## CHIEF'S REPORT

March 2022

Greetings,

As you will see throughout this report, your police officers have been busy providing the necessary services to ensure safety and security of our community. The good work conducted by members of the police department is very much appreciated by me and I am sure you. The Police Department is currently training two new police officers and one reported to the academy this month where he will train for 16 weeks. The second officer will depart for the academy in May to complete his 16 weeks of training as required by the State of Oregon. We are looking forward to these officers returning to Gladstone at the completion of their academy training.

Police Administration has been working steadily establishing processes and protocols to include but not limited to internal operations, traffic safety, critical incidents and county wide protocols involving criminal investigations and domestic/family violence. "Preparedness" is an area the City of Gladstone continues to focus on to support the overall safety of the community. I have been working with Chief Huffman, Gladstone Fire Department and Tiffany Kirkpatrick, Community Services Manager along with GEMS (Gladstone Emergency Management Support) on developing a Resource Center. The Resource Center is intended to provide community members information and support information during critical incidents. Examples of the types of incidents include; Ice Storms, Wild Fires, or even a water boil requirement.

GEMS is a volunteer work group made up of community members having the sole purpose of supporting the city during critical incidents. Training and protocol development for the Resource Center will Occur during the month of April. Our hope is at the conclusion of the training; the city can open the center within the first 24 hours of an incident if needed. Based on our experiences over the last three years, we believe the center will be a great resource for our community.

Have a safe and enjoyable month of April and enjoy the rest of the report.

K9 Nanuk is a five-year-old German Shepherd born in Slovakia. At seven weeks old K9 Nanuk was sold to a man in Germany who started training K9 Nanuk. In Germany in order to breed a dog they must achieve a sport title. In Germany the primary sport is schutzhund. schutzhund training is comprised of three separate parts, they are obedience, tracking, and protection work. You can accomplish three levels of titles from this training. K9 Nanuk was imprinted with the beginning knowledge in schutzhund training however he was sold at a young age and he had not achieved a title. Most working dogs are sold to kennels where police agencies purchase them with some sport dog training up to titled dogs in sport training. The training is then adapted to police work.

### March 1, 2022- Tuesday

An officer received a report of a child welfare investigation, which was completed. Gladstone Police Department officers will often receive and investigate child welfare incidents that are reported to us. Pursuant to Oregon law, many entities are required to cross-report to law enforcement and Oregon Department of Human Services- Child Welfare when there is suspicion of child abuse or neglect. Often times these reports do not rise to the level of a crime being committed, but sometimes result in community stakeholders getting involved to help families with concerns they may be experiencing, related to parenting and appropriate care of their children.

Report child abuse or neglect by calling any law enforcement agency in Oregon, or by contacting the Oregon Child Abuse Hotline at 1-855-503-SAFE (7233).

Officers responded to a domestic disturbance in the 400 block of E. Clarendon St. The primary aggressor was identified during the on-scene investigation, and was arrested and transported to the Clackamas County Jail, where they were booked and lodged.



### March 2, 2022- Wednesday

A retail business on McLoughlin Blvd. reported a theft of merchandise. Officers responded to the area and were able to locate and arrest the suspect who was subsequently transported to the Clackamas County Jail where they were booked and lodged.



### March 3, 2022- Thursday

Officers made traffic stops throughout Gladstone for multiple different violations. We would like to ask all motorists and pedestrians to use caution. As we all get in the full swing of spring, we will be seeing a lot more activity outside. Pay attention to crosswalks, school zones, and your speeds. When it is sunny and dry, it is easy to inadvertently speed up. A majority of Gladstone's streets are residential with 25 mile-per-hour speed limits. Safety first!

Due to possible injuries related to the crash, the suspect/ driver was transported to a local hospital for diagnosis and treatment.



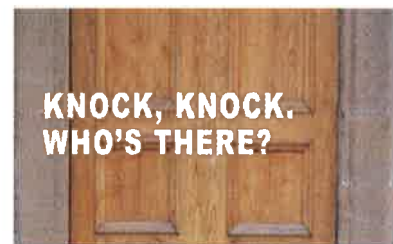
Traffic safety is important to all of us. We are always trying to educate motorists about the importance of safe travel. Sometimes this education is done by written or verbal warnings, and sometimes it is done by issuance of citations.

### March 9, 2022- Wednesday

Clackamas County Communications (Dispatch) received a report of a subject acting erratically, wielding a hatchet in the area of Caldwell St., east of Portland Ave. Officers responded to the area and were able to de-escalate the situation and get the subject connected with behavioral health professionals for a mental health assessment.

### March 10, 2022- Thursday

With the assistance of the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Special Weapons and Tactics Team, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Crisis Negotiations Team, Gladstone Police Department officers and detectives served a search warrant at a residence in the 200 block of W. Arlington St. The search warrant was safely served and evidence that had been identified as stolen property was recovered. This collaborative, team effort went very well. Great job by everyone that helped out!



### March 15, 2022- Tuesday

There have been several recent reports of thefts occurring from vehicles and lockers at a business located on W. Arlington St. Officers are working with the business to advise customers of the increase in thefts. Officers have been conducting extra patrols in the area. It's a good reminder to not store items of value in your vehicle, and when using lockers. Consider using lockers in areas with surveillance cameras rather than in locker room areas where surveillance cameras are not present.

Gladstone Police Department took delivery of a new patrol/ traffic enforcement vehicle, which will be put in service within a few days.



### March 30, 2022- Wednesday

Gladstone Police Department is welcoming new employee Elias Zamora to the team. Elias will be starting next week and will be working part-time as a Property/ Evidence Technician. This is a very important position within the Gladstone Police Department. The Property & Evidence Technician receives, inventories, controls and disposes of property and evidence seized by officers; maintains records of all evidence; transports evidence to crime labs; presents evidence to defense attorneys, crime victims, suspects and investigators upon authorization from the appropriate authority.

### March 31, 2022- Thursday

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Distracted driving is one of the fastest growing safety issues on the roads today. Distracted drivers aren't just a threat to themselves; they are a danger to everyone else on the road. The national distracted driving effort focuses on ways to change the behavior of drivers through legislation, enforcement, public awareness, and education. In April, Gladstone Police Department officers will be paying close attention, looking for those drivers that are jeopardizing their own safety and the safety of others by driving distracted.

3/2 Walgreens called to report a subject had filled a cooler with hand sanitizer and soap and fled the store with the cooler in a stroller. The subject was located under the 99E bridge. It was not clear why the subject stole so much hand sanitizer. He had several outstanding warrants and was taken to jail.

3/3 A subject was acting strange at the Chevron and was trying to get into the office. The subject initially hid from officers when they first arrived but came back later. The subject was eventually located by police and trespassed.

3/5 A citizen called in after seeing a group of teens carrying around a handgun behind the high school. Officers safely investigated and the handgun turned out to be a BB gun but had the appearance of a real gun. One teen was found to be illegally carrying a switch blade.

Officers working night shift stopped a car and the driver appeared intoxicated. The driver was visibly intoxicated but refused to do Field Sobriety Tests and refused to provide a breath sample. The arresting officer applied for a search warrant which was granted. A sample of the driver's blood was taken to be analyzed later.

3/17 A group of kids was reported to be threatening to shoot other kids in Max Patterson park with a BB gun and had been shooting it in the park but had not hit anyone. Officers located the kids a few hours later. The BB gun turned out to be an Orbeez Gel Ball Blaster. This is a toy that shoots gel/water balls. Even though using the toy is not a violation of park rules the kids were talked to about what the optics were of their actions. They were also told they cannot shoot other people with the gel/water balls unless it is agreed upon. The kids apologized for their behavior and said they were going to stay out of the park for a while.

3/18 A vehicle was stopped for several traffic violations. A dealer license plate was located in the back window but there was no clear reason for it being there. Contact was made at the dealership and it turned out to have been stolen over a year ago. The plate was seized and returned to the dealership.

3/26 An officer stopped a car for crossing the double yellow line on McLoughlin Blvd. The driver was visibly intoxicated and unable to safely perform Field Sobriety Tests. The subject did provide a breath sample of .25% blood alcohol content level, over 3x the legal limit!

Another drunk driver was stopped on this day. The driver's BAC was .56%, 7x the legal limit!

### 03-01-22

Officers assisted OSP with an injury traffic crash. A vehicle hit the bridge abutment on 99E at the Gladstone/Oregon City Bridge. Several citizens stopped to help but Fire was needed to extricate the severely injured driver.

Officers responded to a domestic violence call at a residence on Clarendon St. It was reported that an adult male had attacked his father in their home. The victim had a gaping head wound, made by metal knuckles. The case went to Grand Jury a week later and the suspect was indicted for felony assault.

### 03-02-22

While an Officer was working a traffic grant detail, he stopped a subject using a cell phone while driving. The driver had two previous convictions for cell phone use while driving. In Oregon, with two prior convictions, the third incident is a crime. The driver was cited and released for the offense.

### 03-15-22

Officers responded to a report of a vehicle stuck in the water on the bar at Meldrum Bar Park. There was a person in the river. The person was attempting to swim to shore but due to the cold water and cold temperatures, he was starting to fail. An Officer directed the male to a pole sticking out of the water. The male made it to the pole and held on until water rescue units arrived. The male was rescued and transported to the hospital.

### 03-28-22

Officers responded to a male lighting his clothing on fire. He was yelling and causing alarm to businesses in the area. Officers located the subject under the Hwy 99 Bridge burning his coat. The subject had a warrant for Arson II from Washington County. He was arrested on the warrant and charged with Disorderly Conduct II for his actions in Gladstone.

The School Resource Program (SRO) is a valuable partnership between the Gladstone School District and the Gladstone Police Department. The SRO investigates incidents which occur on the properties of all schools within Gladstone city limits (Kraxberger Middle School, John Wetten Elementary School, Gladstone High School), as well as the Administrative offices for the district.

The SRO concentrates on the schools and is an “on-site” officer at all schools in the Gladstone School District. This allows a regular patrol officer to focus on the rest of the city. Officer Graves is currently in this assignment. He deals with a wide range of issues, such as attendance, assaults, child abuse, thefts and gangs. He also conducts interventions, gives presentations to faculty and students, and meets with parents about issues.
