Bias Crimes and Incidents. The definition of a Bias crime can be found in the Oregon Revised Statutes at:

166.155 (Bias Crime in the second degree)

166.165 (Bias Crime in the first degree)

- We had one event classified as a Bias Crime. Victim had small “pride flags” in the ground outside her business. The flags were pulled out and thrown on the ground. (Substantial inconvenience to the victim.) The victim believed she was targeted due to a protected class.
- This event was classified as a Bias Incident. Stickers that had an anti-transgender theme to them were placed on utility signs and poles in the area of and on the grounds of the high school. While that is a crime (Criminal Mischief III), no specific person was targeted or identified as a victim. A subject of interest was identified but no witnesses were located. The person of interest was interviewed and denied knowledge. That person was trespassed from the high school over an unrelated incident.

The “victim” of the criminal mischief was the school district and they were responsible for removing the stickers.

- The owner of a business on Portland Ave had a “BLM” sign stolen from the business. The theft was captured on video but the suspect was wearing a mask and could not be identified. The victim of the theft alleged that they believed they were a victim due to words being exchanged (a disagreement) on social media and not because of any protected class. The victim named a possible person of interest. That person was interviewed and denied any knowledge of the crime. The suspect captured on the video appeared to be a male.

While the video was a quality video, the suspect could not be identified and a license plate of the associated vehicle was not captured. The case is suspended pending suspect information being developed.

This month GPD Patrol Officers responded to several Code Enforcement related incidents:

The patrol officers are assisting Code Enforcement by addressing issues as they come into contact with them.

We had several parking complaints this month. Changes have been made to the citizen annual pass for Meldrum Bar Park. Officers are still helping folks understand the system.

We had 7 abandoned vehicles this month that patrol took care of. Officers are finding many vehicles left parked in places over the 72-hour allotted time period. Occasionally the vehicles are left after the owner has moved. There were more vehicles addressed throughout the city by our code enforcement officer (See Boyle's Report for more detail).

We had several noise complaints this month partly due to several parties and functions. Happy's Bar and Grill had a live band. Two or three private citizens had big parties and the high school had an outside Homecoming Dance at John Wetten.

K9 Nanuk is a five year-old German Shepherd born in Slovakia. At seven weeks old K9 Nanuk was sold to a man in Germany who started training K9 Nanuk. In Germany in order to breed a dog they must achieve a sport title. In Germany the primary sport is schutzhund. schutzhund training is comprised of three separate parts, they are obedience, tracking, and protection work. You can accomplish three levels of titles from this training. K9 Nanuk was imprinted with the beginning knowledge in schutzhund training however he was sold at a young age and he had not achieved a title. Most working dogs are sold to kennels where police agencies purchase them with some sport dog training up to titled dogs in sport training. The training is then adapted to police work.

## **OPERATIONS MONTHLY REPORT**

10/1 A trespass was reported near 82<sup>nd</sup> Dr and I-205. A homeless person was contacted on public property and pointed in the direction of services. The remains of an unreported fire were discovered adjacent to the freeway. After some checking the fire was put out overnight by the FD but no one was seen in the area. Additional checks of the area were made.

10/6 A passerby reported a suspicious UTV (side-by-side) parked in the bushes near the OC Gladstone Bridge next to the sidewalk (99E). Officers investigated and suspected the vehicle was stolen as a known homeless person was with it and they did not have it the day before. While officers worked to investigate, the owner drove by the location and stopped to identify the UTV and confirm he was the owner. The owner did not think the UTV ran and did not know how it could be taken. The homeless person admitted to the theft and was taken to jail.

10/22 A subject was reported to be holding a 4-year-old over the edge of the river at High Rocks Park and the child was fighting to hold on. Officers arrived to find a father fishing with his daughter strapped into a harness on his chest. The child was smiling and having a great day hanging out with dad.

10/27 GPD participated in the Domestic Violence Warrant Apprehension detail. We staffed a two-man patrol car for the detail. They were able to locate and arrest three subjects with outstanding warrants.

10/28 A burglary was reported at a residence on Arlington St. The homeowner located a subject who had broken into their garage and then into their car. The suspect fled the scene. GPD responded and coordinated a response to the in progress crime. With the assistance of OCPD and CCSO the suspect was tracked and OCPD located the suspect under the Oregon City side of the I-205 bridge. The subject was lodged in jail on several charges.

Officers handed out candy at the Rotary Halloween event.

### 10/03/2021- Sunday

Officers responded to a report of a subject in the 200 block of W. Exeter St. that had made concerning statements about possibly wanting to commit suicide. Officers contacted the subject and a family member and established a safety plan and provided resource information. The subject agreed to call the crisis line, but said that he was okay and did not have any intention of harming himself.

### 10/06/2021- Wednesday

Officers were dispatched to a CPR/ Assist Fire Department call on Webster Rd. Upon arrival, CPR was being performed, and officers assisted the fire department and emergency medical personnel. EMS personnel administered Naloxone and a few minutes later the subject regained consciousness. The overdose patient admitted ingesting oxycodone prior to the incident. The patient was transported to a local hospital for advanced diagnosis and treatment.

### 10/11/2021- Monday

The RADAR trailer was moved to Abernethy Ln., near Barclay St. There have been complaints of speeding vehicles in this area. Officers will be focusing on speed enforcement in the areas in Gladstone that receive the most complaints.

### 10/13/2021- Wednesday

The RADAR trailer was moved to E. Hereford St./ Columbia Ave., which is another area that receives frequent complaints of speeding vehicles.

Officers responded to assist the Gladstone Fire Department/ American Medical Response on a medical call on Edgewater Rd. where they suspected the patient may be the victim of domestic violence. A thorough investigation indicated that the patient had sustained physical injury and the perpetrator was believed to be the victim's spouse. Officers were able to determine the location of the suspect who had fled and that was not at the residence at the time of the initial investigation. The suspect was transported to the Clackamas County Jail where they were booked and lodged.

### 10/17/2021- Sunday

Gladstone Police Department officers have been seeing a rise in the amount of vehicles being stolen from locations within Gladstone. Officers are also experiencing an influx of incidents where stolen vehicles from other jurisdictions are being located/ recovered in Gladstone.

### 10/18/2021- Monday

A vehicle was stolen from a car dealership on McLoughlin Blvd. At the time of the theft, the vehicle was left running in the dealership parking lot while the employee quickly tended to another issue. The suspect fled northbound on McLoughlin Blvd. in the vehicle. Police units in Portland attempted to stop the vehicle, but the driver fled. Police units disengaged and did not pursue the vehicle. The stolen vehicle remained outstanding. No suspect information was known.

### 10/19/2021- Tuesday

An officer located a stolen vehicle in the area of E. Exeter St./ Yale Ave. The vehicle had been reported as a stolen vehicle in Portland, but was apparently dumped at this location. The victim was initially unable to be contacted. The vehicle was impounded, for safekeeping and was later claimed by the registered owner.

### 10/25/2021- Monday

A stolen vehicle (Honda Civic) was located/ recovered on Ridge Dr., near Cason Rd. The vehicle had been stolen in the Clackamas area approximately two hours prior to being located in Gladstone. No suspect or witness information was known.

### 10/26/2021- Tuesday

An officer received an anonymous report of a domestic violence incident where the victim was assaulted, strangled and raped while in the presence of their children. The known suspect fled the area. Officers are seeking the suspect, for interview/ arrest, and the case has been referred to the Gladstone Police Department Investigations Unit for follow-up.

10-01-21

Officers worked a security detail for an anti-hate rally on Portland Avenue. This was much like the previous rallies except there was no counter demonstration in the city. Everything was very peaceful and our citizens enjoyed being able to rally together.

10-06-21

Officers responded to a CPR request on Webster Rd. Medical was already on scene when officers arrived. A 33-year-old male was unconscious and not breathing when medical arrived. They began to work on the male and were able to get a pulse. Medical administered Narcan and the male immediately began breathing on his own and minutes later, was conscious again.

10-08-21

Officers responded to a neighbor issue. The apartment owner called and reported one of her neighbors had a gun on his hip and pulled up his shirt to expose the gun, while telling his neighbor that he could shoot him at any time. The threatened neighbor did not feel this was a threat because he knows his neighbor has mental health issues. The neighbor who made the threats was not at home when police arrived. Family was contacted and they agreed to come remove firearms from his home and get him into some assisted living arrangement. It was determined no crime was committed but an information report was written.

10-13-21

Officers had a death investigation on Risley Ave where the male had not been seen or heard from in several days. A friend entered the apartment and found the male deceased. There was no sign of foul play and the death looked natural.

10-14-21

Officers took a stolen vehicle report from a residence on Webster Rd. The vehicle was a 1991 Honda Civic that had been stolen when the owner came home for lunch. There was no suspect info on this case.

10-15-21

Officers and outside agency police responded to a reported armed robbery at the Texaco Station on McLoughlin. The report was of a male juvenile who made threats to hurt the clerk if he did not hand over the money. The clerk gave the money and then the suspect ran away on

foot. Several officers responded to the area and set up containment. A K9 was called from Lake Oswego to track the suspect but due to current case law of the suspect being a juvenile, the K9 was not deployed. The suspect fit the description of a male who had been doing the same type of robberies over in Clackamas/Happy Valley near Clackamas Town Center on 82<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. This investigation is ongoing.

Our Reserve Officer responded to the report of a theft from a vehicle at Swickard Honda. While customers looked at a new vehicle, their own vehicle was broken into and property stolen. There was no video on that side of the building so there was no suspect info.

10-21-21

Civil deputies from Clackamas County did a lock out and eviction at a house on E Clackamas Blvd. This particular house has been a problem house for several years and the owner finally was able to secure an eviction for the many residents that lived in the house, shed, campers and trailers illegally parked on her property. The house will be remodeled and sold.

10-29-21

Gladstone High School had their homecoming game tonight and won 15-6 over Madras. After the game, a Homecoming Dance was held at John Wetten outside on the basketball courts. The event was very successful.

The SRO investigates incidents which occur on the properties of all schools within Gladstone city limits (Kraxberger Middle School, John Wetten Elementary School, Gladstone High School), as well as the Administrative offices for the district.

The SRO concentrates on the schools and is an “on-site” officer at all schools in the Gladstone School District. This allows a regular patrol officer to focus on the rest of the city. Officer Graves is currently in this assignment. He deals with a wide range of issues, such as attendance, assaults, child abuse, thefts and gangs. He also conducts interventions, gives presentations to faculty and students, and meets with parents about issues.

There were several criminal investigations that involved GHS students. Some of the incidents occurred off of school property but involved GHS students. One such investigations was a bias crime of criminal mischief for removal of Pride flags at a local business by a high school student.

A parent was trespassed from all Gladstone School District property for an email that contained vague threats in relation to a vaccine event at the school. The parent was contacted and given a verbal trespass warning and the district followed up with a letter.

Anti-transgender stickers were found on several poles on Harvard Ave behind the school. There were no suspects located, but it was thought they were placed there by the same parent that was trespassed from the property. When asked about the stickers, they denied having anything to do with the stickers. There have been no new incidents.
