

#### Scoop the Poop! Gladstone Help to Keep Our Water Clean

As our rains continue to move in, streams swell with water. In Gladstone, as well as the rest of our wet region, much of this water washes off the land and into the storm water system. Our storm systems drain water away from the City and into our local rivers. Along the way, it picks up pollutants, some of which you may not think of as pollution. What you do around your home, work, or anywhere in the city, makes a difference for clean water in our environment.

Bacteria is a natural component of lakes, rivers, and streams. Most of these bacterial agents are harmless. But some have the potential to cause sickness and disease in humans, pets, and other animals. Their origin may surprise you. Research conducted by Clean Water Services of Washington County found that, on average, 63 percent of E. coli bacteria contamination in streams originated from waterfowl and canine sources, i.e.: Ducks and Dogs!

What you do matters. Gladstone Public Works encourages everyone to please pick up your dog's poop. It is essentially raw sewage and should not be left anywhere on the ground. In addition to E. coli, dog waste can contain harmful organisms such as Leptospira and roundworms. These organisms can be very serious to both humans and pets, and can be carried



into your home after walking through yards parks or where animal waste has been present. This same bacteria washes into streams and rivers when it rains. The solution to this pollution is to pick up after your pets in your yard, parks our streets, put

waste in a bag and properly dispose of it in the trash.

Gladstone Public Works provides doggy-doo bags in all our parks to make cleaning up after your pets convenient for you. We appreciate our residents doing their part to help keep our city clean and green.

#### Upcoming Public Works Department Projects

The City of Gladstone Public Works Dept. has several projects that are coming up, Below you will see a map that outlines specific project areas. Noted on the map are three of the upcoming projects that are moving into the construction season of 2021. The Public Works Dept. will be putting out notifications to residents in project areas as we get closer to the start of each project.



W. Clackamas Sanitary Sewer Project: This project will focus on replacing a 300 ft. section of Sanitary Sewer line as well as 100ft of both Water and Storm line in the area of W. Clackamas Blvd. (area noted in blue). Replacement of this line will correct restricted flow in the existing line, this will help the city in reducing Sanitary Sewer Overflows in the future.

Slurry Seal Project: This project will include asphalt repairs and crack sealing in the highlighted areas (noted in red). The Slurry Seal project is scheduled to start in early July, the Public Works Dept. will make contact with residents in the slurry areas prior to the project start with more information.

Barclay Storm Line Replacement: The city is in the design phase of this project (noted in yellow) it does not have a start date. Updates on this project will be released as they are available.

E.Clackamas One Way Project: E. Clackamas Boulevard along Cross Park is currently designated as a one way street from First St. to Cornell Ave., and back to First St. There have been multiple safety concerns in this area due to vehicles going the wrong direction. There is a fairly large amount of foot and bicycle traffic as well. This project is designed with vehicle traffic, bicycle traffic, and pedestrian traffic in mind. The northern half of Cornell Avenue from First Street to mid-block will become a two way street. To accomplish this, the head in parking (eight parking spaces) on the northern half of Cornell Avenue will become parallel parking (three parking spaces). This will allow the traffic from the two businesses on Cornell Avenue to enter from First Street onto Cornell Avenue instead of driving around several blocks through the park.

ADA Ramp Replacement: The city will be working with grant funding to replace several ADA Ramps in town, the Public Works Dept. is working to identify ramps that will be replaced as part of this ongoing project.

#### Preventing Our Kids From Falling From Windows

Each year over 5000 children accidentally fall from windows. As warmer weather starts to approach, it is time to recognize and prevent these accidents from happening. Some simple tips and hardware ideas that can be found at any local hardware store will help prevent these accidents from happening:



- 1. In homes with children, install window guards on all second-story or higher windows. It is best to purchase window guards with a quick release mechanism. This will allow the window to be opened easily by an adult in the case of a fire emergency.
- 2. Use window stops to prevent windows from opening more than 4 inches.
- 3. Install locks on sliding windows to prevent children from opening them.
- 4. Move all furniture away from windows. Children can climb on furniture to access windows that are otherwise out of reach.
- 5. Create soft landing surfaces such as bushes or plant beds under windows to help prevent serious injuries in case of a fall.
- 6. Do not allow children to play on fire escapes, roofs or balconies.
- 7. Make sure that older children understand the dangers of climbing out of or jumping from windows
- 8. Young children should never be left at home unsupervised.

#### Bicycle Safety

Riding a bike is a healthy and fun activity as well as a mode of transportation for riders of all ages.

Before riding, make sure you and your bike are ready to ride. You can be a "Roll Model" for your peers and younger kids. Remember to:

- Wear a Bike Helmet. Protect your brain, save your life. For instructions on how to properly fit a bike helmet, visit the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's website at <a href="https://www.nhtsa.gov/sites/nhtsa.dot.gov/files/8019">www.nhtsa.gov/sites/nhtsa.dot.gov/files/8019</a> fitting-a-helmet.pdf
- Adjust Your Bike to Fit. Stand over your bike. There should be 1 to 2 inches between the rider and the top tube (bar) if using a road bike and 3 to 4 inches if using a mountain bicycle. The seat should be level front to back, and the height should be adjusted to allow a slight bend at the knee when the leg is fully extended. The handlebar height should be at the same level with the seat.
- Check Your Equipment. Before riding, inflate tires properly and check that the brakes work.
- See and Be Seen. Whether daytime, dawn, dusk, foul weather, or at night, make yourself visible. Wear neon, fluorescent or other bright colors when riding, to make yourself visible to others. Also wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. Remember, just because you can see a driver doesn't mean the driver can see you

Your bike is a vehicle, not a toy! Some bike crashes can cause serious injuries and most are related to the behavior of the bicyclist or the motorist. There are a number of things you can do to prevent a crash, and protect your brain if a crash

- Control Your Bike. Ride with two hands on the handlebars unless signaling a turn. Place books and other items in a bike carrier or backpack.
- Watch for and Avoid Road Hazards. Look for hazards that may make you crash, such as potholes, broken glass, gravel, puddles, leaves, and dogs.
- Use Verbal and Non-Verbal Communication. This includes eye contact with drivers, turn signals, pointing to road hazards for bicyclists behind you, and stating "passing on your left," or "on your left."
- Avoid Riding at Night. It's harder for other road users to see bicyclists at dusk, dawn or nighttime. Use reflectors on the front and rear of the bike. White front lights and red rear reflectors or lights are required by law



Fighting loneliness— It goes to say that the last year has been rough on everyone. However, for those living alone a hard time dealing with loneliness became even harder. ## St. Vincent de Paul and the City of Gladstone Extended!

The City of Gladstone has partnered with St. Vincent de Paul in helping Gladstone residents who have been financially impacted due to COVID-19. This Gladstone COVID Assistance Program (GCAP) may provide a combination of eligible assistance up to approximately two months of utility payments, one month rent and/or food assistance, with a maximum cap of \$1,000.00 per household.

This program is organized to run through the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and is available for all City of Gladstone residents upon applicant approval. The applicant must show emergency financial need related to COVID-19, such as loss of income or an unexpected and unusual necessary expense(s) combined with a lack of resources to satisfy the need. The applicant must live within Gladstone City Limits, and be 18 years of age or older.

For questions or to see if you are eligible, please



contact St. Vincent de Paul at 971-236-2111, leave a message with your contact information and financial need. This program will run until June 30, 2021.

#### HomeServe USA

Have you received a mailing from HomeServe USA? The mailing may inform the recipient that they are responsible for the maintenance and repairs of their exterior water lines, leaving them liable for repairs which could potentially cost thousands of dollars. The Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises residents to read the notice very carefully, particularly the portion that says "HomeServe is an independent company separate from your local utility or community." While homeowners are responsible for the maintenance and repair of their water lines from the meter to the house, the warranty coverage they offer is optional, not mandatory. The BBB recommends to never agree to any contract over the phone without first receiving it in writing, read the service contract very carefully, review your homeowners insurance policy or call your insurance agent to see if coverage is already provided and check the BBB website at www.bbb.org for issues.

#### Neighbors Helping Neighbors

#### Crosswalk Safety

Under Oregon law, every intersection is a legal crosswalk. You must safely stop for people showing intent to cross the street at a marked or unmarked crosswalk or at a marked mid-block crosswalk. (ORS 811.028) What does it mean to show intent? Walkers show intent by extending their hand, foot, wheelchair, cane, crutch or bicycle into the roadway. Drivers should yield right of way. For your safety, make sure vehicles moving in

Whether you walk, bike or drive, take 5 seconds to follow crosswalk safety guidelines:

all lanes and in both directions have stopped

Pedestrians:

before proceeding.

- Use sidewalks if possible.
- If there are no sidewalks, it is safer to walk facing road traffic.
- Make it easier for drivers to see you by dressing in light colors and wearing reflective clothing, and carry a flashlight in dark areas.
- Don't count on drivers paying attention,

make eye contact to be sure drivers see you!

• Use extra caution when crossing multiplelane, higher speed streets, and don't assume that because one lane has stopped, drivers in the other lanes have seen you and will also stop.

Bicycles:

- Be visible. Wear light colored or reflective clothing. Use lights on the front and back when riding at night or in other conditions when visibility is lower.
- Ride on the right. It is dangerous to ride on the road against the direction of traffic.
- Signal lane changes and turns with hand signals. Drivers often are very nervous driving around bicyclists because they don't know what to expect. They will generally give you more space and time to make your turn if they know what you intend to do.
- If a lane is so narrow that passing is dangerous, you may need to take the lane briefly to make that clear to drivers behind you. Also, take the lane when moving at the

speed of traffic, such as when traveling down hills or on downtown streets.

Drivers:

- When entering a crosswalk area, drive slowly and prepare to stop.
- Stop for pedestrians who are in a crosswalk, even an unmarked crosswalk.
- When stopping for a pedestrian in a crosswalk, stop well back so drivers in the other lanes can also see the pedestrian in time to stop.
- Do not pass other vehicles stopped for pedestrians.
- Be especially cautious around schools and in neighborhoods where children are around.
- Check the bike lane before turning. The bike lane is a travel lane. Bicyclists often move as quickly as cars. If you've just passed a bicyclist, check to make sure there is plenty of space before turning across their path.
- Look before opening your door so you don't open your door in front of other cars, bikes, or pedestrians.

Gladstone and the lost Continent of Atlantis have something in common?

growing fast. The summer Chautauqua was seventeen years old and flourishing with annual attendances in the thousands. As fast as new houses were built, new residents moved in. And along with all the new businesses, new churches, a new school, new clubs were forming faster than people could decide which one to join. So, they joined three or four, becoming members of groups as the Athletic Club, Commercial Club, Dancing Club, Euterpean Society, Flower Club. Gladstone Community Club, Gladstone Improvement Club, Literary Society, Live Wires, Women's Club, XL Club, and

The Chautauqua was responsible for bringing a lot of attention and newcomers to Gladstone. Newspapers as far away as Chicago and New York reported that the "Mother Chautauqua of the West resided in a pleasant little village named for one of Great Britain's most popular Prime Minsters" and suddenly, people from the opposite side of the country came to visit. When Gladstone's City Fathers realized how much notice the town was receiving, they called for a town meeting and proposed that if Gladstone was going to be in the nation's view, then it should give the nation something spectacular to see. Unanimously, it was decided that Gladstone should become the most beautiful town in all of Oregon.

Immediately, garbage that had been accumulating for way too long was hauled away. Benches were installed at all trolley stops. The riverbanks were cleared of underbrush. River Road (Clackamas Blvd.) was repaired. And last but not least, 10,000 new leafy shade trees were planted throughout the town. Townsfolk, club members, church groups, school children, and even the city fathers rolled up their sleeves and picked up a shovel. Every street, avenue, path, and north bank of the <u>www.GladstoneHistoricalSociety.org</u>.

In honor of Arbor Day, did you know that river was turned into a horticultural wonderment.

But wait, there's more. In 1911, when Judge In 1911, Gladstone was a busy place and Harvey Cross, Gladstone's founder, deeded the strip of land along the north bank of the Clackamas River (between the Gladstone-Park Place wagon bridge and the Interurban Trolley bridge) for a swimming and picnic park, he also included the densely wooded, 2. 4-acre piece of land located in the center of the Clackamas River (just east of the trolley bridge), called Clackamas Island or Gladstone Island. Since the island had an elevation well above the highest recorded flood level, the city fathers, in their quest to put Gladstone on the map...okay, the globe, decided to tame the tangled mess and create a unique mid-river extension to the swimming and picnic park. One hundred men volunteered to clear brush and create trails that preserved the island's natural wild beauty, and newspapers reported that a rustic arch bridge connecting the island with the mainland, a small band pavilion, and a boat house were also constructed. No sooner was the island -park completed than compliments poured in from all the surrounding communities praising the attractiveness of Gladstone's new park that "offered glorious views of up and down the Clackamas River".

> Gladstone enjoyed its island park for four years. Then came the December 1921 flood and the river swelled to an unprecedented high. When floodwaters finally receded, the island-park was gone. Portland newspapers were quick to condolences to Gladstone, stating that "in spite of its devastating loss, Gladstone was still a mighty pretty little town". No photo has yet been found that shows the entirety of Gladstone's island-park. However, a portion of the island can be seen in the 1893 cover photo of the Gladstone Historical Society's latest book - "Images of America - Gladstone", from Arcadia Publishing. Copies available from the Gladstone Historical

#### Around The House:

- Use nontoxic household products. Want to reduce the number of chemicals in your home and in your waterways? Start by purchasing nontoxic household products such as nontoxic cleaning supplies, laundry products, paints, insecticides, and pool chemicals. If your local store does not carry nontoxic products, ask them to start.
- Dispose of hazardous household products properly. Don't toss hazardous household chemicals down the drain. Contact your local public works, sanitation, or environmental health department and find out if your city has a hazardous waste collection day. If your city doesn't have a local program, ask them to start one.
- Save water. Don't let the water run while brushing your teeth or washing your face. Run your dishwasher and washing machine only when they are full. Fix leaky plumbing fixtures and switch to low-flow toilets and showerheads. Changing small habits can save more than 100 gallons of water a week.
- Recycle. Deposit waste in a trash can. Never flush non-degradable products or sweep debris into the street or storm sewer. Trash can damage city sewer systems and end up littered on beaches and in your
- Don't flush old prescription drugs down the drain (unless directed). Wastewater treatment plants are unable to remove drugs from sewer system water and they end up in our rivers and
- Don't let pollutants go down the drain, inside OR outside. Urban waters take on large amounts of pollution from a variety of sources, including polluted runoff from urban landscapes, which creates public and environmental health hazards. Remember, what goes on the ground and down your drain eventually ends up in the water. Don't dump oil, gasoline, solvents, paint, or other household chemicals down your household drains or storm drain.
- Recycle used motor oil and maintain your car. Throwing motor oil in the trash is illegal and harmful to your water source. Recycling centers and many service stations accept used motor oil for recycling. Also, be sure to keep up with regular car maintenance to prevent oil, coolant, antifreeze, or other hazardous chemicals from leaking onto the ground.
- Take your car to a car wash. A commercial car wash reclaims its wastewater using special filtration systems. This not only conserves water, but minimizes polluted runoff entering local storm

#### Gladstone Food Pantry News and Updates

because of the ongoing commitment of volunteers will be ready to advertise the Gladstone School District (GSD) more broadly to the school community (NWFS) to maintain the Gladstone Food Pantry as an Oregon Food Bank (OFB) School Pantry. The goal is to ensure that students, their families and other community members are able to supplement their nutritional needs on a regular basis, especially during COVID-19 and limited in-person schooling.

NWFS, a longtime partner of the GSD, manages the day-to-day operation of the pantry and strives to make the Pantry an efficient and effective supplemental food source for the school community as well as others in need.

The Gladstone School Food Pantry Coordinator, Maddie McGalliard, works full time for NWFS as Pantry housing services for the students and families and other Pantry customers.

NWFS has just completed relocating the Pantry to facility on the Hillside Fellowship campus at 6460 Glen Echo Ave. This is just a few blocks from the old pantry site and thought to be a much more convenient location for GSD students, families and staff as well as other community members.

Due to COVID-related health and safety issues, the Pantry is currently only providing food bags to COVID quarantined families; to families served by the Gladstone Center for Children and Families (GCCF) and the Relief Nursery; to GSD students and families through NWFS staff who are still serving GSD; and, the Gladstone Senior

In many cases, multiple families with school age children are living together to make ends meet due to the loss of jobs and income, lack of affordable childcare, and the rising cost of groceries. Recently, a woman was in tears explaining that she now has 7 extra mouths to feed and that the Pantry food is sustaining the nutritional needs of her and her unanticipated guests.
