at warp speed! The first step was to look at the 2018-2022 Strategic Plan, which can be found on the city's website. Out of 32 objectives, ranging from Downtown Revitalization, to employee recognition and our civic buildings, we completed almost everything! The only holes were our communications strategy, which will always be a fluid work-in-progress; researching the feasibility of a Gladstone Fiber Network, which we have removed from our strategic plan because it just doesn't make sense; revising our employee performance evaluation and handbook, which staff will be addressing in the next strategic plan; and looking into annexation strategies.

So, what is the state of Gladstone? Busy, busy and busy. Our staff are all wearing multiple hats and putting in a lot of blood sweat and tears to implement and move forward all of the great projects we have on our plate. As I've said many times, I think we are still absorbing the reality of how far behind we have been in so many ways. But, instead of kicking things further down the road, we are tackling them head on.

A few of our major projects are: Our Water, Stormwater, Sewer, Parks and Transportation Master Plans are in place. We are thoughtfully approaching the capital improvement projects identified, and looking at efficiencies. Our incredible staff is looking at the big picture, and checking off the low hanging fruit when we think it may help mitigate the larger projects. We've invested in equipment desperately needed to keep our systems working the best way they can. If you have any questions about the urgency of the infrastructure improvements, Public Works Director Jim Whynot submits a very colorful report every month to city council showing just how bad it is!

We entered into an agreement with the county to end the library lawsuit. We are now partnering on a two-library solution, being built and managed by the county, that is truly a win-win for everybody in our district. Holding a library hostage is a ridiculous way to enrich and support our communities! The new Gladstone library will be located on the corner of Portland Avenue and Dartmouth, where our City Hall and Police Station currently sit. It will be the centerpiece of our main street. The library project will start as soon as the Civic Center is done.

We have broken ground on our new Civic Center, which is our combined City Hall - Police Station located next to Public Works on Portland Avenue. The thought and design put into this project have been inspiring, and I hope you all have had the opportunity to look at the conceptual drawings and floor plans. This building will be the

made me realize that we have actually been working redevelopment plan. We are now working with a consultant to strategize how we can encourage developers to invest in our core.

> The replacement of the Trolley Bridge connecting Gladstone and Oregon City is now in the feasibility study phase. The contract has been awarded and we are off and running. This is such a great project for our region connecting us in wonderful ways!

> Our Police Dept. is running smoothly, though in a holding pattern while we look for a new Police Chief. Kim Yamashita has graciously agreed to step in and manage the department while we go through the recruiting process. Our K9 program is in place, and we are looking into codes and ordinances that have been a little vague. It amazes me how passionate people get over something! I had no idea the type of concerns people would have.

> The very first time I participated in a State of the Cities event was with our Fire Department. My question from the audience was about the rating of our fire department and how it negatively affected their business property insurance. I am so pleased to report that since that time, our department has done a 180! We are now a 24/7 staffed fire department with shifts lead by full time captains. We have a strategic plan and a standard of coverage that rivals anyone's in the region! We have expanded our technical training to include not only dive rescue, but added swift water and rope rescue which makes sense since we are surrounded by rivers. In answer to that very first question, our insurance rating is evaluated every 10 years, we are mid cycle now. When it is completed, I'm confident our rating will significantly improve and a cost savings will be realized. We are also in the process of recruiting for a new Fire Chief. Thank you to Jeff Smith for stepping up and helping with the transition.

> Our food pantry is up and running! It closed temporarily last summer, but with the help of some guerilla volunteers, we were able to open it again. We are looking for a solid funding source to help pay for a part time coordinator, in the amount of approximately \$25,000 per year. The food pantry is so critical to our county! We are a regional resource, serving people from all over the metro area. The pantry doesn't just feed the people, for many it's a personal connection they don't get anywhere else. I'm so proud to be a volunteer and encourage others to help in any way they can.

> Gladstone is still that small town, with the police officers that wave when they drive by and the community celebrations and high school football games that everyone turns out for! We don't want to lose that, it's who we are. All of these amazing projects will only strengthen our community, and support the needs of our people. Stay tuned there is a lot more to come!

Questions About Comcast Internet Access Fee Franchise Fee?

The City of Gladstone imposed a right-of-way usage fee upon Comcast and all telecommunication companies using the right of way. This fee was enacted in 2016. The City does not require that Comcast, or any telecommunications company pass this, or any other cost of doing business fee, to the consumer. Nor does the City of Gladstone require Comcast to itemize their costs on consumer invoices. Many companies absorb the costs of doing business such as, taxes, capital, electricity, rent of storefronts, employee salaries, etc., as a cost of doing business. Upcoming Planning Commission Meeting

At the March 19, 2019 Meeting, the Planning Commission will be discussing Design Review for construction of the new City of Gladstone Civic Center at 18505 Portland Avenue, to include a one-story 22,177 sq. ft. building and associated site improvements such as landscaping, parking and site drainage. A Variance land use application is also proposed to allow for reduced landscaping strip widths along Duniway Avenue and new 4 unit office building, twostory 9,940 sq. ft. on currently vacant land, on E. scam-alert-network/ On the website you will find the ability to sign up for the network, report scams and frauds, and even request free fraud prevention training.

Oregon Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum has a warning for people looking for love online – if an online love interest asks you for money, it's probably a scam.

Every year, the Oregon DOJ receives heartbreaking reports about "romance scammers" who create fake profiles and eventually convince people to send money in the name of love. Some even make wedding plans with their victim before disappearing with the money. Several victims in Oregon have lost hundreds of thousands of dollars.

An online love interest who asks for money is almost certainly a scam artist, especially if the person: • Wants to leave the dating site immediately and use personal email or Instant Messenger • Claims to be in love very quickly. •Claims to be from the U.S., but is traveling or working overseas *Plans to visit, but is prevented by a traumatic event or a business deal gone sour •Say they are out of the country for business or military service.

To stay safe from these online fakers, don't wire money, buy a prepaid card or send cash to cover: travel, medical emergencies, hotel or hospital bills for a child or other relative, visas or other official documents or losses from a temporary financial setback. Don't send money to "tide someone over" after an alleged mugging or robbery, and don't do anyone a favor by making an online purchase or forwarding a package to another country. One request leads to another, and delays and disappointments will follow. In the end, the money will be gone - along with the person you thought was in love with you and would do anything for vou.

Do you use social media? Have you made an online purchase? Have you clicked the "I agree" button without reading the fine print of a website's Terms of Service? If so, there is a good chance that your personal information has been compromised. To stay safe, follow these simple tips from NCSA:

1. Own Your Online Presence. • PERSONAL INFORMATION IS LIKE MONEY: Information about you, such as your purchase history or location, has value - just like money. Be thoughtful about who gets that information and how it's collected through apps and websites. • BE AWARE OF WHAT IS BEING SHARED: Set the privacy and security settings on web services and devices to your comfort level for information sharing. • SHARE WITH CARE: Think before posting about yourself and others online. Consider what a post reveals, who might see it and how it could be perceived now and in the future.

Keep a Clean Machine *KEEP SECURITY SOFTWARE (DOJ), Consumer Protection Division has a Scam CURRENT: Having the latest security software, web browser Alert Network? You can locate their website at: and operating system is the best defense against viruses, malware and other online threats. •AUTOMATE SOFTWARE UPDATES: Many software programs will automatically connect and update to defend against known risks. Turn on automatic updates if that is an available option. •PROTECT ALL DEVICES THAT CONNECT TO THE INTERNET: Along with computers, smartphones, gaming systems and other web-enabled devices also need protection from viruses and malware. •PLUG & SCAN: viruses and malware can infect USBs and other external devices. Use your security software to scan them.
 - Protect Your Personal Information •MAKE YOUR PASSWORD A SENTENCE: A strong password is a sentence that is at least 12 characters long and uses a mix of letters and numbers. Focus on positive sentences or phrases that you like to think about and are easy to remember. •UNIQUE ACCOUNT, UNIQUE PASSWORD: Separate passwords for every account helps to thwart cybercriminals. •WRITE IT DOWN AND KEEP IT SAFE: Having separate passwords for every account helps to thwart cybercriminals. At a minimum, separate your work and personal accounts and make sure that your critical accounts have the strongest passwords.
 - 4. Connect with Care •WHEN IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT: Links in emails, social media posts and online advertising are often how cybercriminals try to steal your personal information. Even if you know the source, if something looks suspicious, do not click on it. ◆GET SAVVY ABOUT WI-FI HOTSPOTS: Limit the type of business you conduct and adjust the security settings on your device to limit who can access your machine. PROTECT YOUR \$\$: When banking and shopping, check to be sure the site is security enabled. Look for web addresses with "https://" or "shttp://," which means the site takes extra measures to help secure your information. "http://" is not secure.
 - 5. Be Web Wise •STAY CURRENT: Keep pace with new ways to stay safe online: Check trusted websites for the latest information, and share with friends, family, and colleagues and encourage them to be web wise. •THINK BEFORE YOU ACT: Be wary of communications that implore you to act immediately, offer something that sounds too good to be true or ask for personal information. •BACK IT UP: Protect your valuable work, music, photos and other digital information by making an electronic copy and storing it safely.

The City of Gladstone requires a permit to use portable storage containers or "PODS". PODS can be placed on the street or public right of way for up to 72 hours. PODS can be placed on private property for up to 30 days. Stay Safe by operating heat sources safely. Always be sure to have a working smoke alarm in your home as a first step to being safe in a warm home.



Space Heater -Keep anything that can burn, such as bedding, clothing and curtains, at least 3 feet away from the heater. -Make sure the heater has an automatic shut-off, so if it tips over, it shuts off. -Turn heaters off when you go to bed or leave the room. -Plug portable heaters directly into outlets and never into an extension cord or power strip. -Only use

portable heaters from a recognized testing laboratory.


Fireplace -Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent embers or sparks jumping out. -Do not burn paper in your fireplace. -Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home. -Put ashes in a metal container with a lid, outside, at least 3 feet from your home.





Wood Stove -Make sure your wood stove is 3 feet from anything that can burn. -Do not burn paper in your wood stove. -Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home. -Have your chimney inspected and cleaned each year by a professional.

Furnace -Have your furnace inspected each year. -Keep anything that can burn away from the furnace.

Fix a Leak Week March 18th-24th, 2019



Leaks Can Run, but They Can't Hide

During National Fix a Leak Week the Clackamas River Water Providers want you to be ready to chase down household leaks. Nearly 1 trillion gallons of water annually nationwide, is wasted due to undetected leaks so each year we hunt down the drips during Fix a Leak Week. Mark your calendars for EPA's annual Fix a Leak Week, March 18 through 24, 2019—but remember that you can find and fix

leaks inside and outside your home to save valuable water and money all year long. *Checking for Leaks*

The average household's leaks can account for nearly 10,000 gallons of water wasted every year and ten percent of homes have leaks that waste 90 gallons or more per day. Common types of leaks found in the home are worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets, and other leaking valves. These types of leaks are often easy to fix, requiring only a few tools and hardware that can pay for themselves in water savings. Fixing easily corrected household water leaks can save homeowners about 10 percent on their water bills.

To check for leaks in your home, you first need to determine whether you're wasting water and then identify the source of the leak. Here are some tips for finding leaks:

Take a look at your water usage during a colder month, such as January or February. If a family of four exceeds 12,000 gallons per month, there are serious leaks.

Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter changes at all, you probably have a leak.

Ask the CRWP for leak detection tablets to identify toilet leaks. If any color shows up in the bowl after 10 minutes, you have a leak.

Examine faucet gaskets and pipe fittings for any water on the outside of the pipe to check for surface leaks.








A Message from Our Community Cat Rescue

Spring is right around the corner and many residents are starting to think about gardening. Lawn and garden care products can help your lawn and garden look great, but if used and disposed of improperly, these products can also harm beneficial bugs, plants, soil microbes and ultimately, our streams and rivers. Remember to follow these three steps to help protect our waterways from the harmful effects of pesticides and fertilizers: 1) BUY—think before you buy; 2) USE—Use only what you need and 3) DISPOSE—Not down the drain. Scoop the Poop! Gladstone Public Works Needs Your Help to Keep Our Water System Clean



As our rains continue to move in, streams swell with water. In Gladstone, as well as the rest of our wet region, much of this water washes off the land and into the storm water system. Our storm systems drain water away from the City and into our local rivers. Along the way, it picks up pollutants, some of which you may not think of as pollution. What you do around

your home, work, or anywhere in the city, makes a difference for clean water in our environment.

Bacteria is a natural component of lakes, rivers, and streams. Most of these bacterial agents are harmless. But some have the potential to cause sickness and disease in humans, pets, and other animals. Their origin may surprise you. Research conducted by Clean Water Services of Washington County found that, on average, 63 percent of E. coli bacteria contamination in streams originated from waterfowl and canine sources, i.e.: Ducks and Dogs!

What you do matters. Gladstone Public Works encourages everyone to please pick up your dog's poop. It is essentially raw sewage and should not be left anywhere on the ground. In addition to E. coli, dog waste can contain harmful organisms such as Leptospira and roundworms. These organisms can be very serious to both humans and pets, and can be carried into your home after walking through yards or parks where animal waste has been present. This same bacteria washes into streams and rivers when it rains. The solution to this pollution is to pick up after your pets in your yard, our parks and streets, put the waste in a bag and properly dispose of it in the trash.
