A Message From The Gladstone Fire Chief



As your Fire Chief, my goal is to provide sustainable and affordable options for the best level of emergency services in Gladstone. Due to the robust services that surround us, we are in a position to safely and thoughtfully decide the future of Gladstone Fire & Emergency Services. Due to multiple factors over the past decade and specifically over the last two years, the Gladstone Fire Department has experienced

challenges to provide consistent levels of emergency response within the city. Fire departments that provide response coverage in similar cities, typically provide initial response with full-time employees. With the majority of firefighters in Gladstone being part-time, this presents a challenge in providing similar services and response times. Recruitment and retention of these part-time firefighters has been difficult. The reduction of qualified individuals that can enter the training process is one of these difficulties and has been further impacted by pandemic restrictions. Additionally, our current part-time/on-call firefighters are feeling the strain of maintaining increased training, the demands of staffing the fire station and balancing their personal lives at home (and at full time jobs) with the demands of increased emergency response standards and needs.

Gladstone Fire continues to respond to emergencies daily, but the demand has increased and maintaining the level of emergency services that is expected when 911 is called is the challenge we now face. Long-term solutions that involve answering the questions of how many qualified emergency responders are needed in Gladstone, what level of service is desired (including emergency medical care) is a priority for City Leadership.

To provide you with more information, the City of Gladstone has scheduled a special meeting on February 22nd at 5:30 pm (via zoom) to allow the community, elected officials and City leadership to review the status of the fire department and options for improving future emergency services. Look to the city website for more details on how to participate. Please mark your calendars for the City Council special meeting on fire & emergency

Announcing A Second Round Of Relief Funding For Artists

The application is now live for the Artist Resilience Program, a second round of relief funding for Oregon artists offered by the Oregon Arts Commission in partnership with the Oregon Community Foundation and the James F. and Marion L. Miller Foundation. The partnership, which began with 2020's Artist Relief Program, invests another \$1.5 million in support for artists' recovery from the pandemic.

Awards will generally range from \$1,000 to \$5,000 and will be determined by a peer review panel. A geographic distribution model will ensure that applicants from across Oregon are supported. Applications are due by 5 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 10, 2022.

"We are incredibly grateful to Oregon Community Foundation and the Miller Foundation for their dedication to helping us sustain our artists through these difficult times," said Brian Rogers, executive director of the Oregon Arts Commission. "In reaching Oregon's artists, we know we are not only supporting these individuals financially, but also enabling them to continue their creative careers and enliven the cultural environments of Oregon."

The purpose of the Artist Resilience Program is to provide relief funding to Oregon artists who have experienced financial hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic due to cancellations of exhibitions, performances, rehearsals or other activities with a stipend, events, teaching opportunities, book signings or other professional presentation opportunities. 2022 Business License Renewals

Business license renewals are due January 1st of each year. For businesses located within Gladstone the fee is \$100, plus \$5 per employee over 3 Full Time Equivalent employees, an additional \$50 fee is required for any <u>NEW</u> business being operated out of a home. For rental properties, the base fee of \$100 is required along with an additional \$25 for one rental unit, \$50 for 2-5 rental units, \$75 for 6-12 rental units or \$100 for 13+ rental units. Liquor License Renewals

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) advises the City yearly for businesses that are eligible for a liquor license renewal. Oregon Revised Statues (ORS) 471.166 establishes the process for local governments to make recommendations of approval or denial to the OLCC. Street Sweeping 101



Our DEQ stormwater permit requires regular maintenance of our stormwater conveyance system. As part of our DEQ permit requirements, Public Works sweep the streets regularly so as to limit pollutant outflow into our rivers. The street sweeper operates on an

efficiency pattern to make the best use of personnel time, wear and tear on the sweeper. If you see the street sweeper in your neighborhood, and it seems like it missed your street, please be patient, it will be back within the next few days. The street sweeper typically does not sweep neighborhoods on garbage collection day, as maneuvering around trash cans poses a risk to your garbage cans and to the city's equipment. The same is true for parked cars, basketball hoops, overhanging limbs, or anything that blocks the travel portion of the street. Public Works asks that you please use your yard debris receptacles rather than the street for your yard cleanup needs. The Public Works crew very much appreciates the cooperation and assistance of our citizens. Together, we make the City a better place for all of us.

During our rainy season, if you see a catch basin that is backed-up, please remember a rake is all it takes, in most cases a quick sweep with a rake will resolve the matter quickly. You may also contact our Public Works Dept. Monday – Friday 8:00 am -3:30 pm at 503.656.7957.

Report a Streetlight Problem



City of Gladstone Street Sweeping Schedule

The Public Works Department will be continuing a "Monthly Street Sweeping Schedule", this schedule will follow the same "area/zone map" as utilized for the Leaf Pick-Up Program. The first Monday of every month the street sweeper will run consecutively for eight business days, completing one area per day until the entire City is completed. The schedule takes into consideration garbage pickup days, as to not interfere with garbage pick-up. In the event your scheduled day falls on a holiday, the schedule will be delayed by one (1) day.



Environmentally Conscious Deicing



recently received many phone calls with

concerns regarding water usage. If there has

been no change to how water is being used in

the home, but you notice an increase in your

consumption, it is important to look to see if

a leak could be the reason for the water

increase. Undetected leaks can be costly.

Your water meter can tell you how much

water you use in a day, week or a month. It

can also help you measure the effectiveness of

your household's water conservation program

and help detect leaks. Whether inside or

outside your home a leak can waste hundreds

of gallons of water per year. Some leaks are

easy to see or hear. Others are small.

However, big or small, any leak cost you

money and should be repaired as soon as

Your water meter should be located in front

of your house, inside a concrete or plastic

meter box that is set flush with the ground.

Look for your meter behind the sidewalk at a

side lot line near the street. If your home is on

a corner lot, your water meter could be

located either on the front or side street.

Sometimes, meter boxes are not easily visible

due to landscaping and other obstructions.

How to locate your meter:

The City of Gladstone will continue to utilize liquid deicer for the upcoming winter driving season. Sourced from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), magnesium chloride (MgC12) with rust inhibitor; is an effective way to provide a safer road surface during winter driving conditions. Use of the deicing agent helps to reduce the use of sand, which reduces impact on air quality, water quality and aquatic habitat.

The City of Gladstone will use the lowest application rate necessary to achieve the desired road conditions. The product being used also meets the strict requirements of the Pacific Northwest Snowfighters Consortium. The City makes every effort to protect our nearby waterways, while still providing safe roadways. Plowing, sanding and deicing are all part of keeping the roadways safer. When winter weather is upon us crews will lay deicer down at stop and start areas, hills and curves, however crews will not lay deicer on flat straight roadways. Please remember that drivers have a shared responsibility to drive at speeds that are appropriate for road conditions and if at all possible, to delay travel until conditions are more favorable.

Checking For Leaks

The Gladstone Utility Billing Department has Checking your system for leaks:

your water meter to detect leaks. First, turn off all your faucets and water-using appliances (such as dish and clothes washers) and be sure no one is using any water. Then go to your water meter and lift the cover of the meter dial. Write down all the numbers you see on the meter. Then, wait 30-60 minutes and write down all the numbers again. If the numbers have changed at all, you probably have a leak somewhere in your system. If the small red diamond shaped indicator on the face of the meter is moving, it also means you probably have a leak. Retest to be certain; then locate the leak by inspecting all the pipes, fixtures and appliances that use water.

Where to look for leaks:

- •Your toilet may have a silent leak. Drop a little food coloring in the tank. Wait about 10 minutes without flushing. If color appears in the bowl you have a leak.
- •Check for moist spots around and under house plumbing and around outdoor plumbing.
- •Replace worn washers in faucets and showerheads. A little drip waste many

gallons each day.

There is a simple test you can perform to use Below shows the approximate water that is used with different types of leaks:

- *A dripping leak consumes: 15 gal. Per day, 450 gal. per month
- *1/8 in. leak consumes: 3,806 gal. Per day, 114,200 gal. per month
- *1/32 in. leak consumes: 264 gal. Per day, 7,920 gal. per month
- *1/4 in. leak consumes: 15,226 gal. Per day, 456,800 gal. per month
- *1/16 in. leak consumes: 943 gal. Per day, 28,300 gal. per month
- *1/2 in. leak consumes: 60,900 gal. Per day, 1,827,000 gal. per month

Found a leak?

The first thing you should do once you have found a leak is to get it fixed! Any leak that is located from the house to the meter are the responsibility of the property owner. This may mean that you will need to contact a plumber for repairs.

Once the leak is fixed, you can submit copies of the receipt from the repair to the Utility Billing Department and request a leak credit. If you have any questions, please contact the Utility Billing Office at 503-557-2771

Keep the Wipes Out



Please remember to toss all hand wipes, baby wipes and other wipes in the trash instead of flushing them down the toilet.

These so-called "flushable" wipes do not disintegrate in water like toilet paper. The vast majority of these products stay fully intact, which means they can clog pipes and cause sewage backups. When wipes make it into the main sewer line, they often get tangled and damage equipment at our wastewater treatment facilities or pump stations, which can cost thousands of dollars to repair or replace.

•No wipes are flushable, even if the packaging claims Learn more at clackamas.us/wes/education

they are. Think about it: these wipes have sat in packaging for months, yet when you pull them out, they are still wet. The fact they don't disintegrate while being removed from the package tells you they will not disintegrate when flushed.

•Please remember that toilet paper should be the only thing you flush down the toilet.

A Minute of Gladstone History By: Kim Argraves Huey Gladstone Historical Society Historian

Part 2 - More Gladstone Politics and Elections.

1915 - F.E. Goodwin and Henry Strebig competed for a position on the Gladstone City Council. F.E. really wanted the job, but Henry was unsure. Then his friends, without his approval, undertook a HUGE write-in campaign and won Henry the seat. F.E. protested, arguing that Henry was not a US citizen and therefore ineligible to serve. Honestly, Henry didn't know where he was born and so he thanked his friends and stepped aside.

All did not go well for F.E. Goodman in his new council position. Appointed as manager of Gladstone's water department, F.E. soon found himself drowning in trouble when he appointed a new water superintendent (Johnson) without first dismissing the old water superintendent (McGetchie). With no explanations or instructions to the two men, buckets and wrenches soon flew. Both men insisted they were in charge, and both refused to cooperate with the other. While McGetchie was out collecting water rents from Gladstone's citizens, Johnson was busily engaged in turning off water due to unpaid bills.

Gladstone residents were incensed and demanded that Mayor Chambers Howell rectify the situation immediately. A council meeting was called with all councilmen expected to be in attendance. Somehow, F.E. didn't get the memo. His seat remained empty when the gavel went down. Furious, Mayor Howell ordered Police Chief Bell to fetch Councilman Goodman to the table. F.E. refused the summons. When Chief Bell returned without his man, Mayor Howell demanded that he go back and drag F.E. to the council chambers. Chief Bell refused. F.E. was a large and abundantly proportioned man. Chief Bell was not. F. E. was known to partake in sparring matches around Gladstone. Chief Bell did not. Rather than attempt to dislocate parts of himself while attempting to relocate a stubborn F.E. to the council chambers, Chief Bell turned in his star.

For the next several months, the City Council continued to grapple with the water mess. Why didn't F.E. just straighten it out and be done with it? The answer is that he was busy. Earlier that spring, F.E. had started twice-weekly counseling sessions with his egg lady, offering her a comfy shoulder to cry on and indepth advice concerning her troubled marriage. F.E.'s friends knew of his new avocation. The neighbors knew. His wife denied it. And quite by accident, the egg lady's husband discovered it in a locked hotel room in downtown Portland. Funny, the egg lady's husband hadn't realized his marriage was in trouble.

Poor F.E. What's a well-meaning guy supposed to do? When he got word that the egg lady's husband was suing him for "alienation of affection", he immediately transferred all his possessions to his wife. Oregon law at that time stated that pulling such a trick was an automatic admission of guilt. F.E. was ordered to pay \$1000.00 to the egg lady's husband.

F.E. remained on the city council until February 1918. With the Gladstone water department still in a huge mess, he resigned from the council and disappeared from our records. Rumor had it that he left town to do more counseling.

City of Gladstone Low Income Assistance Program

The City of Gladstone provides residential customers a Low Income Utility Assistance Program which permits a reduced monthly charge for City billed services such as Water, Sewer and Stormwater utilities.

Qualifications

- \bullet A residential customer of Gladstone with one or more utility services provided by the City.
- The property is the principal residence and occupied by the applicant.
- No delinquent payments owed to the City, including utilities, court fines, and any other assessed fees or charges.
- Written application must be submitted on the City form and include all requested documentation for proof of income from all sources listed, from all income earners.
- Approval expires every year on June 30th and re-qualification must be submitted with current information annually.

The Finance Department will notify all applicants of approval or denial in writing. If denied the applicant will have the ability to appeal within ten days from the date of the denial letter.

Income Limits:

- Based upon Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits/ Very Low Income Limits (50% of Median Family Income) for the Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro, OR-WA MSA as published at HUD.gov and updated annually. Limits in effect as of July 1 will apply for the fiscal year period.
- Income limit areas are based on the current fiscal year Fair Market Rent (FMR) areas.
- Income levels are incrementally based on households of one to eight persons.

Villages are intentional caring communities of neighbors helping neighbors. Each Village reflects the community it serves, responding to the needs of its members. Rivers East Village serves the communities of Gladstone, Milwaukie and the surrounding areas.

Villages mobilize volunteers to provide programs and services that older

adults need to remain safe and independent in their homes, such as transportation, light home maintenance, tech support, friendly visits and check-in calls. Villages also offer social and educational activities that reduce isolation and create interpersonal connections and social support. From its Boston beginnings in 2002, the Village concept has grown to a now-thriving network of more than 300 nonprofit, community-based Villages serving about 40,000 older adults across the country and internationally. The Village model is now established as a cost-effective and sustainable solution for healthy, vibrant aging.

This year the U.S. Congress will proclaim February 15 as National Village Day. Rivers East Village (REV) will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Village Movement on February 18th, 10:00am at Libbies Restaurant, 11056 SE Main St, Milwaukie. 
St. Vincent de Paul and the City of Gladstone

The City of Gladstone has once again partnered with St. Vincent de Paul in helping Gladstone residents who have been financially impacted due to COVID-19. This Gladstone COVID Assistance Program (GCAP) may provide a combination of eligible assistance up to approximately two months of utility payments, one month rent and/or food assistance, with a maximum cap of \$1,000.00 per household.

This program is organized to run through the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and is available for all City of Gladstone residents upon applicant approval. Applicants must show emergency financial need related to COVID-19 and be a Gladstone resident.

For questions or to see if you are eligible, please contact St. Vincent de Paul at 971-236-2111, leave a message with your contact information and financial need. This program will run until December 31, 2026 or until all funding is exhausted, whichever comes first.

Check out our lengthy bird roster; printed copies are located on the FOGNAP tool shed. All 84 birds identified by the Audubon Society are listed. Look for raptors, hawks, and merlins. Our bald eagles are around too, along with peregrine falcons, downy woodpeckers, juncos and swarms of bush tits. Hear that faint clicking sound? That's our hummingbird friends who think they own the maple trees. Bring your binoculars and spend a quiet hour in the Nature Park.

A new Story Walk is up on the Metro trail and young visitors and their families are already enjoying it. The Snowy Day, by Ezra Jack Keats, will delight children as they work their way up the trail.

Volunteer! We love our volunteers! Yes, we still work outside in the wintertime. There's no better place to spend a lovely winter morning than in the Nature Park. Consider joining a work party. Our volunteers perform many tasks: trail maintenance, blackberry and ivy removal, watering. Kids love to use the grabbers and buckets to hunt for trash, so they are welcome too. 
