Clackamas County Public Alerts

Clackamas County has upgraded how it communicates with residents during times of disaster by replacing its emergency notification software system. All residents are urged to enroll, or re enroll, at www.clackamas.us/publicalerts.

By providing contact information, county residents can receive critical emergency messaging via email, phone call, and text during times of disasters. Important messages that could be relayed include notices to evacuate, shelter-in-place, shelter locations, etc. Residents enrolled in the previous system – the Clackamas County Emergency Notification System, or CCENS – must re-enroll themselves in the new system in order to receive future messages. #### Chief's Corner- Kim Yamashita

This is my first installment of the Chief's Corner. I "get to know you" and provide you with some safety tips too!

I started in Gladstone as the Interim Police Chief January 1, 2019. I will be holding down the fort until a new permanent chief is hired. I anticipate being here through June of 2019. I started my law enforcement career in 1993. I was Chief of Police for the City of Sandy for 7 years and come to you with a varied set of skills and experience that I am sure will serve Gladstone well.

I am thankful for the opportunity to serve the City of Gladstone. Even though this is a temporary assignment, make no mistake. I fully intend to be a participatory, involved Chief and will do my best to meet the community's needs.

I have spent my first month, evaluating current programs, staffing and policies. I have also been responding to calls for service, attending meetings with the community and getting to know you.

Know where your children are. Have your children tell you or ask permission before leaving the house and give them a time to check in or be home. When possible, have them leave a phone neighbors and their children so you can look out for one another.

Help children learn important phone numbers. Have your thought I would share a little bit about myself as a children practice reciting their home phone number and address, and your work and cell phone numbers. If they have trouble memorizing these, write them down on a card and have them carry it at all times. Tell your children where you will be and the best way to reach you.

> Set limits on where your children can go in your neighborhood. Do you want them crossing busy roads? Playing in alleys or abandoned buildings? Are there certain homes in your neighborhood that you don't want your children to go to?

> Get to know your children's friends. Meet their parents before letting your children to go to their home and keep a list of their phone numbers. If you can't meet their parents, call and talk to them. Ask what your children might do at their house and if they will be supervised.

> Choose a safe house in your neighborhood. Pick a neighbor's house where your children can go if they need help. Point out other places they can go for help, like stores, libraries, and police stations.

> • Teach children to settle arguments with words, not fists. Role-play talking out problems, walking away from fist fights, taunting and teasing can hurt friends and make enemies.

> Work together with your neighbors. Watch out for suspicious and unusual behavior in your neighborhood. Get to know your

#### Sidewalks and Clear Vision

A couple of residents recently expressed concern about sidewalks and clear vision. The Gladstone Municipal Code states that property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks abutting their property and are liable to any person suffering injury due to a defective sidewalk.

The City's general standard for sidewalk maintenance states "not to exceed 1/2" vertical lift." This is similar to property owners being responsible for maintaining landscaping for clear vision of motorists at street intersections. Both the property owner and the City can be held liable for accidents when they are notified but fail to remove clear vision obstructions. Please check the condition of sidewalks along your property and check for adequate clear vision if your property is located at a street intersection.

#### Hanging Tree Branches

Public Works is asking residents to trim tree branches by cutting branches seven feet (7') above sidewalks and fourteen feet (14') above streets. Please cut your branches and place them in your yard debris cart. If Public Works determines there is a risk of damage or injury, they may cut your tree branches without notice. During winter months, please remove portable basketball hoops from city streets to reduce interference with street sweeping.

As a longtime member of Gladstone Fire Department it is an honor to serve the citizens of Gladstone. I truly enjoy teaching and talking with you and your children about fire safety and all that your firefighters do to keep you safe from fire. In addition to fire incidents, our firefighters also respond to about three or more medical emergencies each day with state certified, Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's).

Remember: Dial 911 for all emergencies! Do not call the fire station directly, as crews may be out on another emergency and will not be present to answer the station phone.

#### Neighbor Law

The City receives requests from residents about settling issues between neighbors that the City does not regulate. These issues include requests to: place trash and recycling cans out of public view to help maintain neighborhood livability, to not feed stray cats that may attract unwanted pets to a neighbor's yard or place of business, to trim overhanging tree limbs; locate property lines, move fences, etc. Many of these legal issues were settled years ago and resolution of current issues between neighbors are now typically settled by mediation instead of being litigated in court. 


