completed her education at the Atkinsons' Female Seminary. After a five month's courtship, Harvey and Orpha were married in Oregon City on June 10, 1879.

Three years later in 1882, the Crosses decide to move out of Oregon City to the north side of the Clackamas River. They purchased the house Fendel Cason and his son Adoniram had built there twenty years earlier. Harvey had not moved out of Oregon City merely to escape town life. He began, in 1883, to purchase the lands surrounding the Cason home. By 1888, he had assembled close to 400 acres (about two-thirds of the Cason DLC), together with an additional 60 acres purchased along the east side of the Rinearson DLC. Much as his father before him, Harvey had little interest in farming as an occupation.

And so the mostly open pastoral fields, dotted by groves of oak, maple and firs, with cottonwoods lining the river banks, were not envisioned by him as farmland but as a thriving town. In contrast to Charles Pickett and his Clackamas City, some four decades earlier, there would be no running off to adventures in the California gold fields for Harvey Cross. He would remain committed to his fledgling town and see it take shape as a reality, remaining a resident of it for the rest of his life. Did you know? A look at Older Americans Act (OAA) Nutrition Programs-How they help

OAA congregate and home-delivered nutrition programs provided over 222 million meals to older adults in FY15. This service is especially critical for the nearly 61% of home-delivered meal recipients and 49% of congregate meal recipients who report that the meals represent half or more of their food intake for the day. Nutrition programs such as those within the OAA, Congregate meals provide a setting which help to keep older Americans healthy and prevent the need for more costly medical interventions. In addition to serving healthy meals, the program presents opportunities for social engagement, information on healthy aging, and meaningful volunteer roles, all of which contribute to an older individual's overall health and well-being. Home delivered meals, more commonly known as Meals on Wheels, provide nutrition services for older individuals who are homebound. Home-delivered meals are often the first in-home service that an older adult receives, and the program is a primary access point for other home- and community-based services. The program serves frail, homebound, or isolated individuals who are age 60 and over, and in some cases, their caregivers, spouses, and/or persons with disabilities. 69% of individuals served by this program are 75 years or older. Currently, your senior center provides over 1,000 meals to clients each month. What's at stake. Funding for OAA nutrition programs has not kept pace with need or inflation. Cuts due to the federal budget sequester also led to fewer meals, waiting lists, and program closures across the country. A portion of our income comes from contracts with Clackamas County to provide these services. It is essential that we are able to continue to provide these services for numerous factors; rising housing costs, increased isolation, and chronic health conditions. Your Gladstone Senior Center is more than simply a place for older people to go to during the day. It is a site where people who care assist seniors to live their lives to the fullest, not just fade away into the setting sun.





Environmentally Conscious Deicing



The City of Gladstone will be utilizing a new tool this winter driving season, one that takes the quality of our nearby rivers and waterways into consideration. We will be using a liquid deicing material that is also used by surrounding cities from the Oregon Department of

and counties. Sourced from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), magnesium chloride (MgCl2) with rust inhibitor; is an effective way to provide a safer road surface during winter driving conditions. Use of the deicing agent helps to reduce the use of sand, which reduces impact on air quality, water quality, and aquatic habitat.

The City of Gladstone will use the lowest application rate necessary to achieve the desired road conditions. The product being used also meets the strict requirements of the Pacific Northwest Snowfighters Consortium. The city wants to make every effort to protect our nearby waterways, while still providing safe roadways. Plowing, sanding and deicing are all part of keeping the roadways safer. However, drivers have a shared responsibility to drive at speeds that are appropriate for road conditions and if at all possible; to delay travel until conditions are more favorable.

You can also visit Oregon's travel information website at http://www.tripcheck.com, or by calling 511 you can get information on the latest road conditions.

Chimney Safety Reminder

Always dispose of fireplace ashes in a metal bucket and place it outside away from any combustibles. Never use a paper bag for your ashes and do NOT place the ashes inside your garage. Have your chimney cleaned or checked regularly. Prevention is a lot cheaper than a fire

from a dirty or clogged chimney. Please recycle Christmas gift wrap. There are an increasing number of chimney fires each year from placing wrapping paper in the fireplace or woodstove.

Don't forget to check your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors and replace them if needed. Remember the effective life of today's alarms are about 10 years. Maybe provide a new flashlight for a winter power outage or a fire extinguisher for the home or car. For those of you that must drive in winter weather, consider a new can of de-ice for your car windows. Driving with frozen windows can cause accidents. Don't forget to keep an emergency travel kit in the car with a blanket, water, high energy food and a flashlight and /or road flares.

Don't Fall Victim to Fraudulent Phone Scams

Residents have contacted the City regarding questionable phone calls stating they are from Gladstone Municipal Court or the Social Security Office. Most of these scam/ spoof calls leave voicemails indicating that you have to call the scam phone # back to resolve whatever issue they are calling about. Variations of this con also spoof similar phone numbers. The area code and first three digits will be the same as yours, but scammers will vary the last four. This is because targets are more likely to pick up if they think the call is from someone nearby. Before returning any unknown call, please contact the office directly to verify the validity of the message: Gladstone Municipal Court– 503-557-2771, Social Security Office– 800-772-1213.

Safe Sidewalks

You and your neighbors have a right to expect Gladstone sidewalks to be in good condition and free of defects in order to prevent possible injury. Well-maintained sidewalks help create a vibrant community. Unfortunately, tree roots, ground settlement, freezing weather, and other acts of nature can damage sidewalks. Property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks and planting strip abutting their property. This includes keeping sidewalks clear of debris such as leaves, ice, snow, weeds, and overgrown shrubs. Trees must be pruned to allow pedestrian and vehicle passage. Defective sidewalks can be dangerous to persons or property. For example, if a portion of the sidewalk is elevated enough to cause someone to trip, it is considered an unreasonable risk.

The Gladstone Municipal Code, 8.04.100 states that maintenance of sidewalks, curbs, and driveways is the responsibility of the abutting property owners. Any vertical uplift exceeding 1/2 inch is a violation of city code and the sidewalk must be repaired. Contact Code Compliance at 503-557-2763 if you have any questions.

Studded Tire Season

Studded tire season runs through March 31, 2020. ODOT encourages drivers to consider other types of traction tires or chains. If you must travel when weather conditions are difficult, use other types of traction tires or chains, or postpone your travel until conditions change for the better.

Alternatives to studded tires: *Chains—link chains, cable chains or other devices that attach to the wheel, vehicle or outside of the tire that are specifically designed to increase traction on snow and ice. Drivers should note that link chains may not be recommended for use on some types of vehicles. *Other traction tires-these traction tires meet Rubber Manufacturers Association standards for use in severe snow conditions and carry a special symbol on the tire sidewall showing a three-peaked mountain and snowflake. They work about as well as studded tires on ice, but work better than studded tires or regular tires in most other winter conditions. And they cause no more damage to road surfaces than regular tires.
