

## Political Signs



Local elections take place on November 8th. Before posting political signs, here are some helpful reminders: \*no application or fees are required to post a sign on your own private property; \*Residential properties may have two temporary signs with a total maximum size of 16 square feet for both signs; \*No sign shall extend into the public right-of-way; temporary signs must observe half of the zoning district setback – which typically means the signs must be back 10 feet from the street

property line, not the curb line; \*No sign shall be attached to a tree or utility pole. ## Fish on the Run, Irrigation Done!



Help keep water in the Clackamas River by participating in our "Fish On the Run, Irrigation Done!" annual summer watering campaign. The Clackamas River Water Providers (CRWP), a coalition of municipal drinking water providers that get their drinking water from the Clackamas River, are

asking their water customers to help the river by reducing or shutting-off outdoor watering by the beginning of September when Fall Chinook and Coho Salmon begin returning to the Clackamas River on the way to their spawning grounds.

In addition to providing drinking water to over 300,000 people the river is home to migrating salmon and steelhead virtually year-round. Most of the year there is plenty of water in the river however, due to the lack of rain to replenish the river and high temperatures river flows become low in late summer and early fall. These conditions highlight the need for increased efficiency in water use, which lowers consumption and conserves our available water resources in the Clackamas River.

So, if you get your drinking water from the Clackamas River, whether you use a hose or have an underground watering system to water your yard and garden, and care about protecting our river water for people, and wildlife here's your chance to be part of our annual "Fish On the Run, Irrigation Done!" campaign to help migrating fish.

Go to www.clackamasproviders.org to find out what kind of changes you can make to your outdoor watering to ensure that you are using our drinking water in the most efficient ways possible. Take the pledge and receive a free yard sign (below) letting neighbors know you are doing your part to keep water in the Clackamas River for the fish.

The more water we can conserve the easier this journey will be for these threatened and endangered salmon species.

## Clackamas Fire District #1 Halloween Safety Tips

Kids love the magic of Halloween, but costumes and traffic safety are essential for trick-or-treaters. Remember to stop by Gladstone Fire Station with your trick-or-treater on Halloween, as your local firefighters will be handing out candy.

According to the National Safety Council, these tips can help make a safe and happy holiday for everyone.

## Costume Safety

Before Halloween, be sure to choose a costume that won't cause safety hazards

- All costumes, wigs, and accessories should be fire-resistant
- If kids are allowed out after dark, make sure they can be seen by adding reflective tape to their costume or wearing a reflective vest, or using glow sticks
- Consider non-toxic Halloween makeup over masks, as masks can make it difficult for kids to see

#### When they're out on Halloween Night

- Make sure to blow out any candles before leaving the house
- A responsible adult should accompany younger kids around the neighborhood
- If your older kids are going alone, make sure to plan a safe route with your kids
- Teach your kids never to enter a stranger's home or car
- Instruct kids to travel only in familiar, well-lit areas and stay with their friends
- $\bullet$  Tell your kids not to eat any treats until they return home and checked out by an adult
- Make sure kids and adults put down their electronic devices, keep their heads up, and walk, don't run across the street

## Safety Tips for Motorists

- Watch for kids and adults walking on roadways, medians, and curbs
- Enter and exit driveways, carefully
- In the evening, watch for kids in dark clothing
- Discourage new, inexperienced drivers from driving on Halloween

#### A Rake Is All It Takes!

Summer may be behind us here in Gladstone but the wet and rainy Pacific Northwest fall and winters require that we all get weatherized. Some things that you might not think about are the catch basins in your neighborhood. Gladstone Public Works is diligent to keep our stormwater drains and conveyances cleaned out and ready for rain. However, with over 1,000 stormwater catch basins within our city, Public Works appreciates citizen assistance in helping to keep the storm basins clear. If a catch basin in the street near your house becomes covered with leaves, a rake is all it takes to clear the leaves away. Please sweep up debris from your yard and driveway, and do not blow or hose leaves or other

material into the streets, as it will wash into the storm basins. Keeping the catch basins clear allows stormwater to leave the city and helps prevent neighborhood flooding.



## St. Vincent de Paul

The City of Gladstone has partnered with St. Vincent de Paul in helping Gladstone residents who have been financially impacted due to COVID-19. Gladstone COVID Assistance Program (GCAP) may provide a combination of assistance up to approximately two months of utility payments, one month rent and/or food assistance, with a maximum cap of \$1,000.00 per household.

This program is organized to run through the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and is available to Gladstone residents upon applicant approval.

## Curbside Leaf Pick-up Program



In addition to the schedule curbside leaf pick up the Public Works Dept. will hold two Saturday leaf drop events. Saturday November  $12^{th}$  & November  $17^{th}$  8:00 am – 12:00 pm at the Public Works Yard (18595 Portland Ave.) Gladstone residents only, no contractors.

<u>Please have your leaf pile ready for pick-up by the first day of your area's designated pick-up schedule</u>. While it is important to have your leaves ready for pick-up by the first day on your schedule, please remember that leaves placed in the street too far in advance of leaf pick-up will cause the leaves to wash into our storm drains, increasing the risk of flooding in your neighborhood. Best practice is to put your leaves out for pick-up the day before your area's first scheduled day.

<u>Please have your leaves placed in one large pile in the street, at least one foot from the curb.</u> This extra space between the curb and the leaf pile allows water to drain into the city's storm basins. With the rainy season coming, any help you can provide to keep your neighborhood's stormwater catch basins clear of leaves and debris will benefit both you and your neighbors. A rake is all it takes!

- Do not block: Bike lanes, sidewalks, pathways, mailboxes, driveways, or intersections with leaf piles. Keep leaf piles separate from garbage cans and yard debris bins.
- Remove any obstructions: Including basketball hoops and parked cars, to allow for the leaf pick-up equipment.
- Crews will not pick up: Yard debris, tree branches, grass clippings, construction materials, or garbage during leaf pick-up operations. Please do NOT place these items in your leaf piles!
- Please place small piles of leaves in your yard debris bin! Let's keep small piles out of the street!


Gladstone Senior Center will produce a Winter Holiday Market on the 2nd Saturday in **December (10th) ALL DAY.** We'll have vendors selling

## A Minute of Gladstone History – by Kim Argraves Huey, Gladstone Historical Society Historian.



School Time Part 2: During the 1870s, families living along the south bank of the Clackamas River in the community of Park Place generally sent their children north across the Clackamas River to the Cason's "Little

Red Schoolhouse" (LRS), instead of into Oregon City, for their education. Yes, the Clackamas River could be temperamental, but the distance the children had to walk to school was much shorter. In 1868, William Buck converted his sawmill into a paper-making mill, and as the main supplier of newsprint for the Portland Oregonian, the business flourished. Not only did the Park Place papermill provide jobs that enticed families to move to the area, but so did the railroad's addition of the Paper-Mill Station, which made travel between Portland and Oregon City much easier. As the population grew, so did the number of children that were sent to attend classes in the LRS. Over the next 16 years, the LRS building that was intended for about a dozen children now crowded in 50 students, and with more wanting to attend. In 1878, to help alleviate the situation, the small First Congregational Church began holding school classes in its tiny sanctuary, but it was soon overwhelmed.

In 1892, both Park Place and the very early residents of future Gladstone started talking about building their own new and bigger schools. But Park Place was the more populous community with very vocal proponents, and so the new and bigger school was built in Park Place. In 1893, the doors of the new school opened, making available a 12-grade education to both the students of Park Place and Gladstone. Within two years, the LRS had closed and all of the Gladstone students were once again braving the Clackamas River to attend school. But the Gladstone parents were unsettled. While they thrilled at the quality education their children were receiving, in Park Place, they were worried about the sudden floods and angry water that at times covered the wagon bridge's roadway by several inches, as well as the considerable walk along unpaved paths, through strands of timber, and across open fields to reach the school.

The cry went up in Gladstone. We need our own school! And after much discussion and a few dustups with school district officials, Gladstone won their demand. In 1908, Gladstone School District #115 was created. Immediately, Judge Harvey Cross donated two blocks of land and Gladstonians went to work building their own eight-grade school, which opened in September of that year. Gladstone remained a one school town until 1966 when a 4-year high school opened. Later, District #115 included a middle school, a preschool, and a Kindergarten center.

#### Have You Met Oscar?

Oscar the Oscillator will help build an earthquake-ready Abernethy Bridge.

Construction is continuing on pace for the I-205 Improvements Project, and the crew is preparing for the arrival of the world's most powerful steel casing oscillator, affectionately nicknamed Oscar. This piece of equipment is vital to building a safer, earthquake-ready Abernethy Bridge, enabling I-205 to be a lifeline route after a disaster.

Making the Abernethy Bridge earthquake-ready means the bridge will need to sit atop new supporting columns that are anchored in hard, solid bedrock located deep under the Willamette Riverand this is where Oscar comes in. Oscar has a powerful motor that develops tremendous torque that is used to rotate, or oscillate, and simultaneously push, large cylindrical pieces of steel, called casings, into the ground.

As these casings are inserted, the soil within them is removed by a large crane and digging bucket. The resulting shafts are then filled with steel rebar cages and concrete to form new bridge foundations. As Oscar's work progresses, the new columns will become visible as they increase in height and emerge from the water. Oscar has the most powerful hydraulic rams for an oscillator in the world, which means he can dig into bedrock with force and precision.

Thanks to Oscar's work, the Abernethy Bridge will be anchored in seismically-stable bedrock.

A few fun things about Oscar and his work:

- He weighs 200,000 pounds, equivalent to 26 elephants the size of Samudra at the Oregon Zoo.
- He will drill a total of 28 shafts, allowing the construction of new support columns for the widened Abernethy Bridge. Some of these shafts will extend more than 200 feet below the Willamette River, equivalent to the height of the Oregon Convention Center spires, or 20 basketball hoops stacked on top of each other.

Oscar recently arrived in Tacoma, Washington via the Panama Canal. He traveled 9,070 nautical miles to reach the United States. The German manufacturing company Leffer built Oscar to serve as the mighty operating oscillator. He was shipped in seven containers and will travel by truck to the Oregon City worksite for

Once Oscar is finished working on the Abernethy Bridge, he will be packed up and sent to his next job.
