New Cases of Note

5806 Duniway – Complaint about possible setback violation related to a storage shed on the side of the property. The investigation revealed that setback requirements were implemented in February 2002 and it appeared the structure was in violation of the 5-foot setback requirement. Further research shows the structure was in place as early as 2001. After consulting with planning it

was determined this structure does not have to comply with the setback requirements because it is a pre-existing non-conforming structure.

Complainant also indicated the structure was partially built on her side of the property line. The City of Gladstone does not settle property line disputes and the owner may be entitled to the property under adverse possession laws. Case closed – No violation present, property line dispute is a civil issue between property owners.

This month GPD Patrol Officers responded to several Code Enforcement related incidents:

- 8 Abandoned Vehicles
- 10 Animal
- 1 Noise Complaints
- 17 Parking Complaints
- 37 Premise Checks

The patrol officers are assisting Code Enforcement by addressing issues as they come into contact with them.

This month our parking complaints rose slightly and our abandoned vehicles dropped slightly. There were more vehicles addressed throughout the city by our code enforcement officer (See Boyle's Report for more detail).

Our animal complaints held steady with several bites reported this month. Those owners have been cited for the behavior of their dogs.

Noise complaints were almost nonexistent this month. There has been some warmer weather during the day which has many citizens out and about. However, the nights have been very cold, so not many outside activities have garnered complaints.

Officers have added premise checks to their proactive events and this relates to code enforcement as they are checking vacant houses, parks, businesses and other areas that need increased presence.

K9 Nanuk is a four-and-a-half-year-old German Shepherd born in Slovakia. At seven weeks old K9 Nanuk was sold to a man in Germany who started training K9 Nanuk. In Germany in order to breed a dog they must achieve a sport title. In Germany the primary sport is schutzhund. schutzhund training is comprised of three separate parts, they are obedience, tracking, and protection work. You can accomplish three levels of titles from this training. K9 Nanuk was imprinted with the beginning knowledge in schutzhund training however he was sold at a young age and he had not achieved a title. Most working dogs are sold to kennels where police agencies purchase them with some sport dog training up to titled dogs in sport training. The training is then adapted to police work.

March 6, 2021- Saturday

McDonalds called in a subject passed out in their vehicle in the drive-thru. The subject presented significant signs of intoxication. The subject was arrested and provided a breath sample of more than 3x the legal limit.

March 11, 2021- Thursday

An anonymous caller reported a disturbance at a residence on W Arlington St. When officers arrived they learned the call was only made for the purpose of officers locating and arresting a felony wanted subject. The arrest was made without incident.

March 13, 2021- Saturday

A domestic violence incident was reported at the Budget Inn. The victim was punched in the face and their tooth was knocked out. The suspect had left the scene and was located down the block by officers. The suspect was arrested and lodged at the jail.

Officers were called to assist GFD on a suspicious car fire where a subject was burned inside the car. The subject survived with minor to moderate burns and was transported to the hospital. Officers learned the subject is houseless and living in the car. A propane bottle in the car had been leaking and filled the car with propane. When the subject lit a cigarette the fuel in the car combusted instantly.

March 17, 2021- Wednesday

An officer worked a DUII grant for St. Patrick's Day. A DUII driver was located after being stopped for going 59MPH on McLoughlin Blvd.

March 18, 2021- Thursday

Officers were called to Somerset Assisted living when an unknown subject was seen entering or trying to enter rooms. Officers located the subject who was so heavily under the influence of drugs he thought he was in a homeless shelter in Portland. The subject was arrested and taken to jail.

March 19, 2021- Friday

During a night shift traffic mission on McLoughlin Blvd a DUII driver was arrested.

March 20, 2021- Saturday

A 3-year-old walked out of an apartment and was located by a passing citizen. Officers were able to safely return the child when the mother frantically called 911. Officer were able to determine there was no neglect and gave helpful tips in keeping doors secure from curious kids.

Officers received a call of a subject going through yards on Edgewater Rd. Officers eventually located the subject trespassing on the railroad tracks. The subject refused to stop and a short foot pursuit ensued. The subject crawled under a fence and officers could not follow. A resident in the area called shortly after when the found the subject in their backyard. Officers were able to surround the yard and safely took the subject into custody.

March 31, 2021- Wednesday

A fight was reported in an apartment parking lot on Webster Rd. When officers arrived the victim was located with several injuries and blood running down his leg. The suspect had fled on foot but was located a few blocks away. The suspect also had an outstanding felony weapons warrant.

March 5, 2021- Friday

A citizen called to report the sexual abuse of her daughter that was believed to have occurred approximately one year ago. The victim/ daughter just recently disclosed the incident due to fear of retaliation by the suspect. Gladstone Police Department detectives will investigate.



A dayshift officer responded to assist the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office on a call of several armed individuals possibly trying to access a residence just north of the City of Gladstone. Several subjects were contacted, but the incident was not as originally been reported. Maintaining strong partnerships with our neighboring agencies is critical to the success and safety of our police department as well as that of our partners.

March 6, 2021- Saturday

Officers contacted an impaired driver in the McDonald's drive-through. The driver was arrested for DUII. There have been several recent DUII arrests this month. It is great that GPD officers are partnering with our citizens who are taking the issue of impaired driving seriously and getting these dangerous drivers off the road. Great work!

Later in this shift, officers responded to multiple calls involving people experiencing behavioral health issues. There has been an increase in these types of calls, possibly due to residential placements of mentally ill citizens by social service agencies in our Gladstone hotel/ motel.



March 10, 2021- Wednesday

Officers spent several hours at the range honing their firearms skills. This training as well as scenario-based training is critical as officers are faced with making split-second critical decisions as they serve the citizens of Gladstone- 24/7/365. Whether it is cold, wet, dark, windy, our officers must be ready for any situation.

At about 3 pm, Gladstone Police met with Gladstone Fire Department, where they assisted with their Dive/ Rescue personnel who checked the area of the Meldrum Bar Park boat launch where it was believed a suspect may have discarded an evidence item.



March 12, 2021- Friday

Officers handled a domestic violence investigation that resulted in the arrest of the suspect. The suspect was transported to the Clackamas County Jail where he was booked and lodged.

March 13, 2021- Saturday

Officers responded to assist the Gladstone Fire Department on the report of an explosion. The on-scene investigation revealed that an adult female had been in a vehicle where there was also a propane tank. While smoking in the vehicle, there was an explosion. The woman sustained serious injuries and was transported to a local specialty burn center.

March 17, 2021- Wednesday

Traffic enforcement efforts were focused on McLoughlin Blvd. There are frequently reports of speed violations, distracted and aggressive driving in this area. It is important to focus on traffic safety in these areas as Gladstone residents and visitors attempt to safely enter and exit

McLoughlin Blvd. McLoughlin Blvd. is one of areas where there are frequent crashes; often attributed to driver inattention or poor driver behaviors.

March 18, 2021- Thursday

Officers received multiple reports from our community partner, Oregon Department of Human Services- Child Welfare and conducted child welfare investigations related to those reports.

A suicide threat was reported in the area of E. Dartmouth St. A report was taken, to be referred to local behavioral health workers, to try to get the subject some much-needed help.

A hit and run incident was reported in the parking lot of 24 Hour Fitness on W. Arlington St.. Surveillance video was able to be reviewed, but the identity of the suspect was unable to be determined. There was no viable suspect vehicle information. The victim vehicle was unoccupied and no injuries occurred.

March 19, 2021- Friday

Multiple officers responded to a report of a two-vehicle rollover crash in the area of McLoughlin Blvd, just south of Glen Echo St. Fortunately, nobody was injured, but the incident created quite a traffic control mess for an hour or so. Oregon State Police and Oregon Department of Transportation Incident Response also responded.

The good work of night shift officers resulted in the arrest of an impaired driver in the area of McLoughlin Blvd./ Glen Echo St. Stopping impaired driving is very important to the safety of the Gladstone community. Keep it up!

March 20, 2021- Saturday

Clackamas County Sheriff's Office was in pursuit of a vehicle, southbound on Interstate 205. A dayshift officer attempted to get to the freeway to deploy Stop Sticks, but the fleeing vehicle and pursuing outside agencies had already passed the Gladstone exit. The fleeing suspect(s) were later apprehended by officers/ deputies in the Tigard area.

March 24, 2021- Wednesday

Officers responded to a reported suicide threat on River Rd. The person in crisis was contacted and was determined to not be an imminent threat to themselves or others.

March 25, 2021- Thursday

A violation of restraining order incident was reported and investigated by night shift officers. It was determined that the suspect had fled the location after attempting to forcibly enter the victim's residence. Fortunately, nobody was injured. Officers are attempting to determine the current whereabouts of the adult male suspect.

March 26, 2021- Friday

Several behavioral health/ mental health crisis incidents were reported. Officers responded and provided resource referral information to those experiencing crisis. There has been an influx of these types of calls in the past several weeks. Gladstone Police Department frequently partners with the Clackamas County Behavioral Health Unit in addressing these types of calls, which has been an excellent partnership.

March 27, 2021- Saturday

A citizen reported the theft of a firearm, and ammunition from a vehicle on the southwest portion of Gladstone. Extra patrols were conducted throughout the city of Gladstone in areas where recent thefts and suspicious person/ vehicle reports have been made.

Coming up in April....

April is DISTRACTED DRIVING AWARENESS month. Gladstone Police Department will be partnering with Oregon Impact, conducting additional traffic enforcement. Additional enforcement operations related to pedestrian safety, DUII enforcement, speeding, and seatbelt usage will be happening soon too.

March 1, 2021- Monday

Graves and Hutchinson responded to an abandoned Honda that was parked in the middle of the street at Nottingham Rd/Londonderry Rd. It had a trip permit that was registered to a subject in Oregon City. Officer Graves had the vehicle towed.

About three hours later, Officers responded to a welfare check at a residence on 82nd Drive. A female subject was "out of it" and had fallen down the stairs. The female was acting very erratic and was not making any sense. She was checked out medically and was taken into custody on a Police Officer Hold as she was unable to care for herself. Another vehicle parked in the middle of the road was towed. It was owned by the female subject, who was also the owner of the towed vehicle on Nottingham.

March 2, 2021- Tuesday

Officer Winters/Leake and Officer Olson responded to a suicidal call. The subject is well known to GPD. She was not suicidal but she did want help to go to treatment. She was willing to confess to some crimes so the judge would order her to alcohol treatment. Officers made sure she was safe and cleared the call when her two friends arrived.

March 3, 2021- Wednesday

Officer Hutchinson investigated a report from an adult daughter that she overheard her father on the phone with what sounded like an underage girl and requesting sexually explicit photos. The daughter came to police. She agreed to help police with a pre-text phone call. The phone call was set up and conducted by Sergeant Leake/Winters. The male said he did not remember such a call. There was no way of finding out who the supposed underage girl might have been so the case was suspended.

March 7, 2021- Sunday

Officer Winters/Leake took a report from the parents of a 17-year-old male who was reporting that he had been sexually assaulted by a family member about a year and half ago. Officer Winters conducted a thorough investigation and sent to detectives for follow up.

March 8, 2021- Monday

Officer Butler made a traffic stop about 4:45am for a vehicle traveling 35 mph on Portland Ave in the 20 mph zone. The female driver was on probation. Officer Butler detained her, as she was out of compliance with her probation conditions. Officer Butler and Officer Hutchinson

continued the investigation and found the vehicle she was driving was stolen out of Oregon City. OCPD was called and the vehicle was recovered.

Officer Winters/Leake were dispatched to the report of 4 juveniles tagging the pillars of the old bridge in High Rocks Park. Officer Winters/Leake caught them in the act of spray painting the pillar. The juveniles thought they could spray paint on this pillar. All were identified and the case was forwarded to the Juvenile Department.

Officer Winters/Leake and Officer Lau responded to a domestic fight between a male and female where it was reported the female had tried to drown the male near the boat ramp at Meldrum Bar Park. Officers arrived and the two were still in a physical altercation. They were pulled apart and the male was immediately compliant. The female was confrontational and would not do as instructed by police. She kicked Officer Lau and was put in handcuffs. The male was found to have a dozen or so deep bites and scratches. He reported the female tried to choke him and hold him underwater. The male was given medical treatment and the female was taken to jail. She was charged with Attempt Assault I, DV Menacing, Resisting Arrest and Assault on a Public Safety Officer.

March 15, 2021- Monday

Officer Hutchinson took a report of a stolen vehicle. The owner had started it to let the ice melt from it and left it running unattended for about 5 minutes. When she went out to get in, the vehicle was gone. As of 03-22-2021, the vehicle has yet to be recovered. This is a good lesson in securing your vehicle if it is running unattended.

Officer Graves and Officer Hutchinson responded to a criminal mischief in progress at the Mattress Warehouse. A male was throwing rocks at the building and swinging around a metal bar. The subject was found and complied with officers' commands to drop his metal bar but would not identify himself. He cursed repeatedly at the officers and asked for a supervisor. Lt. Gerkman arrived and the suspect threatened to sue the department but still would not identify himself. The subject was charged with Unlawful use of a weapon, Criminal Mischief II and Theft II.

March 16, 2021- Tuesday

Officer Hutchinson and Officer Graves responded to a report of a subject who had entered a home on Edgewater Rd through an unlocked door. The owner was home at the time and asked

March 22, 2021- Thursday

Officer Lau and Sgt Leake were dispatched to Top Notch Laundry on a drug/vice call where it was reported that a male and female were smoking meth in a car. Officers arrived and found the couple and a 10-month old baby in the car. All three occupants were listed as missing persons out of Idaho. The male occupant gave Officer Lau a baggie of meth, it weighed in at 2.8 grams, a misdemeanor in Oregon. The female said they came from Idaho because meth had been decriminalized. They did not realize they were endangering their child. The child was taken into protective custody and given to DHS for placement. The male was cited for Endangering the Welfare of a Minor-Criminal Mistreatment. This could become a more common occurrence due to Measure 110.

Officer Winters/Leake, Officer Day and Officer Lau responded to a domestic disturbance call at the Brookside Apts. The male had several large scratches and welts on his torso and neck. The female was uncooperative. She began using racial slurs against officers. She was lodged at jail for Domestic Violence Assault IV.

March 23, 2021- Friday

Officer Winters/Leake and Officer Day were dispatched to a male who tried to open the front door at a residence on E Arlington. The male was then reported as being passed out on the ground. Officers arrived with medical and found the male had a large hunting knife in his pocket. The knife was removed and the male was shaken awake. The male was very intoxicated and thought he was in Colorado, thought it was May 2020 and could not spell his name. On a safety pat down a large can of bear mace was found in his coat pocket. He was found to not be able to care for himself and AMR decided he needed to be transported to the hospital.

This is no small task considering that to maintain certification as a Police Officer in Oregon you must meet minimum requirements based on required annual or semi-annual training mandates. We also strive to send Officer's to training that may not be required, but relate to a particular Officer's field of expertise or for purposes of career development.

All uniformed personnel completed three hours of firearms training with their primary handgun, off-duty handgun, and patrol rifles.

Officers Butler and Orr attended a 6 hour online class for Online Investigations taught by the Portland FBI office. The training confirmed GPD is on track with our current investigations and they were provided resources for the uncommon but complex investigations.

Officer Winters continues in his field training. With the assistance of CCSO, Officer Winters was put through two hours of in-person simulation training.

Half of the department completed a two hour training with Safety Compass, a human trafficking organization. The other half of the department attended the training in February and GPD is now the only agency in the metro area to have every officer attend this training.

All Sworn members also completed an hour of Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) training. The training is in appropriate handling of persons in custody.
