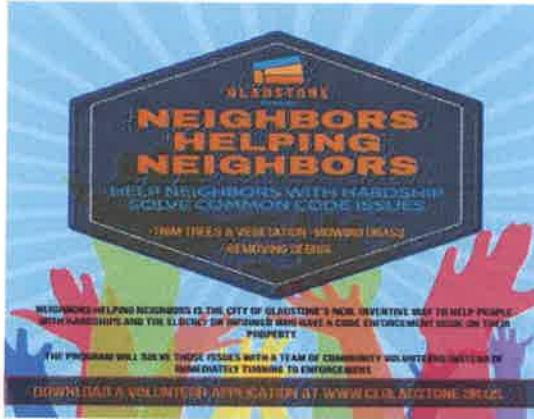

This month GPD Patrol Officers responded to several Code Enforcement related incidents:

- 14 Parking Complaints
- 10 Abandoned Vehicles
- 9 Animal Complaints
- 8 Noise Complaints
- 60 Premise Checks

The patrol officers are assisting Code Enforcement by addressing issues as they come into contact with them.

This month our parking complaints held steady and our abandoned vehicles moved up slightly as officers address those issues. There were more vehicles address throughout the city by our code enforcement officer (See Boyle's Report for more detail).

Our animal complaints held steady with 9 calls. No one was cited for the behavior of their dogs.

Noise complaints are way down as it seems people are getting used to their neighbors being home more often and the fact that the weather is colder, less people are outside. Officers responded to multiple calls resulting from the snow storm and the ice that resulted in large scale blackout of the city.

Officers have added premise checks to their proactive events and this relates to code enforcement as they are checking vacant houses, parks, businesses and other areas that need increased presence.

K9 Nanuk is a four-and-a-half-year-old German Shepherd born in Slovakia. At seven weeks old K9 Nanuk was sold to a man in Germany who started training K9 Nanuk. In Germany in order to breed a dog they must achieve a sport title. In Germany the primary sport is schutzhund. schutzhund training is comprised of three separate parts, they are obedience, tracking, and protection work. You can accomplish three levels of titles from this training. K9 Nanuk was imprinted with the beginning knowledge in schutzhund training however he was sold at a young age and he had not achieved a title. Most working dogs are sold to kennels where police agencies purchase them with some sport dog training up to titled dogs in sport training. The training is then adapted to police work.

### 02/01:

- Officers made 14 traffic stops on this date, in Gladstone, emphasizing the importance of traffic safety in our community.
- Drug case- Traffic stop for suspicion of Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants at River Rd./ McLoughlin Blvd., when vehicle was located stopped at a green light. Over 90 grams of methamphetamine seized. Investigation revealed the vehicle had been reported stolen. Driver was arrested for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, possession and delivery of controlled substances, and felon in possession of a restricted weapon. The passenger was arrested for carrying a concealed weapon.

### 02/02:

- Later in the day, officers conducted traffic enforcement in areas where residents have identified as a need for increased traffic safety—Portland Ave., and River Rd. Several traffic stops were made; some resulting in warnings, and some resulting in citations to the drivers.

### 02/03:

- Officers received a report of a citizen that may be having suicidal thoughts. Officers were able to establish contact with a friend of the citizen and ensure they were connected to the appropriate behavioral health resources.
- Officers made over 20 traffic stops, issuing several warnings as well as some citations. With the poor weather lately, the emphasis on safe driving practices is important. Also, many stops were made for equipment violations. Many times, drivers are unaware that their lights and other equipment are not working which can be dangerous during the rain and hours of darkness.

### 02/05:

- Officers responded to assist the fire department with a CPR call. After on-scene efforts were exhausted and the patient was not able to be resuscitated, Officer conducted a death investigation.
- Late in the day, officers received a report of a sexual assault involving a minor child. Steps were taken to ensure that any possible evidence was preserved. Victim advocates were contacted and connected with the involved family to offer care and support for their physical and emotional well-being. The investigation is on-going.

- A tip was received about a subject wanted on a felony arrest warrant. The night shift officers quickly developed a plan to go to the location where the wanted subject was believed to be located. They were able to safely apprehend the subject, who was transported to the Clackamas County Jail where he was booked and lodged.

### 02/09:

- An officer received a report of a fraud incident where a citizen was attempting to purchase a dog. The suspect that was selling the dog requested additional funds from the buyer for additional goods and services related to the purchase of the dog, but never delivered the dog, or other goods or services. Unfortunately, the suspect was unable to be identified, as all of the transactions were masked by fake online accounts.

### 02/10:

- An adult behavioral health foster home called to report a resident in crisis that was being disruptive to the other residents by yelling and becoming physically aggressive. Several officers responded to the home and de-escalated the situation and coordinated a phone consultation with the resident's behavioral health therapist.

### 02/12:

- This day was filled with chaos as officers chased road hazards and downed power lines around town, trying to ensure the safety of our community. Officers were able to clear many of the hazards on their own, but many of them had to be referred to PGE and Gladstone Public Works, due to lines being caught in the trees and the size of the hazards that were blocking the roads.
- Officers were able to help several residents get home by coordinating with Gladstone Public Works to clear roadway obstructions and snow and ice build-up.
- As a result of the many power outages, officers responded to multiple residential and commercial alarm activations throughout the city. Fortunately, most of the alarm calls were weather related.

### 02/13:

- As the cold weather and power outages affected the entire city, officers responded to many calls requesting welfare checks on residents. Friends and family members from outside the area called, requesting we check on their elderly and vulnerable friends and family that they had not been able to reach.

- Officers received and responded to approximately 30 hazard calls throughout the city, as well as responding to the regular calls for service. It was a very busy day, and was challenging for officers to stay safe and stay warm as they were diligently working to respond to hazards and avoid being struck by falling branches and trees themselves.
- In the evening, two officers responded to assist the Gladstone Fire Department on a medical emergency on W. Clarendon St. Officers assisted with CPR and other life-saving efforts for over thirty minutes before the patient was transported to a local hospital. This call presented many challenges for all responders since there was no power, there was a large accumulation of snow and ice, and fire and emergency response vehicles had delayed response times due to the need to use chains on their vehicles.

### 02/18:

- A sexual assault was reported by an elderly resident. Gladstone Police Department detectives have been briefed and will be conducting follow-up investigation.
- A disturbance with mention of a weapon (gun) involved was reported on Abernethy Ln. Officers were able to respond and de-escalate the situation. Multiple Clackamas County Sheriff's Office deputies also responded to assist.

### 02/20:

- Extra patrols were conducted at Meldrum Bar Park, as well as Max Patterson Park. Both parks were very busy as community members got out to enjoy a small break from the foul weather. There was a significant influx in traffic at Meldrum Bar Park due to the storm debris drop-off taking place. Most motorists seemed to be operating with care.

### 02/25:

- An agitated male subject entered the Kearns Market and was making threatening comments to people inside. Upon the arrival of GPD officers, the subject was gone. Officers were able to conduct interviews and obtain enough information to identify the subject. The subject was trespassed from the market, and was de-escalated by officers. A case was submitted for review by the city prosecutor.

### 02/27:

- Gladstone Police detectives conducting a sex abuse/ rape investigation developed probable cause to arrest a suspect who had not been able to be located for several days. Patrol officers observed the suspect vehicle outside the residence of a family member.

The suspect was safely taken into custody and was interviewed by the case's lead detective. The suspect was lodged in the Clackamas County Jail on multiple felony sex crimes.

### 02-02:

- Officer Lau took a call regarding a suspect violating a stalking order. The suspect has mental health issues and has targeted a Gladstone family by sending them eviction notices and claiming he owns the house. The suspect has no legal interest in the house and was told not to contact them again. It appears that the suspect posted on Facebook a picture of multiple shoe selections along with firearms and stated "Help me choose my war outfit." He listed the Gladstone family and a March 1<sup>st</sup> Eviction notice in the post. The case was forwarded to the DA's office for prosecution consideration.

### 02-08:

- Officers Hutchinson and Graves took a domestic call on Oakridge Drive. There was a report of a female subject out of control and she had jumped on her father's back. When officers arrived there was blood smeared all over a white desk and a chair. It was discovered that the female subject was out of control again and her father tried to control her. When he tried to walk away from her, she jumped on her father's back and pulled him to the floor. When they went down, she hit her nose on his back and got a nose bleed. She then went to his desk and smeared blood all over. The female subject was charged with harassment and taken to JRC where she was lodged.

### 02-09:

- Officers Winters and Olson found a subject lying face down at the entrance to High Rocks Pub. The subject refused to identify himself and became very verbally abusive. He drank a large part of his beer as officers talked with him. He then began flailing around on the ground. The subject claimed to have a gun and was acting erratically, so he was detained. He later vomited up the beer he chugged and then spit in the face of an OCPD officer who came to assist. The subject was arrested for Assaulting a Public Safety Officer and a felony warrant. He was lodged at jail.

### 02-14:

- There was heavy snow and ice all over the metro area. Officers responded to calls for public safety regarding trees down, electricity out and welfare checks regarding the safety of citizens. Officers patrolled businesses and neighborhoods due to alarms not working with electricity being out.

- Officers Hutchinson and Herkamp responded to a suicidal subject who stated she would kill herself if she could not play video games. The electricity had been off for days and there was no end in sight. The female subject was taken into custody on a police hold and transported to the hospital for evaluation.

02-15:

- Officers were kept busy with welfare checks, assist calls and extra patrols through neighborhoods and business districts. Some alarm calls were generated when the power came back on. Most of Gladstone was completely dark and officers were needed to assist with traffic control at intersections on McLoughlin.

02-16:

- At a residence on Fairfield Street, a generator was hooked up due to the power being out for days. They failed to account for the exhaust of the generator and this created a Carbon Monoxide incident. The call came out reporting two deceased people in the basement with 3 other people having been evacuated. Officer Hutchinson arrived and went into the CO2 filled house and located the generator and turned it off. Fire personnel instructed police officers in the house to evacuate as the carbon monoxide levels were dangerously high. The victims in the basement were found by Gladstone Fire and removed from the house. All subjects were taken to the hospital for treatment. It was reported later that two of the subjects had died from carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Due to falling trees and limbs from the ice storm, there were many people out cutting trees and using power equipment to clean up their yards. Olson and Leake were dispatched to a call where a construction company had left a Bobcat type of vehicle with the keys at a home. An individual used the equipment to move a fallen tree off of a neighbor's fence. The owner of the Bobcat wanted to press charges for the use of his equipment without permission. Officer Olson did an investigation and found that the male who used the equipment had been a random guy walking by and did so to help the female who owned the property. No one knew who he was or where he went. No arrest was made in the case.
- Officers continued to do welfare checks and extra patrols throughout the neighborhoods and businesses. Power was beginning to be restored to the city. The lobby at the Civic Center was left open for folks to come in and get warm and charge their cell phones/devices.

### 02-17:

- The snow began to melt and electricity was restored in most of the city. Public Works was out cutting downed logs to open roads again. Officers still conducted many welfare checks, premise checks and extra patrols.

### 02-21:

- Officers Leake, Winters, Hutchinson and Herkamp were dispatched to a domestic on W Clackamas Blvd. Upon arrival, the female was contacted at the home. The male had left before police arrival. The female was very intoxicated and had a bloody nose. She stated that her boyfriend had punched her in the face 5-6 times. The female has reported this before, but it was later found that she fell due to her being intoxicated. A report was taken and PC developed to arrest the male suspect.

### 02-22:

- Officer Lau located the male suspect in the domestic violence assault from the previous day. The male was taken into custody and interviewed. He verified the female's account of what happened and admitted he hit her. The male was arrested and transported to jail.

### 02-23:

- Officers Leake and Winters responded to a domestic call on Risley Ave. The male was reported to have left and the female was reported as still at the location. This assault occurred in front of a 12-year-old child. The investigation verified the female was assaulted by her husband and he had gone to Sandy, Oregon to drop off his little brother at his parents house. The male later came back to Gladstone and he was interviewed and arrested for DV Assault IV Felony. He was lodged at jail.

### 02-24:

- Officer Hutchinson responded to a call on Cason Rd where a known subject with mental health issues keeps calling regarding the imaginary people he is seeing in his house. He reports people in the attic, under the house and in rooms of the house. No one is ever found in the house. Hutchinson wrote an information report and forwarded it to Behavioral Health Unit.

- Winters took a report from a citizen who received a phone call from a person identifying themselves as a CCSO deputy. The suspect told the citizen that she had several warrants for her arrest and if she got \$500 for each warrant he would pay the fines off and her warrants would go away. The citizen was scared so she went to the bank and withdrew \$1000, then drove to a Walmart and got 2 Green Dot cards. The suspect told her to read him the numbers on the back, so she did. He then told her to drive to the Sheriff's Office and he would give her a receipt. She went to the Sheriff's Office but no one knew what she was talking about. That is when she realized she had been scammed.

### 02-28:

- Officers Winters, Leake and Lau responded to assist Gladstone Fire with a call at Kraxberger Middle School. It was reported that some juveniles had set a fire at the school on the bleachers. Fire arrived and found the fire was out. Lau arrived and detained the two juveniles. Winters/Leake arrived and Winters investigated the case. Winters charged the juveniles with Reckless Burning and they were released to their parents. The case will be sent to the Juvenile Department.
- Officer Lau was running traffic around 2300 hrs. in the 1200 block of 82<sup>nd</sup> Drive when a vehicle sped past him at 67 mph in a 35 mph zone. Lau attempted to catch up to the vehicle as he ran the red light over I-205. The subject finally pulled over at 82<sup>nd</sup> and Oatfield. The subject had no license, no insurance and was flagged an armed career criminal. Officer Butler arrived to cover and they ultimately arrested the male for reckless driving and cited him for violations. The vehicle was towed and the male was released at the scene.

The training unit strives to keep all Police Department members updated on legal and training issues. This is no small task considering that to maintain certification as a Police Officer in Oregon you must meet minimum requirements based on required annual or semi-annual training mandates. We also strive to send Officer's to training that may not be required, but relate to a particular Officer's field of expertise or for purposes of career development.
