Help Shape the Future of Meldrum Bar Park





ESA to help develop a master plan for Meldrum Bar Park. The process studied design alternatives that explored spatial layouts, circulation patterns, types of amenities to be enhanced or added, parking and restrooms, and potential landscape improvements and restoration. After receiving comments from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, ESA is now encouraging the community to review and give feedback through a survey. Each of the two concepts proposes thoughtful improvements to the existing park.

These improvements are intended to honor the current uses of the park while adding more walking paths, picnic

areas, parking, safety, upgrades, and other features. The survey will be available until May 30th. After input is gathered the consultants will develop a preferred alternative that blends the best ideas from both concepts.

Preventing Kids From Falling Out Windows

Each year, according to the CDC, over 5,000 children accidentally fall from windows. As the warmer weather is here, we need to recognize and prevent these accidents from happening. These simple tips and hardware ideas that can be found at any local hardware store will help prevent these accidents from happening.

Prevention Tips

- In homes with children, install window guards on all second-story or higher windows.
- Use window stops to prevent windows from opening more than 4 inches.
- Window screens are not designed to stop a child from falling. A normal window screen is NOT enough to keep children safe.
- It is best to purchase window guards with a quick release mechanism. This will allow the window to be opened easily by an adult in the case of a fire emergency.
- \bullet Install locks on sliding windows to prevent children from opening them.
- Move all furniture away from windows. Children can climb on furniture to access windows that are otherwise out of reach.
- Create soft landing surfaces such as bushes or plant beds under windows to help prevent serious injuries in case of a fall.
- Do not allow children to play on fire escapes, roofs or balconies.
- Make sure that older children understand the dangers of climbing out of or jumping from windows.
- Young children should never be left at home unsupervised.

Scoop the Poop!

Gladstone Public Works needs your help to keep our water system clean. Much of the water that falls from the sky washes off the land, into the stormwater system, and into our rivers. Along the way it picks up pollutants, making a difference in the clean water in our environment.

Bacteria is a natural component of lakes, rivers, and streams. Most of these bacterial agents are harmless, but some have the potential to cause sickness and disease in humans, pets, and other animals. Research conducted by Clean Water Services of Washington County found on average, 63% of E. coli bacteria contamination in streams originated from waterfowl and canine sources, i.e.: Ducks and Dogs!

Gladstone Public Works encourages everyone to pick up their dog's poop. It is essentially raw sewage and should not be left anywhere on the ground. In addition to E. coli, dog waste can contain harmful organisms such as Leptospira and roundworms. These organisms can be very serious to both humans and pets and can be carried into your home after walking through yards or parks where animal waste has been present. That bacterium washes into streams and rivers. The solution to this pollution is to pick up after your pets in your yard, parks, and streets, put the waste in a bag, and properly dispose of it in the trash. Thank you for helping to keep our City clean and green!

Lawn Mower Safety



Now that spring is here, we will be getting out of the house and once again paying attention to our yards. Each year across the United

States, 6,394 people, on average, sustain serious injuries — including burns, cuts and broken bones — in lawn-mower accidents, according to a new study from Johns Hopkins researchers, published in the journal Public Health Reports.

Before operating your lawnmower for the first time this season, here are a few helpful reminders:

Start with the owner's manual. Familiarize yourself with the operation and the safe handling of your power equipment.

Inspect equipment. Loose or damaged parts, including bolts, belts, and guards should be carefully looked at for damage or missing items.

Check the fuel tank for leaks. Any amount of leaking fuel can end with disastrous results. Always have a properly charged fire extinguisher handy when refueling.

Always store fuel in a proper container.

Ensure that blade is properly sharpened. A sharp blade can produce a better cut for your lawn and allow your mower to work easier. Dull, nicked, and damaged blades should always be replaced or sharpened.

Make sure safety glasses and ear protection are properly worn.

Make sure you are aware of what you are mowing. Tall grasses and weeds can hide items like rocks and other things that can cause injuries.

Street Parking Regulations



Gladstone Code Enforcement would like to remind its citizens that there are City ordinances regulating on-street parking and these ordinances are very specific as to the type of vehicles that can be parked

on city streets. Chapter 10.04 of the Gladstone Municipal Code (available online on the city's website, www.ci.gladstone.or.us) includes the following:

- No person shall park, store, or leave standing a vehicle on a public street or public property controlled by the City for a timeframe of more than 72 hours
- No vehicle shall be parked or operated on a street when the vehicle registration as indicated by registration stickers or registration card is expired

Please be mindful of neighbors and use alternative parking, such as RV pads or local RV storage facilities, etc. By following these guidelines we can all enhance city services, improve public safety and help make our neighborhoods more "neighbor friendly" for Gladstone residents.

St. Vincent de Paul

The City of Gladstone has once again partnered with St. Vincent de Paul in helping Gladstone residents who have been financially impacted due to COVID-19. This Gladstone COVID Assistance Program (GCAP) may provide a combination of eligible assistance up to approximately two months of utility payments, one month rent and/or food assistance, with a maximum cap of \$1,000.00 per household.

This program is organized to run through the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and is available for all City of Gladstone residents upon applicant approval. Applicants must show emergency financial need related to COVID-19 and be a Gladstone resident.

For questions or to see if you are eligible, please contact St. Vincent de Paul at 971-236-2111, leave a message with your contact information and financial need. This program will run until December 31, 2026 or until all funding is exhausted, whichever comes first.

Backflow FAQ's & Why is Backflow Testing Required?

What is Backflow? When pressure in a water system isn't maintained, the risk for water to flow backward into the water system and become contaminated is greatly increased. Backflow testing monitors the health and safety mechanisms designed to protect water purity. Backflow testing helps prevent water contamination or pollution.

do this? It is a reminder for you to get your backflow assembly tested. It is an important annual test that helps make sure the public drinking water remains clean and safe.

I did this last year. Why am I getting this notice again? Backflow Assemblies are mechanical units, they must be regularly checked to ensure they are in working condition

What is a backflow assembly? A backflow assembly is used to protect potable water supplies from contamination or pollution due to backflow. These are often found connected to sprinkler systems and fire systems.

Do I need a backflow preventer on my sprinkler system? YES, sprinkler system backflow prevention devices are safety mechanisms to prevent contaminants from entering water supplies. Irrigation backflow devices are designed for installation on potable water lines to protect against both back-siphonage and backpressure of contaminated water into the potable water supply.

What is a cross-connection? A cross-connection is a "link" between drinking water and a system or fixture that carries or contains something other than drinking water. An example would be a garden hose lying in a hot tub.

Safe Sidewalks

Everyone has a right to expect *G*ladstone sidewalks to be in good condition and free of defects in order to prevent possible injury. Well-maintained sidewalks help create a vibrant community. Unfortunately, tree roots, ground settlement, freezing weather, and other acts of nature can damage sidewalks. Property owners are responsible for maintaining the sidewalk and planting strip abutting their property. This includes keeping sidewalks clear of debris such as leaves, ice, snow, weeds, and overgrown shrubs. Trees must be pruned to allow safe pedestrian and vehicle passage. A defective sidewalk is one that creates an unreasonable risk of danger to persons or property. For example, if a portion of the sidewalk is elevated enough to cause someone to trip, it is considered an unreasonable risk.

The Gladstone Municipal Code, 8.04.100 states that maintenance of sidewalks, curbs, and driveways is the responsibility of the abutting property owners. Any vertical uplift exceeding ½ inch is a violation of city code and the sidewalk must be repaired. Contact Code Compliance at 503-557-2763 or sboyle@gladstoneoregon.us if you have any questions.


City of Gladstone Street Sweeping Schedule



A Minute of Gladstone History

CORRECTION in last month's article. The Bishop option was made in

Gladstone Dam Part 2: For three years, the Gladstone Dam steadily churned out power and dared the Clackamas River to destroy it. But then, in 1893, the government arrived and nearly did what the river had yet to do. Shut down the entire operation. It seems the Clackamas Fish this could save 32 lives and prevent 250 serious injuries every year Hatchery was missing eggs. Only 300,000 of the usual eight million could be accounted for. What happened to the eggs? And where were the salmon that supplied them?

After a thorough government inspection, the blame was placed on the Gladstone Dam, along with the fisherman who were stretching their gill nets across the mouth of the river. Tempers flared, fines were threatened, and Judge Cross gave the Gladstone Dam an expensive makeover. Finally, after being angled, laddered, shortened, had holes cut into it, and had more rocks added to it, the dam met the government's new regulations. Gradually, the fish egg numbers began to increase.

Whew. The government went back to Washington DC, Judge Cross breathed a sigh of relief, and the Gladstone Dam went back to doing what it did best, creating power. All was well until the next spring when the Clackamas River threw one of its tantrums and destroyed Judge Cross' sawmill and a good chunk of the dam. Judge Cross abandoned the parts and pieces left of his sawmill but patched up his dam.

In 1907, the Bishop family arrived in Gladstone eager to explore the possibility of building their new woolen mill alongside the Gladstone Dam. But the conclusion of their fact-finding survey was not what they had hoped. As best as can be gathered from newspaper accounts. improving the dam to increase the desired amount of power was not nearly as cost prohibitive as fulfilling all the government mandates that guaranteed safe passage of the salmon upriver. The Bishops departed. Gladstone was disappointed.

Finally, with Willamette Falls and the new Cazadero Dam creating immense amounts of power (along with suffering their own fish troubles), the Gladstone Dam gradually was no longer needed. It fell out of use. Nothing to do but blow it up and give the river back to the fish.

In 1907, Trojan Powder was the new sensation. A deal was made with H. K. McFarland, the district dealer for this new explosive substance. McFarland could put on a public demonstration of his nitrostarch and Gladstone could be rid of a dam. With local newspapers reporters crowding the banks of the Clackamas River, McFarland cautiously filled a gunny sack with his volatile powder, rowed out to the middle of the river, lit the fuse, dropped the gunny sack bundle onto the center of the dam, and rowed away just seconds before the powder exploded. Boom. The end of the Gladstone Dam, and the end of the dream for a woolen mill in Gladstone. Temporary Signs in Gladstone

Gladstone Municipal Code Chapter 17.52.100 - Temporary signs https://www.codepublishing.com/OR/Gladstone/#!/Gladstone17/ Gladstone1752.html#17.52.100

Here are some helpful reminders to consider before placing a temporary sign:

- Sign regulations stipulate that residential properties may have two temporary signs with a total maximum size of 16 square feet for both signs;
- Temporary signs must observe half of the zoning district setback, which typically means the signs must be set back 10 feet from the street property line – not the curb line;
- No sign shall extend into the public right-of way;
- No sign shall be attached to a tree or utility pole;
- Temporary signs may be only be displayed for 180 days total in any calendar year for each lot or parcel, or only until the event associated with the sign has ended, whichever is earlier.

Please note: sign regulations prohibiting signs posted in the right of way and signs exceeding the maximum area are strictly enforced.

Report a Streetlight Problem


